Re: Proposed Site of the Firefighter Memorial

The Garden Club of Hamilton has been active in Hamilton for over 60 years. We have contributed significantly to the beautification of the city and the preservation of its historical landscapes, most notably Dundurn Castle and the Royal Botanical Gardens.

It has recently come to our attention that the City of Hamilton plans to disrupt the Dunington-Grubb designed formal gardens with the installation of a firefighter memorial. While we greatly honour the firefighters, and their dedication to saving lives, we believe these historic gardens must remain undisturbed.

These gardens are a significant part of our city's history. They were designed by the husband and wife team of landscape architects who contributed their hard work and talents in beautifying Gage Park and other locations throughout both our city and province. Some of their notable works include gardens and landscaping at the following locations:

- Battlefield Park, Stoney Creek
- Whitehern Historic House, Hamilton
- The Oakes Garden Theatre, Niagara Falls
- The Rainbow Bridge Gardens, Niagara Falls
- University Avenue, Toronto
- University of Toronto
- McLaughlin Estate, Oshawa.
- Sheridan Nurseries, Oakville, once owned by the Dunington-Grubbs.

The contribution of the Dunington-Grubbs is not just limited to Hamilton and Ontario but extends internationally.

It is worth mentioning that Lorrie Alfred Dunington-Grubb was the first woman to practice landscape architecture in Canada, and was recognized for her extensive knowledge in town planning, horticulture, and garden design. Leaving the formal gardens intact is an acknowledgment of this incredible woman's contribution to life in Hamilton during the early 1900s and a significant milestone for women.

As you know, in 2012-13, Gage Park underwent a large scale revitalization based on a Master Plan, at great expense to the citizens of Hamilton. In September 2013, the Dunington-Grubb memorial was presented to Gage Park by the Friends of Gage Park. This presentation was a confirmation of the importance of the work carried out by this dedicated couple.

When the Master Plan for Gage Park was submitted in 2010, the purpose, as noted by Mayor Eisenberger, was to work towards "re-establishing *the glory of formal gardens* with respect to the historic intentions of the park, and that the new park vision provide greater protection of cultural heritage elements to strengthen the park as a cultural landscape. The Master Plan responds to the historical importance of this park to the City. It is a park of historical significance and presents, horticulture excellence. A formal garden adjacent to Main Street, Gage Park remains a prime example of a public garden reflective of the Canadian City Beautiful Movement."

The Dunington-Grubb formal gardens are an historical site.

As such, in keeping with the Mayor's stated position, they should be honored and celebrated as part of Hamilton's history. Achieving this would enrich our community and assist in preserving our past.

We need to work towards ensuring the preservation of these gardens as a significant historic resource. We must NOT set aside this very important recognition of a part of our city's past as if it is merely yesterday's news.

Although the Garden Club supports recognition of the firefighters, we are firm in our belief that such recognition can be achieved without disturbing the "glory of formal gardens." There are many other suitable places for the memorial.

The 52 members of the Garden Club of Hamilton vigorously oppose the displacing and /or destruction of the formal gardens.

I have been living in Hamilton for approximately 10 years. I initially moved here from the GTA to study at McMaster University. My intention was always to go back to Toronto, where I wanted to live and work. Over the years of my studies in Hamilton, I had grown to love the many facets that the city offers. I love the landscapes, the easy access to nature, the humble long time residents, the warm feeling from grassroots movements advocating for the environment, for sustainability, for locally sourced products and services, as well as the advocating for fair representation on council.

As a woman of colour in this city, I have faced systemic racism on many fronts. I have faced it at the university, at work, in accessing any kind of service, in advocating for better supports, etc. Although I love Hamilton and consider Hamilton home, there is immense potential for the City to respond to its ever-growing population. Hamilton has sponsored so many refugees who now consider Hamilton home. The city has also taken in so many immigrants, who have so much potential to thrive right here in this city. We are seeing so many moving here from Toronto, like myself (though I came before the housing crisis) who have experienced all kinds of diversity in Toronto and the GTA.

With the current rise in extreme right-wing display in our city via protests, posters, as well as attempted fire bombings (if you remember, the mosque on King St was attempted to be set on fire, and the surrounding community of refugees and immigrants safely held on to the perpetrator for authorities). There have been several hate crimes that we have witnessed and heard of in this city.

In the spirit of this new era of the Woman and of folks of colour, it would be tremendously important for Hamilton to support a hiring committee that reflects the city of Hamilton and to put into action the things you all claim Hamilton to be: the best place to raise a child and age successfully. The only way in which we can do that is by modelling behaviour. Half the population of Hamilton identifies as a woman. Now we finally have fair representation of this on council. However, the City has lost Shylo Elmayan. The City has defunded the Access and Equity office.

We need to further push for and fight for equity, diversity, and inclusion. Hundreds of women, non-binary, and men have shown up at the Women's March events in Hamilton three years in a row. Take Back The Night, organized by SACHA, sees hundreds and hundreds of women taking to streets to fight for street safety at night. Women still do not feel safe. Women still do not feel heard. Women still are disbelieved and disregarded. Gender equity is incredibly important for any city to thrive, but more so, we need women of colour, queer persons, persons with disabilities, etc. to be prominently placed as the City's leaders in order to shut down ignorance and bigotry. We need a City Manager who inspires young marginalized persons to instill within them the possibility of leadership, the possibility of success, the possibility of representation, the possibility of a turning point for the City of Hamilton to respect all women and marginalized persons in Hamilton

Let's show the rest of the province, especially the likes of Mr. Doug Ford, that Women, especially Women of Colour, are not just welcomed and supported in Hamilton, but are respected enough to take on such a big role. Because we are capable. Because we have earned it. Because it's time.

Please make the smart decision to expand the Selection and Hiring Committee in time for the City Manager hiring. Keeping the hiring committee as is would be an example of how the City of Hamilton does not want to keep up with the times. In this era of the Woman, please include new councillors in the Selection and Hiring Committee.

Dear Mayor Eisenhower and Honourable City Councillors,

With respect to Council's consideration of Motions tabled relating to best principles and practices for advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) in and through recruitment and selection processes, I would like to offer the following contextual remarks and supplementary resources in the hopes that the information may elevate deliberations and decision making.

As McMaster's inaugural Associate Vice-President, Equity and Inclusion, I have been tasked to lead institutional efforts to integrate EDI priorities and practices throughout the university. We are not alone in augmenting EDI efforts at McMaster. Counterpart institutions are following suit at the strong encouragement and incentivization of Universities Canada¹ and the Tricouncil Funding Agency².

To date, I have engaged the campus community in a broad consultation, and we are on the path to developing a strategic EDI action plan for the institution. Appended to this letter is a deck of slides that I have been using to articulate the case for EDI at McMaster, and to describe the four-pillar framework that will underpin our strategic planning process.

The Motions being presented to Council are premised on the belief that the City of Hamilton will be strengthened and best served by diversifying municipal management and leadership staff, as well as the membership of Council and its Committees. Indeed, there is ample literature that demonstrates the "business" case for diversity, including positive outcomes across a number of organizational performance indicators. Attached is a document articulating McMaster's EDI Imperative, which includes a summary of the relevant literature that compels us to apply best principles and practices for advancing equity, diversity and inclusion in all of our talent recruitment and selection processes at the university.

Council members are being asked to contemplate actions that have the potential to transform Council's capacity to attract - to the role of city manager – the most talented/excellent applicants from the most diverse candidate pools. This goal presumes Council members' awareness and acceptance that:

- 1) Quality and diversity are not mutually exclusive, but rather integrally connected; the creativity and innovation that leads to excellence relies on diversity of thought, perspective and experience, and therefore the pursuit of excellence requires incorporating an equity lens and inclusive practices.
- 2) There is not a "pipeline issue" or dearth of available talent among equity groups, but rather there is talent in every community;

- 3) Some talented members in our community (specifically federally designated equity groups: Indigenous, racialized, persons with disabilities and women) still experience significant barriers to employment, and data demonstrates that these equity groups continue to be underrepresented in leadership and decision-making roles and bodies across sectors.
- 4) Employment barriers encountered are a consequence of personally-mediated or individual unconscious and implicit bias, as well as systems and structures which may inadvertently hinder access to equal opportunity; moreover, everyone harbours some level of unconscious implicit biases, and the literature has shown that even the most well-meaning, fair-minded individuals have biases that operate below the level of consciousness to influence differential treatment (including perceptions and evaluations) in employment contexts.
- 5) Diverse committees can mitigate the effects of implicit bias and produce more robust and fair analyses, assessments, and outcomes; the literature demonstrates that diverse teams and boards are more creative and resourceful, and their performance is superior including fewer "missed" hires among talented candidates from equity groups

If Council members accept all of the above, then members may appreciate and embrace strategies to reduce personally mediated/individual bias and eliminate structural and systemic barriers in our policies and practices, in order to attract the most diverse talent pool from which to select an excellent candidate. It is my view that the Motions presented exemplify those strategies that have been demonstrated to effect change. If Council members require more information to support the assertions made above, and to view the Motions as being aligned with best principles and practices for sourcing diverse talent, members may benefit from reviewing some of the additional resources attached.



Benefits and Challenges of Diversity in Academic Settings

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"It is time to renew the promise of American higher education in advancing social progress, end America's discomfort with race and social difference, and deal directly with many of the issues of inequality present in everyday life."

Benefits and Challenges of Diversity

The diversity of a university's faculty, staff, and students influences its strength, productivity, and intellectual personality. Diversity of experience, age, physical ability, religion, race, ethnicity, gender, and many other attributes contributes to the richness of the environment for teaching and research. We also need diversity in discipline, intellectual outlook, cognitive style, and personality to offer students the breadth of ideas that constitute a dynamic intellectual community.

A vast and growing body of research provides evidence that a diverse student body, faculty, and staff benefits our joint missions of teaching and research by increasing creativity, innovation, and problem-solving. Yet diversity of faculty, staff, and students also brings challenges. Increasing diversity can lead to less cohesiveness, less effective communication, increased anxiety, and greater discomfort for many members of a community.¹

Learning to respect and appreciate each other's cultural and stylistic differences and becoming aware of unconscious assumptions and behaviors that may influence our interactions will enable us to minimize the challenges and derive maximum benefits from diversity.

This booklet summarizes research on the benefits and challenges of diversity and provides suggestions for realizing the benefits. Its goal is to help create a climate in which all individuals feel "personally safe, listened to, valued, and treated fairly and with respect." ²

Benefits for Teaching and Research

Research shows that diverse working groups are more productive, creative, and innovative than homogeneous groups, and suggests that developing a diverse faculty will enhance teaching and research.³

Some findings are:

- A controlled experimental study of performance during a brainstorming session compared ideas generated by ethnically diverse groups composed of Asians, Blacks, Whites, and Latinos to those generated by ethnically homogenous groups composed of Whites only. Evaluators who were unaware of the source of the ideas found no significant difference in the number of ideas generated by the two types of groups. However, when applying measures of feasibility and effectiveness, they rated the ideas generated by diverse groups as being of higher quality.⁴
- The level of critical analysis of decisions and alternatives was higher in groups exposed to minority viewpoints than in groups that were not. Minority viewpoints stimulated discussion of multiple perspectives and previously unconsidered alternatives, whether or not the minority opinion was correct or ultimately prevailed.⁵



- A study of corporate innovation found that the most innovative companies deliberately established diverse work teams.⁶
- Data from the 1995 Faculty Survey conducted by UCLA's Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) demonstrated that scholars from minority groups have expanded and enriched scholarship and teaching in many academic disciplines by offering new perspectives and by raising new questions, challenges and concerns.⁷

Several investigators found that women and faculty of color more frequently employed active learning in the classroom, encouraged student input, and included perspectives of women and minorities in their coursework.⁸



Benefits for Students

Numerous research studies have examined the impact of diversity on students and educational outcomes. Cumulatively, these studies provide extensive evidence that diversity has a positive impact on all students, minority and majority.⁹

Some examples are:

- A national longitudinal study of 25,000 undergraduates at 217 four-year colleges and universities showed that institutional policies fostering diversity of the campus community had positive effects on students' cognitive development, satisfaction with the college experience, and leadership abilities. These policies encouraged faculty to include themes relating to diversity in their research and teaching, and provided students with opportunities to confront racial and multicultural issues in the classroom and in extracurricular settings. ¹⁰
- Two longitudinal studies—one conducted by HERI in 1985 and 1989 with over 11,000 students from 184 institutions, and another in 1990 and 1994 on approximately 1500 students at the University of Michigan—showed that students who interacted with racially and ethnically diverse peers both informally and within the classroom showed the greatest "engagement in active thinking, growth in intellectual engagement and motivation, and growth in intellectual and academic skills." A more recent study of 9,000 students at ten selective colleges reported that meaningful engagement rather than casual and superficial interactions led to greater benefit from interaction with racially diverse peers. 12



- Data from the National Study of Student Learning indicated that both in-class and out-of-class interactions and involvement with diverse peers fostered critical thinking. This study also found a strong correlation between "the extent to which an institution's environment is perceived as racially nondiscriminatory" and students' willingness to accept both diversity and intellectual challenge. 13
- A survey of 1,215 faculty members in departments granting doctoral degrees in computer science, chemistry, electrical engineering, microbiology, and physics showed that women faculty played important roles in fostering the education and success of women graduate students.¹⁴

Challenges of Diversity


Despite the benefits that a diverse faculty, staff, and student body provide to a campus, diversity also presents considerable challenges that must be addressed and overcome.

Some examples include:

- Numerous studies have reported that women and minority faculty members are considerably less satisfied with many aspects of their jobs than are majority male faculty members. These aspects include teaching and committee assignments, involvement in decision-making, professional relations with colleagues, promotion and tenure, salary inequities, and overall job satisfaction. 15
- A study of minority faculty at universities and colleges in eight Midwestern states showed that faculty of color experience exclusion, isolation, alienation, and racism in predominantly white universities.¹⁶



- Multiple studies demonstrate that minority students often feel isolated and unwelcome in predominantly white institutions and that many experience discrimination and differential treatment. Minority status can result from race, ethnicity, national origin, sexual orientation, disability and other factors.¹⁷
- Women students, particularly when they are minorities in their classes, may experience unwelcoming climates that car include sexist use of language, presentation of stereotypic or disparaging views of women, differential treatment from professors, and/or sexual harassment. ¹⁸



Research has demonstrated that a lack of previous positive experiences with "outgroup members" (minorities) causes "ingroup members" (majority members) to feel anxious about interactions with minorities. This anxiety can cause majority members to respond with hostility or to avoid interactions with minorities.¹⁹

Influence of Unconscious Assumptions and Biases

Research studies show that people who have strong egalitarian values and believe that they are not biased may unconsciously behave in discriminatory ways. ²⁰ A first step towards improving climate is to recognize that unconscious biases, attitudes, and other influences that are not related to the qualifications contributions, behaviors, and personalities of our colleagues can influence our interactions, *even if we are committed to egalitarian views*.

Although we all like to think that we are objective scholars who judge people on merit, the quality of their work, and the nature of their achievements, copious research shows that a lifetime of experience and cultural history shapes every one of us and our judgments of others.

The results from controlled research studies demonstrate that people often hold unconscious, implicit assumptions that influence their judgments and interactions with others. Examples range from expectations or assumptions about physical or social characteristics associated with race, gender, age, and ethnicity to those associated with certain job descriptions, academic institutions, and fields of study.

Examples of common social assumptions or expectations

- When shown photographs of people of the same height, evaluators overestimated the heights of male subjects and underestimated the heights of female subjects, even though a reference point, such as a doorway, was provided.²¹
- When shown photographs of men of similar height and build, evaluators rated the athletic ability of African American men higher than that of White men. 22
- When asked to choose counselors from a group of equally competent applicants who were neither exceptionally qualified nor unqualified for the position college students chose White candidates more often than African American candidates, exhibiting a tendency to give members of the majority group the benefit of the doubt.²³

These studies show that we often apply generalizations about groups (that may or may not be valid) to the evaluation of individuals.²⁴ In the study on height, evaluators applied the statistically accurate generalization that men are usually taller than women to estimate the height of individuals who did not necessarily conform to the generalization. If we can inaccurately apply generalizations to objective

characteristics as easily measured as height, what happens when the qualities we are evaluating are not as objective or as easily measured? What happens when, as in the studies of athletic ability and choice of counselor, the generalizations are not valid? What happens when such generalizations unconsciously influence the ways we interact with other people?

Examples of assumptions or biases that can influence interactions:

- When rating the quality of verbal skills as indicated by vocabulary definitions, evaluators rated the skills lower if told that an African American provided the definitions than if told that a White person provided them.²⁵
- When asked to assess the contribution of skill versus luck to successful performance of a task, evaluators more frequently attributed success to skill for males and to luck for females, even though males and females performed the task identically.²⁶
- Evaluators who were busy, distracted by other tasks, and under time pressure gave women lower ratings than men for the same written evaluation of job performance. Sex bias decreased when they took their time and focused attention on their judgments, which rarely occurs in actual work settings.²⁷
- Research has shown that incongruities between perceptions of female gender roles and leadership roles can cause evaluators to assume that women will be less competent leaders. When



- women leaders provided clear evidence of their competence, thus violating traditional gender norms, evaluators perceived them to be less likeable and were less likely to recommend them for hiring or promotion.²⁸
- A study of nonverbal communication found that White interviewers maintained higher levels of visual contact, reflecting greater attraction, intimacy, and respect, when talking with White interviewees and higher rates of blinking, indicating greater negative arousal and tension, when talking with Black interviewees.²⁹

Examples of assumptions or biases in academic contexts

Several research studies conclude that implicit biases and assumptions can affect evaluation and hiring of candidates for academic positions. These studies show that the gender of the person being evaluated significantly influences the assessment of resumes and postdoctoral applications, evaluation of journal articles, and the language and structure of letters of recommendation. As we attempt to enhance campus and department climate, consider whether the influence of such biases and assumptions also affects selection of invited speakers, conference presenters, committee membership, interaction, and collaboration with colleagues, and promotion to tenure and full professorships.

- A study of over 300 recommendation letters for medical faculty hired by a large American medical school found that letters for female applicants differed systematically from those for males. Letters written for women were shorter, provided "minimal assurance" rather than solid recommendations, raised more doubts, and included fewer superlative adjectives.³⁰
- In a national study, 238 academic psychologists (118 male, 120 female) evaluated a junior-level or a senior-level curriculum vitae randomly assigned a male or a female name. These were actual vitae from an academic psychologist who successfully competed for an assistant professorship and then received tenure early. For the junior-level applicant, both male and female evaluators gave the male applicant better ratings for teaching, research, and service and were more likely to hire the male than the female applicant. Gender did not influence evaluators' decisions to tenure the senior-level applicant, but evaluators did voice more doubts about the female applicant's qualifications. ³¹
- A study of postdoctoral fellowships awarded by the Medical Research Council
 of Sweden found that women candidates needed substantially more publications to achieve the same rating as men, unless they personally knew someone on the selection panel.³²
- A 2008 study showed that when the journal *Behavioral Ecology* introduced a double-blind review process that concealed the identities of reviewers and authors, there was a significant increase in the publication of articles with a woman as the first author.³³

Reaping the Benefits and Minimizing the Challenges of Diversity

In order to reap the benefits and minimize the challenges of diversity, we need to overcome the powerful human tendency to feel more comfortable when surrounded by people we resemble. We need to learn how to understand, value, and appreciate difference. Below is some advice for doing so:



Become aware of unconscious biases that may undermine your conscious commitment to egalitarian principles.

One way of doing so is to take the Implicit Association Test (IAT) offered by Project Implicit (a research collaborative at the University of Virginia, Harvard University, and the University of Washington): https://implicit.harvard.edu/implicit/demo.

Consciously strive to minimize the influence of unintentional bias.

Question your judgments and decisions and consider whether unintentional bias may have played a role. One way to do so is to perform a thought experiment: ask yourself if your opinions or conclusions would change if the person was of a different race, sex, or religion, etc. Some questions to consider include:

- Are women or minority colleagues/students subject to higher expectations in areas such as number and quality of publications, name recognition, or personal acquaintance with influential colleagues?
- Are colleagues or students who received degrees from institutions other than major research universities under-valued? Are we missing opportunities to benefit from the innovative, diverse, and valuable perspectives and expertise of colleagues or students from other institutions such as historically black universities, four-year colleges, community colleges, government, or industry?
- Are ideas and opinions voiced by women or minorities ignored? Are their achievements and contributions under-valued or unfairly attributed to collaborators, despite evidence to the contrary in their publications or letters of reference?
- Is the ability of women or minorities to lead groups, raise funds, and/or supervise students and staff underestimated? Are such assumptions influencing committee and/or course assignments?

- Are assumptions about whether women or minorities will "fit in" to an existing environment influencing decisions?
- Are assumptions about family obligations inappropriately influencing appointments and other decisions?

Seek out opportunities for greater interaction with women and minority colleagues.

Get to know women and minority colleagues in your department, your campus, and your professional associations. Pursue meaningful discussions with them about research, teaching methodologies, and ideas about the direction of your department, college, and profession. Listen actively to any concerns they express and try to understand and learn from their perspectives and experiences.

Focus on the individual and on his/her personality, qualifications, merit, interests, etc.

Consciously avoid the tendency to make assumptions about an individual based on the characteristics (accurate or not) of his/her group membership. Likewise, avoid the tendency to make assumptions about groups based on the behavior, personality, qualifications, etc. of an individual group member. Instead, concentrate on the individual and his/her qualities.

Treat all individuals—regardless of race, sex, or status—with respect, consideration, and politeness.

- Greet faculty, staff, and students pleasantly in hallways or in other chance encounters.
- Make requests to faculty, staff, and students politely—even when the work you are asking for is part of their obligations.
- Acknowledge and appreciate the work, assistance, and contributions of faculty colleagues, staff, and students. Do so in public forums as well as privately.
- Address individuals by their appropriate titles or by their preferred forms of address.

Actively promote inclusive communities.

- In classroom, committee, laboratory, and departmental settings, work to ensure that everyone has a chance to voice opinions, concerns, or questions. Acknowledge and attribute ideas, suggestions, and comments accurately. Women and minorities often report that their remarks or contributions are ignored or unheard.
- Support efforts to ensure that leadership and membership of departmental and professional committees are diverse with respect to age, gender, nationality, race, ethnicity, etc.

- Support efforts to ensure that departmental events such as seminar series and sponsored conferences include presenters of various ages, genders, nationalities, races, and ethnicities.
- Promote inclusive language by example. Avoid using only male pronouns when referring to groups of both sexes. Avoid language that makes assumptions about marital status and or/sexual orientation, i.e., consider using "partner" rather than "spouse."
- Welcome new departmental members by initiating conversations or meetings with them. Attend social events hosted by your department and make efforts to interact with new members and others who are not part of your usual social circle.

Conclusion

Diversity is not an end in itself.

Diversity is a means of achieving our educational and institutional goals. As such, merely adding diverse people to a homogeneous environment does not automatically create a more welcoming and intellectually stimulating campus.

Long-term efforts, engagement, and substantial attention are essential for realizing the benefits that diversity has to offer and for ensuring that all members of the academic community are respected, listened to, and valued.

Unconscious Bias in Faculty and Leadership Recruitment: A Literature Review

Although women and minorities have made significant strides in achieving equality in the workplace, they are still underrepresented in the upper strata of organizations, including senior faculty and leadership positions at medical schools and teaching hospitals.^{a,1,2} Within the last decade, social science researchers have pursued the theory of "unconscious bias" as one barrier to workplace equality that may persist despite a general commitment to increase diversity across the academic medicine workforce and other organizations. This Analysis in Brief reviews the scientific literature on the theory of unconscious bias, explores the role of unconscious bias in job recruitment and evaluations, and offers suggestions for search committees and others involved in hiring decisions at medical schools and teaching hospitals.

Background and Method

Unconscious bias refers to social stereotypes about certain demographics or groups of people that individuals form outside of their own conscious awareness. Social scientists argue that most people have some degree of unconscious bias because it stems from our natural tendency to make associations to help us organize our social worlds.³

To analyze and present the most relevant studies on unconscious bias, I performed an extensive literature search and sorted articles by their research methodologies and focus. ^b The eight articles selected for this *Analysis in Brief* were specifically about career-related unconscious bias, except for those on the Implicit

Table 1. Experimental Studies of Career-related Unconscious Bias*

Method

Results

Steinpres, Anders, & Ritzke (1999)

Participants (238 academic psychologists) rated the *curriculum vitae* (CVs) of real-life psychologists: one CV from early career and one CV from later career. They received one of these CVs with either a male or female name on it, and were asked whether they would hire the job applicant (for those who received the early-career CV) or whether they would award the candidate tenure (for those who received the later-career CV).

- Both male and female participants were more likely to hire the male applicant than the female applicant and were more likely to report that the male applicant had adequate experience in research, teaching, and service.
- Participants were four times more likely to write comments of concern in the margins of their questionnaires for female tenure candidates than for male tenure candidates.

eilman & Okimoto (2007

Given descriptions of fictitious male and female managers who were successful in male-dominated jobs, undergraduate students evaluated the managers on several measures, including likeability, interpersonal hostility, competence, and desirability as a boss.

Female managers were rated as less likeable, more interpersonally hostile, less competent, and less desirable as bosses than were male managers.

King, Madera, Hebl, & Knight (2006)

Participants (155 white males) viewed a fictitious resume of an Asian-American, Mexican-American, African-American, or Caucasian man that was either high or low quality. They gave the target of the resume an overall evaluation (based on intelligence, motivation, and likelihood to be hired) and a rating on suitability for various occupations (categorized as high- or low-status jobs).

- On the overall evaluation, African-American targets were rated the least positively and Asian-American targets were rated the most positively.
- Asian-American targets were rated as the most suitable for high-status jobs, whereas Mexican-American targets were rated as the least suitable for high-status jobs. Mexican-American targets were rated as the most suitable for low-status jobs, whereas Caucasian targets were rated as the least suitable for low-status jobs.

Biernat & Manis (1994)

Participants (143 white undergraduates) viewed 40 photographs of black and white individuals, each paired with definitions of two words. The participants rated the verbal ability of the photographed individuals as if those individuals had provided the definitions.

Black individuals were rated as having lower verbal ability than were white individuals, suggesting that the participants had a bias that black people are less verbally skilled than white people.

Association Test (IAT), which were included as background material because of their prevalence in the literature and their direct illustration of unconscious bias. Articles on career-related unconscious bias included methodologies of two types: experimental studies involving artificial workplace situations and examinations of unconscious bias in actual hiring and review practices. The implications about recruitment practices in academic medicine drawn from this literature review are gener-

alized from the findings of unconscious bias in many fields.

Results and Discussion

Implicit Association Test
Though not directly connected to
career-related unconscious bias,
studies involving the IAT receive the
most support for the theory of unconscious bias in general. The IAT has
consistently demonstrated that people
unconsciously prefer white over black,
young over old, and thin over fat, and
that people have stereotypic associations

Table 2. Real-life Examinations of Career-related Unconscious Bias*

Method

Results

Trix & Psenka (2003)

The researchers analyzed 312 real letters of recommendation that helped medical school faculty receive their clinical and research positions. The letters were received by a large U.S. medical school from 1992 to 1995.

Compared with letters of recommendation for males, letters for females were shorter, were more likely to be "letters of minimal assurance" (e.g., lacking in specificity), were more likely to contain gender terms (e.g., "she is an intelligent young lady"), and were more likely to include "doubt raisers" (e.g., criticisms, hedges, faint praise).

Vennerås & Wold (1997)

The researchers evaluated whether the peerreview system of postdoctoral fellowships at the Swedish Medical Research Council was biased against women. For peer-reviewers to equally rate men and women on scientific competency, women needed an equivalent of approximately three more articles in *Nature* or *Science*, or 20 more articles in a specialist journal, such as *Neuroscience* or *Radiology*.

Goldin & Rouse (2000)

To test for sex-biased hiring in symphony orchestras, the researchers compared two audition procedures: "blind" auditions (adopted in 1970—involves the use of screens to conceal candidates' identities) and "not-blind" auditions (no use of screens).

- Blind auditions increases the likelihood that a female will be hired by 25 percent.
- The switch to blind auditions in 1970 explains 30 percent of the increase in the proportion of females among new hires.

Bertrand & Mullainathan (2003)

To examine the effect of race on receiving job callbacks, the researchers responded with fictitious resumes to help-wanted ads in Boston and Chicago newspapers. The resumes were altered from actual ones found on job search Web sites. The researchers categorized the new resumes as high or low quality and assigned them an equal number of traditionally black names (e.g., Lakisha) or traditionally white names (e.g., Greg).

- Resumes with white names had a 50 percent greater chance of receiving a callback than did resumes with black names (10.08% vs. 6.70%, respectively).
- Higher-quality resumes elicited 30 percent more callbacks for whites, whereas they only elicited 9 percent more callbacks for blacks.
- Employers who listed "Equal Opportunity Employer" in their ad discriminated just as much as other employers.

linking males with science and careers and females with liberal arts and family. 4,5 Typically, the IAT requires test-takers to rapidly match individuals of different demographics to words and pictures of varying pleasantness. The quick associations that the test-takers must make reveal their unconscious biases. Additionally, the test-takers often complete a measure of conscious bias. Correlations between scores on the pairing task and the conscious bias scale are generally weak, suggesting that participants have unconscious biases. 6

Career-related Unconscious Bias
Experimental studies of career-related unconscious bias generally involve participants' rating the skills of equally experienced, fictitious job applicants who vary only by gender or race. As evidenced by the articles described in Table 1, studies of this type support the notion that, given equal weighting on all other variables, people prefer males over females, and white and Asian-American individuals over African-American and Mexican-American individuals in job positions. In contrast to these experi-

mental studies, research in real-life settings highlights the practical ramifications of career-related unconscious bias. Real-life examinations provide evidence that unconscious bias affects decisions in actual hiring and evaluation processes. The articles displayed in Table 2 suggest that unconscious bias negatively affects female and black individuals in search and selection processes. Therefore, employers may be more likely to hire white males over individuals of other demographics for job openings. In contrast to studies involving the IAT, the studies in Tables 1 and 2, which do not address the level of consciousness of the participants' biases, provide only indirect evidence of unconscious bias. However, most individuals believe that they hold fewer biases than the average person,⁷ so the findings of bias in these studies very likely demonstrate unconscious bias.

Implications for Faculty Recruitment Processes in Academic Medicine

As evidenced by the preceding examples, unconscious biases may affect evaluations and decisions made in recruitment processes in academic medicine.

However, the literature suggests that those involved in hiring processes can take steps to mitigate some of the effects of unconscious bias in evaluating job candidates. These steps may include:

- Ask individuals involved in hiring processes to reflect on unconscious biases by taking the online version of the IAT (https://implicit.harvard.edu/).
- Create a more objective, structured interview process by (a) setting criteria or using objective measures to assess the skills needed for effective job performance; (b) administering training to all involved in the search and interview process on how to conduct structured interviews; and (c) using performance, satisfaction, and turnover rates of new hires to measure the effectiveness of the interview process.⁸
- Be aware that recommenders of applicants may hold unconscious biases, and therefore may present skewed representations of applicants in their letters of recommendation.⁹
- Consider that cultural differences can affect first impressions of candidates. For instance, the standard interview in the United States uses the criteria of self-confidence, goal orientation, enthusiasm, and leadership, even though these qualities may not be apparent in people of more reserved cultures.¹⁰
- Reserve ample time for the interviews and evaluations of candidates, as sex bias emerges more when evaluators are under time pressure.¹¹




Equity, Diversity and Inclusion *Definitions: Distinct but Related Concepts*



- Identify and reduce/eliminate risk factors
- Mindfulness

- Perspective-taking and empathy-building
 - (e.g., consider situation from another's perspective)
- Individuation
 - (e.g., think about individual not group)
- Stereotype replacement
 - (e.g., make new associations to replace old ones)
 - Imagine individuals who counter-stereotypes (counter-stereotype image)
 - Engage/interact with out-group member ("contact" and cooperation)
- Routinely check thought processes and decisions for possible bias

Inclusive Excellence and McMaster's Vision

McMaster has a vision to achieve international distinction for creativity, innovation and excellence as a student-centred, research-intensive university.

To achieve this vision, McMaster will pursue and advance **inclusive excellence**¹ in teaching, research and scholarship by aiming to, among other things, attract and retain a diverse faculty body that represents the diverse academic talent pool available and reflects an increasingly diverse student body.

Definitions²:

Diversity – the broad "mix" of differences (across multiple and intersecting dimensions of personal and social identities) among community members.

It reflects a striving for excellence in higher education that has been made more inclusive by decades of work to infuse diversity into recruiting, admissions, and hiring; into the curriculum and cocurriculum; and into administrative structures and practices. It also embraces newer forms of excellence, and expanded ways to measure excellence, that take into account research on learning and brain functioning, the assessment movement, and more nuanced accountability structures. Likewise, diversity and inclusion efforts move beyond numbers of students or numbers of programs as end goals. Instead, they are multilayered processes through which we achieve excellence in learning; research and teaching; student development; local and global community engagement; workforce development; and more."

Assertions and Evidence:

A growing body of literature supports the following three assertions:

- Diverse people bring diverse values, interests, lived experiences, perspectives, and practices
 which are essential to disciplinary and interdisciplinary curiosity, creativity, innovation and,
 therefore, quality, necessitating the pursuit of inclusive excellence including expanding the
 diversity of scholars and scholarship in academe.
- 2. Marginalized members of society, and particularly federally designated equity-seeking groups³, have historically been and continue to be under-represented/engaged/served in academe.
- 3. Diversifying the faculty body, to achieve proportionate representation of the diverse academic talent pool and to reflect both increasingly diverse students bodies and communities, requires active and intentional examination and renewal of hiring policies and practices.

The evidence provided below is not exhaustive, but rather a sampling of research that makes the case for inclusive excellence and provide a rationale for efforts to advance current leading and emerging practices to more successfully attract, recruit and retain a diversity of talented faculty members.

"Diversity in science refers to cultivating talent, and promoting the full inclusion of excellence across the social spectrum. This includes people from backgrounds that are traditionally underrepresented **and** those from backgrounds that are traditionally well represented." \sim Gibbs, 2014

- 1. The Case for Diversity and Inclusive Excellence: Innovation, Performance and Effectiveness (Lising Antonio et al., 2003⁵; Chubin & Malcom, 2008⁶; Medin & Lee, 2012⁷; Catalyst, 2013⁸; Redmond, 2014; Deloitte, 2017⁹
- Diverse people bring diverse life practices, perspectives, values, and motivations
- Scientific progress relies on problem-solving and collaboration groups with diverse experiences tend to be more creative and innovative
- Curiosity and inquiry drive science forward, and scientists with different perspectives often ask different questions
- The methods scientists use to seek out answers to questions can be influenced by their values and perspectives; new methods often lead to new knowledge
- Diversity of perspectives enriches science, making it more responsive to a global pool of beneficiaries of the knowledge and practice generated
- Students working in more diverse group setting were influenced by the different perspectives of minority participants and demonstrated enhanced complex thought processes as a result

- Inclusive leadership style and positive diversity climate reduces turnover, enhances employee satisfaction and engagement, and improves performance of diverse teams

2. Historical and Contemporary Under-representation of Equity-Seeking Groups in Academe

Demographics and Labour Market Availability/"Pipeline"11 – wrt racialized/visible minority faculty

- Visible Minority (VM) population in Canada 4.7% in 1981 and 16.2% in 2006 (Stats Canada, 2008)
- Canadian VM in workforce 18.2% in 2006 (labour market availability broadly)
- Canadian VM with PhD 18.7% in 1986 and 24.5% in 2006 (labour market availability specifically)
- In 2006, 16.9% university professors are VM
- Compared with general labour market availability/pipeline, gap looks like -1.3%
- Comparted with specific labour market availability/pipeline, gap looks like -7.6%
- Women in workforce 47.4% in 2006, only 21.9% in STEM workforce (Stats Canada, 2008)
- The pipeline argument does not apply, or is overstated, in many cases;
- Even if the pipeline is clear and open, there are systemic and cultural forces acting on and through the pipeline, including structures, policies, practices and climates, that need to change¹²

McMaster Workforce Gaps¹³

- At McMaster, 9.1% (210) of faculty are VM, in the Faculty of Science 7.5% (22) are VM
- This represents a gap of -9.1% and -10.7% respectively (in contrast with general LMA)
- The gap is -15.4% and -16.9% respectively (in contrast with specific LMA of PhDs)

3. Change Imperative to Mitigate Implicit Bias and Reduce Systemic Barriers

"Although women and minorities have made significant strides in achieving equality in the workplace, they are still underrepresented in the upper strata of organizations, including senior faculty and leadership positions...unconscious bias is one barrier in the workplace..." ~ Corrice, 2009¹⁴

- ensure diverse selection committee across disciplinary areas of research, stage in academic career (including student representation), and multiple dimensions of social identity (including representation from designated equity-seeking groups
 - Consider setting a requirement to have at least 30% W, at least 1 and preferably more members from VM groups, and 1 person of Indigenous ancestry
 - These proportions are consistent with diversity profiles at McMaster:
 - 40% faculty are women (32% Science faculty are women)
 - 9.1% faculty are VM (7.5% Science faculty are VM)
 - 0.5% faculty are Indigenous (0.3% Science faculty are Indigenous)

My name is Carly Bedford and I sit on the Programming Committee at the Friends of the Aviary. As a volunteer I am obviously of the opinion that the aviary should be saved at all costs. As it is an invaluable asset to the community in terms of its long history, the unique area of expertise that it gives insight into, and joy that it can provide to the community. As you know, there is no other organization like it in our city, and it is a privilege for community members to have access to such a beautiful creatures not only for enjoyment and appreciation, but also for educational purposes. The aviary has a long standing history in the city of Hamilton, it adds to our cultural heritage, and it is such a shame to see it put into such a precarious position because of circumstances largely beyond their control.

With a secure home, the aviary can focus on many other tasks, and I can attest to the fact that we have already started putting to fruition ideas for outreach and programming, so that many more children and adults alike can learn about aviculture and have the chance to interact with these magnificent birds. We have already started discussions with the Hamilton Public Library about doing children's programming as part of their Summer Reading Program, and we have interests in other demographics though visiting old age homes and other community groups. There is great potential for this to become a big attraction in our city, not to mention an authority of Avian education, and I know that interest will continue to grow if the aviary is given the chance to develop.

Many of the birds have socialization issues and cannot be cared for in a regular homes. Separating and re-housing the flock will no doubt be devastating to the birds, but also to those who have dedicated so much time and effort to care for them over the years. Exotic birds are not easy to look after, and there isn't a big demand for them in the same way that there are cats and dogs. Dear Honourable Mayor and Council,

In 2000, my youngest brother Adam was tragically killed on his way home from school. A driver failed to stop for a stopped school bus, with emergency lights flashing and stop arm deployed, while Adam was crossing the street after exiting the school bus. Adam was five years old.

I am writing to request your help to put an end to stop-arm violations in order to make travel to and from school safer for children in Hamilton.

For the past 16 years, my family has been championing the "Let's Remember Adam - STOP FOR THE SCHOOL BUS" initiative to ensure that no family has to endure a senseless loss like ours. Our mission is to ensure all children travel to and from school safely every day. We spread Adam's message of school bus and student safety through educational campaigns that raise awareness of stop arm road safety rules and their enforcement. *Unfortunately, stop-arm violations continue to occur on an all too frequent basis, even in my community of Mattawa, where this tragedy took place.*

Last month, my family and I launched the 'This has to stop. We need to stop!' campaign because technological advances such as stop-arm cameras now provide a means of holding drivers who break the law accountable. <u>Our campaign video</u> has reached over 2 million people in just over a week and we received overwhelming support for stop-arm cameras on school buses.

My appeal to you today is to respectfully request the City of Hamilton to implement solutions like stop arm camera technology to change driver behaviour and make the journey to and from school safer for all children who ride the school bus in Hamilton.

For over 30 years now, school buses have been using their flashing lights and stop arms to warn drivers to stop within 20 meters of the school bus. This is governed by the Highway Traffic Act under subsection 175 (11) or (12). Fines range from \$400 to \$2,000 and up to 6 demerit points in Ontario, for a first offence. However, due to a lack of enforcement resources, vehicles pass stopped school buses on a daily basis with no concern for our children's safety. In fact, a pilot project conducted in Mississauga in 2016 showed an average of 2.5 incidents per day where drivers failed to adhere to the law. This is a troubling statistic that needs to change for the better. One only needs to look south of the border to see this risk become reality. In the last two weeks of October 2018 alone, 5 children were killed due to stop-arm violations in the United States.

My family and I do not need statistics to understand that the danger is real. Our children are precious and the school bus is where most of them begin and end their school days.

Legislation was passed over a year ago that would help prevent these types of incidents under Bill 174, Section 21 (1) Duty of drivers when school bus stopped, specifically part XIV.3 School Bus Camera System. However, we are still waiting for regulations to be approved in order for this technology to be implemented.

In December 2018 I wrote to the Minister of Transportation requesting that he expedite the regulatory amendments required for the legislation to become law. I received the attached response from the Ministry of Transportation this week that specifies, "In order for the province to develop the necessary supporting regulations, we require municipalities to identify the technology that will be used as well as develop the needed operational framework for the processing offences." I trust you have also received correspondence from the Province on this issue.

February 11, 2019 will mark the 19th anniversary of my brother's death. On behalf of my family and the Let's Remember Adam - STOP FOR THE SCHOOL BUS initiative, I am asking you to help us honour Adam by mandating stop-arm cameras on all school buses in your community, and informing the Ministry of Transportation and Premier Ford of the importance of this technology to increase student safety.



Re: School Bus Cameras

Thank you for sharing your concerns about school bus safety and, in particular, for your recommendation to move forward with the implementation of school bus stop-arm cameras.

I am very sorry to hear about the tragic loss of your brother Adam. The objective behind so many legislative initiatives the government has implemented over the years has been to improve road safety and to try to prevent so many of these needless deaths.

The safety of occupants on all vehicle types is a priority for the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) – especially the safety of our children traveling on school buses. I want to assure you that MTO has been working very hard to make sure that school buses are amongst the safest ways for children to travel.

As you know, it is illegal to fail to stop for a stopped school bus that has its red lights flashing and the *Highway Traffic Act* (HTA) sets out tough penalties for drivers who break this law. If a driver does not stop, they can be fined \$400 to \$2,000 and get six demerit points for a first offence. For drivers who are convicted a second time within five years, the penalty is a fine of \$1,000 to \$4,000 and six demerit points. Drivers could also go to jail for up to six months.

However, I recognize that no penalty can ever ease the pain of losing a loved one. We are committed to further addressing unsafe and inappropriate driving behaviours, and we aim to do so through a combination of strategies, including

legislation, public education and providing support to the enforcement efforts of Ontario's police services.

With regards to school bus cameras, it is important to note that the HTA does not prohibit adding video equipment to school buses that record drivers who illegally pass stopped school buses, provided that the equipment does not extend beyond the allowable width of the vehicle and it does not interfere with its safe operation. However, photo/video evidence from a vehicle-based camera must be introduced by a witness to be admitted in court.

As you also pointed out on December 21, 2017, the government passed the *Cannabis Smoke-Free Ontario Amendment Act* which:

- Expands the school bus passing offence to include when the stop arm is actuated.
- Allows for the development of regulations that would establish specialized evidentiary rules to clarify what evidence could be used to prove a driver improperly passed a stopped school bus without the need to have a witness present in court.

These changes currently require regulatory amendments to become law. We are now looking to municipal partners, including school boards, to decide whether or not they will pursue the implementation of a school bus camera framework within their own jurisdictions. In order for the province to develop the necessary supporting regulations we require municipalities to identify the technology that will be used as well as develop the needed operational framework for the processing of offences.

To expedite implementation of this initiative I would suggest you bring your concerns regarding school bus cameras forward to your local municipality and possibly the school board. They will likely be working together to decide whether this program is something that should be pursued in your area.

Thank you for writing and for your advocacy efforts to improve the safety for children riding on a school bus.

My two sons are special needs, so our bus comes right to our house. Over a two year period, I have watched more than 20 cars zoom right past our bus. This bus is filled with low functioning and medically fragile children. Children who could at any moment, run from their parents arms on to the street. And despite the buses having a stop sign out, an arm out and lights on, cars continue to zoom by!

I have reported multiple cars to the local police. But without photo/video evidence, charged cannot be laid. All us parents are to busy focusing on our children. We cannot hold our phone recording the road as well!

Police have cameras in their cars. Hamilton buses having cameras in their buses. Hamilton cabs have cameras in their cars. So why don't our school buses?! Our school buses are carrying precious cargo! Children aged 3 and up!

I am emailing you today to ask WHY? Why don't all school buses have cameras? People will never stop for buses when they know they won't get caught!

What are YOU doing to better our children's safety on school buses?

Janet, can you please add this to Council Agenda correspondence.

Dear Mayor & Council

Further to the annual collision report presented to GIC on February 6, 2019, we are respectfully requesting that in addition to having this report list the Intersections with the Highest # of Collisions (Page 23 of 68), you also consider requesting details on the Intersections with the highest ratio to traffic counts.

While we believe it is extremely important to focus resources on improvements where the most citizens are at risk (high traffic areas where there are 20,000 vehicles per day), we believe it is also equally as important to focus resources at intersections that have high collisions relative to the # of vehicles per day. For example, 4 per year or more where there are 7,000 vehicles per day are missing from this report.

We would also like to suggest, that this report shouldn't only list the Intersections with the highest # of Pedestrian and Cyclist collisions. We feel it should list every intersection in the city that had 1 or more ped/cyclist collision in the last 5 years. Pedestrians and cyclists are our most vulnerable and of the 11 such collisions we've had reported in Ward 10 from 2013 to 2017, none of those are reflected in this latest report even though some are multiple times at the same intersections.

Dear Investigator,

I am writing to you to make a closed meeting complaint, under section 239.1 of the *Municipal Act, 2001, (Ontario), S.O. 2001, c. 25 (the "Municipal Act"), in respect of:*

 the meeting of the City of Hamilton CITY MANAGER'S RECRUITMENT STEERING COMMITTEE, Saturday, February 9, 2019, 8:30 A.M., Whiteoaks [sic] Conference Centre, 253 Taylor Road, Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario (the "Resort and Spa Meeting")

This meeting denied access to the public in several ways. I will enumerate them below.

1. LOCATION OF THE RESORT AND SPA MEETING

The Resort and Spa Meeting was held at the White Oaks Conference Resort and Spa (its trade name) in Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario, 66km from the City of Hamilton, in the Regional Municipality of Niagara. The Procedural By-Law, 18-270, of the City of Hamilton requires meetings of Council to be held "in the Council Chambers at City Hall in the City of Hamilton or at such other place within the City of Hamilton as Council may from time to time determine," (section 3.3) or, for special meetings of Standing Committees only, "at locations and times to permit convenient access for members of the public most affected by such a matter with at least 48 hours notice, delivering notice in accordance with subsections 3.4(3) and 3.4(4)." (section 5.4)

The location of the Resort and Spa Meeting was improper under the Procedural By-Law as it was not in the City of Hamilton. It was therefore also improper under section 236 of the Municipal Act as this section provides that meetings must be held at places that conform to the Procedural By-Law.

Even if the special meetings of Standing Committees section is allowed to apply, the Resort and Spa Meeting was not at the most convenient place for members of the public, and therefore was not in accordance with section 5.4 of the Procedural By-Law. Members of the public attempted to attend this meeting and found it impossible to transport there, as will be detailed below.

The remote scheduling of the Resort and Spa Meeting contrary to the Municipal Act effectively barred many Hamiltonians from this meeting.

2. TIMING OF THE RESORT AND SPA MEETING

The Resort and Spa Meeting was originally scheduled for 9:00am on Saturday, February 9, 2019, was reported as such and notice was duly and timely given. It appears that at some point after 9:00am on Thursday, February 9, 2019, but before the Friday evening, that time was changed to 8:30am.

This would mean that there was insufficient notice of the Resort and Spa Meeting, as both subsection 5.5(2) and 3.3(4) require 48 hours' notice for such a meeting, and 3.2(1)(f) requires meetings otherwise to be at times approved by Council; when the Resort and Spa Meeting was approved, the schedule stated it was to take place at 9:00am. Even on the day of the meeting, the Committee meeting listing page still listed the Resort and Spa Meeting as happening at 9:00am. I can provide this document.

The selected time made the attendance of certain announced attendees at the Resort and Spa Meeting impossible. This appears to have been deliberate. Several proposed attendees (see section 3 below for further details) announced plans to attend in Niagara-on-the-Lake to observe the public portions of the Resort and Spa Meeting (they had also wanted to provide public delegations to the Steering Committee on Equity, Diversity and Inclusion matters, but had been denied by the Clerk). They announced plans to travel together via public transit, via GO, and the first bus put them there before 9am but not before 8:30am.

As such, the improper timing of the Resort and Spa Meeting served to deny access, and therefore close, the Resort and Spa Meeting to the public.

3. PHYSICAL DENIAL OF ACCESS TO THE RESORT AND SPA MEETING

Several persons attempted to attend the public portions of the Resort and Spa Meeting nevertheless. These included Deanna Allain and Eric Gillis, who spoke about their denial of access in several public interviews. They took public transit as discussed above, and arrived at approximately 9:00am. I can provide contact information for them and link you to those public statements. They were ordered to produce invitations to the Resort and Spa Meeting, according to those public statements. When they could not produce invitations, they were physically ejected from White Oaks Conference Resort and Spa.

The Procedural By-Law, section 8.4, contains a requirement that Council make an announcement to "provide members of the public and the media time to return to the meeting room" when they return from closed session for more than 30 minutes. I submit that this was not done at the Resort and Spa Meeting, and the physical denial of access to White Oaks Conference Resort and Spa would have made such a "return" a mockery in any case.

The physical denial of access to members of the public to the Resort and Spa Meeting, I submit, violates section 239 of the Municipal Act.

4. DENIAL OF DELEGATION RIGHTS

Members of the public submitted delegation requests in a timely manner to the Steering Committee but were rebuffed. I note public statements by multiple individuals and I will provide these to you.

PARTICULAR CONCERN RE DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

I have particular concerns about the public having been entirely excluded from the Declarations of Interest public portions of this meeting. The need for clean government in the hiring of a top executive is critical. We have seen recent examples from the Regional Municipality of Niagara of the danger to the public that happens when there is a lack of transparency and cleanliness in the hiring of municipal chief executives. I have grave concerns over the probity of allowing a public meeting of this sort to take place without the discussion of Declarations of Interest being observed. I urge the Ombudsman, as part of this investigation, to please review the recording of the public portions of this meeting to ensure that the recorded minutes of the Declarations of Interest match the actual discussions that took place amongst the members of the Committee about this item. For such matters to be discussed in secret only is a fundamental erosion of the standards of probity we expect in Canadian public life.

We do not know why there was a need for such furious secrecy of the open, public portions of the Resort and Spa Meeting. But there was, and my gravest concerns are for its probity.

Hello City Clerk, Mr. Mayor, and Members of City Council,

Please find attached the written form of my delegation which the City of Hamilton City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee declined to hear this past Saturday, February 9th, 2019. I am formally submitting this email and attached document as correspondence for the upcoming City Council meeting on Wednesday, February 13th.

Thank you, Deanna Allain Hello Mr. Mayor and members of Council,

My name is Deanna Allain, I am a lifelong Hamiltonian and passionate member of many communities across our city, particularly around my home on the mountain. I am a strong advocate for many things, including transit, poverty reduction, and affordable housing, but today I am not here to discuss these things.

I am here today, at White Oaks Resort and Spa in Niagara-on-the-Lake, or I was before we were denied access, to speak about accountability, transparency, accessibility, and democratic principle respecting the recruitment and hiring process of our next City Manager.

First and foremost, I would like to reiterate that my attendance, in addition to the attendance of fellow advocates here today, bears no threat to the in camera and confidential elements of today's meeting, and is not intended to in any way disrupt the processes of a formal public meeting. I travelled to Niagara-on-the-Lake today with the intention of attending all public elements of this public meeting, and I did seek approval to speak before you all today in the form of a delegation, which was declined.

I do have several concerns to raise with you about the decisions made respecting this meeting being organized.

Why is Hamilton City Council holding a public meeting outside of the boundaries of the City of Hamilton, 66 kilometres away from City Hall itself? Were council chambers, community centres, public and private spaces all booked? As a committee, are you all comfortable with the expenses of this room rental, mileage, food, potentially overnight accommodations, and staff pay being covered by the City of Hamilton?

I would also like to bring to your attention that this meeting was impossible to arrive to on time using public transit. When taking the earliest possible buses this morning, I arrived within walking distance of this building at 9:00am. The morning of Friday, February 8th, the City of Hamilton changed this committee meeting start time to 8:30am, meaning I would not be able to help arriving well over 30 minutes late to this meeting. Recognizing that the public elements of this meeting are expected to be only when the meeting is called to order and when it is adjourned, this meant that I knew I would be arriving to this meeting when it was already in camera. It is incredibly disappointing, not only that the timing of the meeting made it impossible to arrive on time using transit, but also that the City of Hamilton changed the listed start time of this meeting from 9:00am to 8:30am without publicly notifying residents of the change, and only made this change less than 48 hours before the meeting would begin.

I would like to further call to your attention that this committee was formed in the last term of Council, but did not hire a new City Manager prior to the election. This resulted in a committee comprised of only incumbents making decisions on who Hamilton's next City Manager would be in this new term of Council with newly elected representatives. Councillor Nann put forth a motion calling for the hiring process to be halted, which members of Council voted down, and Councillor Wilson has a motion being brought forward at the upcoming City Council meeting. Councillor Wilson's motion calls for a redefinition of the recruitment procedure, calls for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion lenses to be used throughout the process, and that the committee be reformed to reflect "not less than 50% of those elected members who identify as females along with not less than one-third of the newly elected members of City Council."

I wholeheartedly support the efforts made by Councillors Nann, Wilson, and Danko to pause the hiring process briefly. I urge all of Council to support Councillor Wilson's motion being presented to ensure that our newly elected council uphold and maintain the integrity, transparency, and accountability needed to successfully complete this hiring process in the best interest of our city.

I was born and raised in Hamilton, and am now in my first year attending McMaster University. The decisions made by our members of Hamilton City Council, especially this decision on how the hiring process will occur, is going to impact myself and many others for decades to come. Now more than ever it is essential to engage in such important processes with upmost focus on upholding accountability and democratic practices. This can be achieved by ensuring all public meetings are as accessible to the public as possible, and that a call for public delegations like these occur so that you may hear directly from concerned citizens what we feel needs to be changed in this hiring practice.

I am deeply disappointed that this delegation could not be spoken in front of the City of Hamilton City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee Meeting. My statement today will be submitted formally as correspondence for the upcoming Council meeting. I trust that although the committee did not want to hear from myself or other advocates here today, that the message we send by being here today will speak for itself.

I thank Councillor Brad Clark for reaching out to me on February 11, 2019 regarding this matter. I understand the next city council meeting is on February 13, 2019 at 5 pm and I am hoping Councillor Clark can bring this letter to your attention at that meeting. I am writing this letter to express my concerns regarding the recent release of information regarding the state of friction of the Red Hill Valley Parkway that was described in a report that was completed in 2013 by Tradewind Scientific.

I am one of the families affected by the Parkway in that I lost my daughter, Olivia Smosarski, in a crossover accident on May 5, 2015. This accident has been well described by the media over the past years and I have always felt perplexed by the cause of it. To this day my family does not have any answers on why the car my daughter was a passenger in lost control that night. The Hamilton Police accident reconstruction team stated the car Olivia was in skidded across the Parkway as if "on ice". My family has always felt that there was something inherently wrong with the surface of the Parkway. This has been echoed by numerous families over the years initiated by reports of numerous accidents on the Parkway.

I am sure you can imagine my surprise and anger to hear that there was information pertaining to the surface of the Parkway 18 months before the passing of my daughter. I do not understand why this report was not brought to the knowledge of the public and yourselves for so many years. It is extremely disconcerting and shakes the foundation of belief and trust in our municipal government. Perhaps if this information was released something could have been done to decrease the number of tragedies that have occurred on the Parkway including the loss of my daughter.

As such I am advocating for a judicial review of the process that led to the delay in the release of the Tradewind Scientific report. I am sure I am supported by many in that I have lost faith in our municipal government. The public deserves to have answers. The answers need to be delivered by an arms length process that has the power to affect

change and to restore trust and faith in our municipal government. For that reason I am






PROPOSED CLOSURE OF WETENHALL COURT AND PORTION OF AEROPARK BOULEVARD

 - (iii) Prior to passage of the proposed legislation, provide additional information on the prescribed information and prescribed criteria which must accompany a request to use an open-for-business by-law, which is currently referenced in the draft Regulation but without details.

- (d) That the City of Hamilton requests that, when the Province proposes new regulations, the full text be provided to allow for meaningful review and comment.
- (e) That Report PED19027 be forwarded to the Province. This Report, including Appendices "A" and "B" to Report PED19027, is considered the City of Hamilton's formal comments on ERO Postings 013-4125, 013-4239, and 013-4293.

The following Motion was DEFEATED:

(i) Ranked Balloting for Municipal Elections (Item 11.1)

WHEREAS, ranked ballot elections have been successfully used in Canadian elections, as with the London Ontario 2018 municipal election, and leadership races for Provincial and Federal parties;

WHEREAS, ranked ballot elections are in use globally at various levels of government in Australia, India, Ireland, Malta, New Zealand, Northern Ireland, Pakistan, Republic of Ireland, Scotland, Sri Lanka, United Kingdom, United States of America, and Nepal;

WHEREAS, the candidate with the broadest support and the most votes will win, and a candidate who is opposed by a majority of voters cannot win in elections that use ranked ballots;

WHEREAS, ranked ballot elections eliminate "vote splitting"; wherein two or more candidates with similar platforms "split" a finite base of support. With ranked ballot elections, voters are able to vote for who they want to win rather than voting strategically against who they want to lose;

WHEREAS, the ranking of candidates on the ballot ensures that votes are not "wasted", rather, if the voter's first choice is eliminated their vote will transfer to their second choice and so on until a winner is selected; and,

WHEREAS, a study done in Portland, Oregon after implementation of ranked ballots in 2011 found that voters were not confused by a ranked ballot; 94% of voters said that they "Fully Understood" the ballot design and instructions.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That the appropriate staff report back to General Issues Committee on the feasibility of adopting ranked ballots (including all associated costs) for future Hamilton Municipal Elections, beginning in 2022, with that report include an assessment of the City of London's postelection report, when available, and,
- (b) That the report, respecting the feasibility of adopting ranked ballots, be posted on the City's web site 30 days prior to being considered by the General Issues Committee to allow for a 30-day written comment period.

The following Motion was DEFEATED:

WHEREAS, a Terms of Reference was never established for the City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee;

WHEREAS, the 2014-2018 Council pre-determined the composition of the City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee set from a practice established in 2008;

WHEREAS, the composition was set to be made up of the Mayor and Chairs of Standing Committees;

WHEREAS, for no reason other than tradition, the chairs of standing committees are exclusively incumbent Councillors;

WHEREAS, best practices for achieving inclusive excellence in recruitment, selection and hiring are rooted in Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) frameworks;

WHEREAS, the 2018-2022 Council is made up of 47% women, less than 7% racialized people, and 33% new representatives who did not serve on the previous term of council;

WHEREAS, the Committee ought to more accurately reflect both the composition of this term of Council and the demographic makeup of the city's residents;

WHEREAS, recent studies show that of 12 of 15 Canadian municipalities, which recently hired for such a position, the composition of the recruitment steering committee was not restricted to the chairs of standing committees;

WHEREAS, the other 3 municipalities explicitly allow interested new Councillors to participate and some also include optional community members and residents;

WHEREAS, the City of Hamilton's Procedural By-law imposes no restriction on which Councillors are eligible to participate in the selection process;

WHEREAS, under the *Municipal Act* all elected members of Council enjoy the same rights and privileges;

WHEREAS, the General Issues Committee approved public delegations on the Establishment of a New Steering Committee for the Recruitment of

the City Manager to be heard at the General Issues Committee on February 6, 2019;

WHEREAS, the public calendar of Council and Committees shows the current Steering Committee is scheduled to begin meeting on February 1, 2019;

WHEREAS, the date of public delegation is five days after the first publicly posted Steering Committee meeting; and,

WHEREAS, the input received through public delegations and Council's vote may influence the direction and makeup of the Steering Committee;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That all scheduled meeting dates for the City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee be postponed until public delegations have been received and the Council has voted on and ratified a decision on the composition and direction of the City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee.

Red Hill Valley Parkway Safety

WHEREAS in January 2013, Council directed staff to investigate lighting and improved signs/lane markings for the Red Hill Valley Parkway (RHVP) near Mud/Stone Church, and costing/alternatives for consideration;

WHEREAS, in April 2013, Golders & Associates was hired to complete a six-year condition assessment on the RHVP, a subsequent second phase of study was completed by Golder & Associated (Tradewind Scientific) which was primarily focused on friction testing;

WHEREAS, the report covering the first phase of work by Golders & Associates in April 2013 was not shared publicly or with Council at the time;

WHEREAS in November 2013 Council received information from staff regarding the 2013 safety audit from CIMA which made recommendations on changes to signage, pavement markings, installation of cat eyes and friction testing;

WHEREAS, in May 2015, Council received information from staff regarding the 2013 safety audit from CIMA and progress made on safety improvements, and directed staff to investigate additional safety measures for the RHVP and the Lincoln Alexander Parkway, (Linc), such as additional guardrails, lighting, lane markings or other means to help prevent further fatalities and serious injuries;

WHEREAS, in November 2015, Council directed staff to report on total costs and feasibility of expanding the Linc and RHVP to six lanes;

WHEREAS, in December 2015, Council received information from staff regarding the 2015 safety audit from CIMA which made recommendations on short, medium and long-term safety improvements for the Linc and RHVP, and Council directed staff to seek out provincial approval from the Ministry of Transportation to allow the City of Hamilton to implement photo radar on the Linc and RHVP, and to report back on the costs and processes of investigating an improved lighting system on the RHVP and Linc;

WHEREAS, in September 2016, Council received information related to lighting which recommended further investigation, and directed staff to undertake a lighting study on the RHVP:

WHEREAS, in October 2016, Council received information regarding the need to study options before expanding the RHVP and Linc, and the need for an environmental assessment and connection issues with the 403 and Queen Elizabeth way (QEW);

WHEREAS, in February 2017, Council directed staff to consult with Hamilton Police Services to bring forward an annual collision report summarizing collisions on Linc and RHVP, and requested an update on costs and implications of installing barriers;

WHEREAS, in August 2017, Council directed staff to undertake speed limit reduction feasibility study for both Linc and RHVP;

WHEREAS, in December 2017 Golders & Associates was hired to evaluate the surface skid resistance of the Red Hill Valley Parkway and the report was not shared publicly or with Council at the time;

WHEREAS, in January 2018, Council received an update on the 2015 safety audit from CIMA and directed staff to implement short and medium term collision counter measures, undertake a detailed annual collision analysis on both the Linc and RHVP, to request Hamilton Police Services to undertake regular speed and aggressive driving enforcement on the Linc and RHVP, to undertake an annual traffic count, to install median barriers as part of any future widening, and to report back with an update on overall operating conditions on the Linc and RHVP with a focus on Ministry of Transportation (MTO) activities for widening, truck activity, safety and information needed for widening;

WHEREAS, in July 2018, Golders & Associates was hired to complete an assessment of whether or not hot in place recycling can be used on the Red Hill Valley Parkway and the report was not shared publicly or with Council at the time;

WHEREAS, in October 2018, CIMA was hired to complete a roadside safety assessment on the RHVP to assess roadside safety infrastructure such as guiderails, shoulders, and speed enforcement areas and the report was not shared publicly or with Council at the time:

WHEREAS, in February 2019, CIMA was hired to complete a review of safety on the RHVP alongside the pavement friction testing results from the 2013 Tradewind Scientific Report, and this report was shared publicly; and

WHEREAS, staff have reported to Council that all actions items arising from the CIMA review of safety on the RHVP have been, or are in the process of being actioned.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That the 2015 and subsequent 2018 safety analysis of the RHVP and Linc, by the external engineering firm CIMA, be made public;
- (b) That the City, in coordination with Hamilton Police Services, prepare a public education campaign that addresses the recommendations from the external expert engineers (CIMA) as it relates to the risks of speeding in excess of posted limits and distracted driving on the RHVP and Linc;
- (c) That City staff report back to Council on the feasibility of requesting that the Provincial Auditor General undertake an independent investigation of issues surrounding the reporting of friction on the Red Hill Valley Parkway.

RE: Dedicated Gas Tax Funds for Public Transportation Program

This Letter of Agreement between the **City of Hamilton** (the "Municipality") and Her Majesty the Queen in right of the Province of Ontario, as represented by the Minister of Transportation for the Province of Ontario, (the "Ministry"), sets out the terms and conditions for the provision and use of dedicated gas tax funds under the Dedicated Gas Tax Funds for Public Transportation Program (the "Program"). Under the Program, the Province of Ontario provides two cents out of the provincial gas tax to municipalities to improve Ontario's transportation network and support economic development in communities for public transportation expenditures.

The Ministry intends to provide dedicated gas tax funds to the Municipality in accordance with the terms and conditions set out in this Letter of Agreement and the enclosed Dedicated Gas Tax Funds for Public Transportation Program 2018/19 Guidelines and Requirements (the "guidelines and requirements").

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained in this Letter of Agreement and the guidelines and requirements, which the Municipality has reviewed and understands and are hereby incorporated by reference, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are expressly acknowledged, the Ministry and the Municipality agree as follows:

67. To support local public transportation services in the Municipality, the Ministry agrees to provide funding to the Municipality under the Program to a maximum amount of up to \$11,405,923 ("the "Maximum Funds") in accordance with, and subject to, the terms set out in this Letter of Agreement and, for greater clarity, the guidelines and requirements.

- 68. Subject to Section 1, the Ministry will, upon receipt of a fully signed copy of this Letter of Agreement and a certified copy of the authorizing municipal by-law(s) and, if applicable, resolution(s) for the Municipality to enter into this Letter of Agreement, provide the Municipality with \$8,554,442; and any remaining payment(s) will be provided thereafter.
- 3. If another municipality authorizes the Municipality to provide local public transportation services on its behalf and authorizes the Municipality to request and receive dedicated gas tax funds for those services also on its behalf, the Municipality will in the by-law(s) and, if applicable, resolution(s) described in section 2 confirm that the Municipality has the authority to provide those services and request and receive those funds.
- 4. The Municipality agrees that any amount payable under this Letter of Agreement may be subject, at the Ministry's sole discretion, to any other adjustments as set out in the guidelines and requirements.
- The Municipality will deposit the funds received under this Letter of Agreement in a
 dedicated gas tax funds reserve account, and use such funds and any related
 interest only in accordance with the guidelines and requirements.
- The Municipality will adhere to the reporting and accountability measures set out in the guidelines and requirements, and will provide all requested documents to the Ministry.
- 7. The Municipality agrees that the funding provided to the Municipality pursuant to this Letter of Agreement represents the full extent of the financial contribution from the Ministry and the Province of Ontario under the Program for the 2018/19 Program year.
- 8. The Ministry may terminate this Letter of Agreement at any time, without liability, penalty or costs upon giving at least thirty (30) days written notice to the Municipality. If the Ministry terminates this Letter of Agreement, the Ministry may take one or more of the following actions: (a) cancel all further payments of dedicated gas tax funds; (b) demand the payment of any dedicated gas tax funds remaining in the possession or under the control of the Municipality; and (c) determine the reasonable costs for the Municipality to terminate any binding agreement(s) for the acquisition of eligible public transportation services acquired, or to be acquired, with dedicated gas tax funds provided under this Letter of Agreement, and do either or both of the following: (i) permit the Municipality to offset such costs against the amount the Municipality owes pursuant to paragraph 8(b); and (ii) subject to section 1, provide the Municipality with funding to cover, in whole or in part, such costs. The funding may be provided only if there is an appropriation for this purpose, and in no event will the funding result in the Maximum Funding exceeding the amount specified under Section 1.

- Any provisions which by their nature are intended to survive the termination or expiration of this Letter of Agreement including, without limitation, those related to disposition, accountability, records, audit, inspection, reporting, communication, liability, indemnity, and rights and remedies will survive its termination or expiration.
- 10. This Letter of Agreement may only be amended by a written agreement duly executed by the Ministry and the Municipality.
- 11. The Municipality agrees that it will not assign any of its rights or obligations, or both, under this Letter of Agreement.
- 12. The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of this Letter of Agreement will not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision of this Letter of Agreement. Any invalid or unenforceable provision will be deemed to be severed.
- 13. The term of this Letter of Agreement will commence on the date of the last signature of this Letter of Agreement.
- 14. The Municipality hereby consents to the execution by the Ministry of this Letter of Agreement by means of an electronic signature.



- 2. That By-law No. 15-176, as amended by By-law No. 18-104, be amended by adding a new Subsection 9.13 as follows:
 - "9.13 Buildings or structures subject to the following:
 - 9.13.1 any new single detached dwelling, duplex dwelling, and semi-detached dwelling;

- 9.13.2 an addition or alteration to an existing dwelling, if the ground floor area of the addition is greater than or equal to 50 percent of the ground floor area of the existing dwelling. For the purpose of this By-law, ground floor area shall include the area covered by ground floor balconies, porches, and stairs;
- 9.13.3 accessory buildings or structures, if greater than or equal to 40 square metres ground floor area; and,
- 9.13.4 on lots with a maximum lot coverage of 35 percent, an addition and / or accessory building or structure that results in a lot coverage that exceeds 35 percent."


