# 3.1 Celebrating Cable 14's 50th Broadcast Season

Mayor Eisenberger on behalf of City Council recognized the outstanding contributions to the City of Hamilton made by Cable 14, its management, staff, volunteers and its shareholders, Cogeco and Rogers. This Fall marks the beginning of Cable 14's 50th broadcast season.

Cable 14 began in 1970 as Cable 8, which changed to Cable 4 before finally settling in as Cable 14 where it has been for the past 33 years. In the past 50 years, Cable 14 has delivered thousands of hours of local television programming to the residents of Hamilton through the efforts of its staff, volunteers and Community Producers.

Cable 14 is the only local Community Channel with its own Community Programming Network license from the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC). It is that uniqueness that allows Cable 14 to operate as an independent specialty channel focused exclusively on serving the residents of Hamilton.

#### Greetings,

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) is proposing legislative changes to seven statutes and to make a new regulation under the *Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act*. The legislative changes are part of the proposed *Better for People, Smarter for Business Act, 2019*. If passed, these changes are intended to support the government's commitment to reduce unnecessary red tape and regulatory burden and modernize government to be simpler, faster and more cost-effective, while ensuring the sustainable use of natural resources and public health and safety are not compromised.

A proposal to amend the following three Acts and propose a new regulation is posted on the Environmental Registry.

- 1. Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994
- 2. Oil, Gas and Salt Resources Act
- Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act and new Minister's regulation under the Act

The proposed amendments and new regulation are described below:

- Proposed amendments to the Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994, would if passed:
  - Enable the issuance of a "permit" to allow a person to remove forest resources from a Crown forest for non-forestry purposes.
  - Modernize the requirements for annual work schedules by removing the requirement for MNRF approval.
  - Enable the Minister to extend a Forest Management Plan.

- Proposed amendments to the Oil, Gas and Salt Resources Act, would if passed:
  - o Allow future regulations to be made, where appropriate, to relieve existing activities from requirements that would apply to new activities.
  - Enable the use of a rules-in-regulation approach, or the mandatory issuance of approvals for more activities, subject to conditions and requirements that would be set out in regulation intended to streamline approvals for the specified activities.
  - Clarify the types of geological evaluation and testing activities captured by the definition of "well".
- Proposed amendments to the Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act, would if passed:
  - Create a new Minister's regulation-making authority in the Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act to allow the Minister to require some owners of electricityproducing dams to, where necessary, assess, monitor and report on methyl mercury related impacts to water and fish.
  - Amend an existing authority to incorporate guidelines by reference in the regulations.

#### Regulation Proposal

o If the proposed Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act legislative amendment is passed, the ministry proposes to develop a subsequent Minister's regulation that if made, would require some dam owners of electricity-producing dams to, where necessary, assess, monitor and report on mercury levels in surface water and/or fish tissue. We are also seeking comments on this proposed regulation via this notice.

Owners of the twelve existing dams that currently have mercury assessment, monitoring and reporting requirements established through Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks issued Permits to Take Water, would, if the regulation is made, continue these requirements under the authority of the Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act and reporting would be to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. Each of these twelve Permits to Take Water were subject to consultation prior to their issuance.

New or significantly redeveloped electricity-producing dams may, if the regulation is made, require assessment, monitoring and reporting of mercury, where there is a new or expanded head pond area and/or where there are identified risks associated with human consumption of fish.

The Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks is concurrently consulting on a proposal to amend the Ontario Water Resources Act Permit to Take Water requirements for electricity-producing facilities. In addition, there are other administrative and housekeeping changes proposed for the *Crown Forest Sustainability Act, 1994* and the *Oil, Gas and Salt Resources Act.*

Thank you for your letter about conservation authorities (CAs).

CAs have a role in protecting residents and property from flooding and other natural hazards.

Over the years, CAs have expanded their roles and responsibilities into activities such as ziplining, maple syrup festivals, and photography and wedding permits. Due to the potential for more extreme weather events that could threaten our homes, businesses and infrastructure, it is important that CAs refocus on delivering their core mandate. At the same time, we must ensure we are using taxpayer dollars more efficiently.

Accordingly, our government passed Bill 108, *More Homes, More Choice Act, 2019*, which received Royal Assent on June 6, 2019. Our government will modernize the *Conservation Authorities Act* by clarifying the core mandate of CAs, updating how they use municipal levies and fees to pay for programs and services, and streamlining the role CAs play in municipal planning to make approvals faster and less costly. Our aim is to ensure that we improve overall governance, oversight and accountability of CAs.

We are giving municipalities greater control and the ability to enter into agreements with CAs to fund any programs and services outside of the core mandate, if they choose.

As I made clear in my August 16, 2019 letter to CAs, I will be reviewing all of the relevant legislation and regulations that govern Ontario's CAs with an eye to focusing their efforts on their core mandate.

Bringing CAs back to their core mandate will allow for municipalities to better manage CA budgets and programs. The legislative changes we have made ensure CAs focus on delivering core services and programs that protect communities from natural hazards and flooding while using taxpayer dollars efficiently and effectively.

We have already begun consultations with conservation authorities and will continue to engage with municipalities, indigenous communities, and other interested parties that are involved with the stewardship of our lands to discuss how we best focus on core mandate.

### **Key Facts**

- The purpose of this report is to outline the action and resources involved for Niagara Region to join the Coalition of Inclusive Municipalities, in response to the motion of Council (COM 14-2019) on May 16, 2019.
- In 2017, there were 21 hate crimes reported to police in Niagara, which was an increase from 11 in 2016. In London there were 26, Windsor had 19, Hamilton had 91 and was the second highest rate per 100,000 in Canada. In Canada the majority of hate crimes are motivated by race or ethnicity (45%), religion (35%), sexual orientation (11%).
- The population of Niagara is growing, as is the diversity of those coming to Niagara. According to the 2016 census, 8.9% of people in Niagara are a visible minority (38,810 individuals), up from 7.0% in 2011. There are 18,625 people (4.3%) in Niagara with North American Indigenous origins (First Nations, Inuit, or Métis). In 2011, there were 14,720 people (3.8%) with North American Indigenous origins.
- Recognizing the importance of attracting and retaining a diverse workforce for achieving economic prosperity, a Global Attractiveness project was undertaken under the previous Council Strategic Plan. The 2017 report outlined actions associated with three objectives (see Appendix 1):
  - Supporting community readiness
  - Marketing to migrants
  - Supporting retention programs

- A strategic marketing manager has been hired to address one of the objectives, however, work has not yet been able to progress for the other two objectives absent dedicated resources.
- There are 77 municipalities across Canada that have joined CIM, with 20 in Ontario, including City of Hamilton, City of London, and City of Windsor.
- Other municipalities that have supported CIM have resourced at least one FTE for developing and implementing an action plan, and/or up to one FTE support for advisory committees.

#### **Financial Considerations**

Based on the experiences of other municipalities in Canada, providing dedicated resources is crucial to realize Council-led action pursuant to joining CIM.

Dedicated resources are recommended for a two-year period in order to fulfill the requirements of joining the CIM. The annual operating impact is estimated at \$144,000, which includes one temporary non-union FTE dedicated for the duration of the project, student support, and funds for training, conferences, mileage and community engagement. We estimate a total project cost of \$288,000 over two years. If the recommendations in this report are approved, a business case will be submitted for consideration through the 2020 budget approval process. The financial implication of these resources would be equivalent to 0.04% of the levy.

This potential financial implication should be considered in context of new budget commitments previously endorsed by Council and new budget pressures outlined by staff, as summarized in the following table presented to Budget Review Committee to illustrate the potential levy impact estimated for the 2020 budget.

#### **Analysis**

#### Background

The Niagara Region Global Attractiveness Committee Report was submitted in February 2017, written by external consultants, Sarah Wayland and Huyen Dam, in conjunction with the internal Niagara Region Global Attractiveness Committee. The report outlined current immigration patterns, the attraction and retention factors in Niagara, and an action plan with three objectives:

- To support community readiness to be a welcoming region through engagement and fostering collaboration with key stakeholders using tailored information and data.
- 2. To improve Niagara's existing marketing and migrant/immigrant focused literature and create new marketing to attract primary and secondary migration from within Canada and internationally.
- 3. To support further implementation of concrete programs that will retain immigrants and international students.

The objectives were supported by six tactics, and short, medium, and long term actions (see Appendix 1). A Strategic Marketing Manager was hired to address the second objective, however, work has not yet progressed on the other two objectives due to a lack of dedicated resources. Although these objectives focus on Niagara being a welcoming community, able to retain immigrants, it was not focused specifically on addressing discrimination and racism as in the CIM ten common commitments.

The Canadian Coalition Against Racism and Discrimination (CCMARD) was launched in 2004 as part of the International Coalition of Inclusive and Sustainable Cities (ICCAR) supported by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The name changed to Coalition of Inclusive Municipalities in 2019. Joining the Coalition and working actively towards the 10 commitments is beneficial for municipalities to be able to build respectful, inclusive and diverse societies, for the whole region, and specifically for newcomers, immigrants, refugees, Indigenous peoples, visible minorities, people with disabilities, and the LGBTQ2S+ community.

Additional benefits of joining CIM include access to a network of municipalities across the world to share best practices and resources, strengthening community partnerships,

involving diverse community stakeholders to understand their realities, and working together to form an Action Plan. Joining CIM can lead to increased accountability to citizens around issues of racism and discrimination, and increased trust, loyalty and respect towards the municipality, as the government works towards equity, inclusion, and appreciation of diversity in the community.

Creating an inclusive and diverse workforce and municipality leads to greater economic innovation and increased profitability. A 2018 report by McKinsey & Company called *Delivering through Diversity* described research conducted with 1,000 companies in 12 countries. The research found that companies in the top-quartile for gender diversity on executive teams were 21% more likely to outperform on profitability and 27% more likely to have superior value creation. Companies in the top-quartile for ethnic/cultural diversity on executive teams were 33% more likely to have industry-leading profitability.

Focus groups and interviews with community partners and residents of Niagara conducted while developing the Public Health & Emergency Services Health Equity Strategic Plan found that discrimination based on race, gender, religion, sexuality, and other characteristics is experienced by people in multiple locations across the region. This results in negative health, social, and justice impacts for individuals and groups of people. These negative results include physical harm as well as social or emotional impacts. Studies have shown that when services have been withheld from people from certain populations due to stereotypes and misconceptions, has led to negative social and health outcomes and reluctance to access services when issues arise in the future. This applies not only for that individual, but for other family members as well. There is an over-representation of Indigenous peoples and visible minorities in many social services, including Family and Children's Services, the justice system, and in the homeless shelters.

#### Joining the Coalition

There are six steps to join the Coalition:

- 1. Prepare the case
- 2. Adopt a resolution to join
- 3. Sign the Declaration
- 4. Inform the Canadian Commission for UNESCO
- 5. Announce your involvement to local partners and residents
- 6. Agree to develop or adapt a unique plan of action

A summary of the ten Common Commitments grouped under three categories are listed in Appendix 2 with examples of current internal and external facing work from across the Regional departments and potential opportunities.

#### Other Municipal Action

There are 77 municipalities across Canada that have joined CIM, and 20 within Ontario. Here are some of the activities and resources of other similar municipalities.

Based on the learnings and experiences of other municipalities in Canada, we recommend dedicated personnel and operating costs. Personnel would coordinate the governance structures with internal and external stakeholders, and draft a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Action Plan.

Drafting the Action Plan would include conducting literature reviews, community engagement, and an environmental scan of best practices across Canada and internationally, as well as identifying needs, best practices, resources, and areas of focus for advancing a more inclusive Niagara that supports the ten CIM commitments.

#### Alternatives Reviewed

Staff considered waiting until the 2021 budget cycle to request dedicated resources for this initiative. This is not recommended as there are no staff that can be reassigned in the meantime to support the proposed governance structures. This alternative would result in the work towards the commitments and action plan to progress slower, with an action plan not being created until 2021-2022.

A second alternative considered was for potential FTE support through the Community Safety and Well-Being (CSWB) Plan. There is potential alignment between the CSWB Plan and the CIM recommendations for some aspects of the two projects, however, this would require the community consultations to identify diversity, equity, and/or inclusion as a key issue. This option is dependent on many variable factors, and does not offer committed support for CIM.

A third alternative considered was to hire a consultant to conduct research and draft an Action Plan. However, this would still require FTE support in directing the consultant, and would not be able to provide sustainable support to the internal Task Force or the Advisory Committee. A consultant would also not be able to develop and sustain quality internal and external stakeholder relationships that are important for this work.

A final alternative considered was leveraging existing resources by repurposing a current position. This option is not recommended, as there are no staff available for reallocation without significant impact on core Region operations or other strategic priorities.

# **Relationship to Council Strategic Priorities**

**Supporting Business and Economic Growth**, which works towards a coordinated approach to fostering economic growth in Niagara. Research has shown that culturally diverse regions are more innovative and economically prosperous.

**Healthy and Vibrant Community**, specifically with objective 2.1: Enhancing Community Wellbeing with the intended outcome to foster a safe and inclusive community. Council will contribute to creating a healthy and vibrant community through advancing the ten commitments, which include monitoring and taking action against racism and discrimination in the region, supporting people who experience racism and discrimination, as well as the police as they combat racism and discrimination.

**Sustainable and Engaging Government**, through committing to high quality, efficient, fiscally sustainable and coordinated services. Creating an inclusive, equitable, and diverse region will enhance Council's ability to provide customer focused services, demonstrates a value to continuous improvement, collaboration and innovation, and be inclusive through reaching and maximizing the assets of all members of the community.

I also believe, that whatever decision is made, the laneway should be looked at carefully. If one person is buying, I believe it only fair that if one person pays their portion of the laneway that the other residents follow suit.

We should rectify this issue of the laneway.

# 3. Proposed Permanent Closure and Sale of a Portion of Public Unassumed Alley Abutting 263 East 21<sup>st</sup> Street, Hamilton (PW19089) (Ward 7) (Item 8.5)

- (a) That the application of the owner of 263 East 21<sup>st</sup> Street, Hamilton, to permanently close and purchase a portion of the unassumed alleyway abutting the North side of 263 East 21<sup>st</sup> Street, Hamilton, ("Subject Lands"), as shown on Appendix "B" attached to Public Works Committee Report 19-015, be approved, subject to the following conditions:
  - (i) That the applicant makes an application to the Ontario Superior Court of Justice, under Section 88 of the Registry Act, for an order

to permanently close the Subject Lands, if required by the City, subject to:

- (1) The General Manager of Public Works, or designate, signing the appropriate documentation to obtain any required court order; and,
- (2) The documentation regarding any required application to the Ontario Superior Court of Justice being prepared by the applicant, to the satisfaction of the City Solicitor;
- (ii) That the applicant be fully responsible for the deposit of a reference plan in the proper land registry office, and that said plan be prepared by an Ontario Land Surveyor, to the satisfaction of the Manager, Geomatics and Corridor Management Section, and that the applicant also deposit a reproducible copy of said plan with the Manager, Geomatics and Corridor Management Section;
- (iii) That the applicant provide access to the City, upon confirmation of location, to trim any trees currently growing within the Subject Lands in accordance with the City of Hamilton By-Law 15-125 to Regulate Trees on or Affecting Public Property, to the satisfaction of the Ward Councillor;
- (iv) That the applicant within 1 year of the Subject Lands being officially transferred, be responsible for the full replacement of the existing fence abutting the Subject Lands and the properties known as 484-496 Brucedale Avenue East, to the satisfaction of the Ward Councillor; and,
- (v) That, subject to any required application to the Ontario Superior Court of Justice to permanently close the Subject Lands being approved:
  - (1) The City Solicitor be authorized and directed to prepare all necessary by-laws to permanently close and sell the alleyway, for enactment by Council;
  - (2) The Real Estate Section of the Planning and Economic Development Department be authorized and directed to enter into any requisite easement agreements necessary to affect the orderly disposition of the Subject Lands and to proceed to sell the closed alleyway to the owners of 263 East 21<sup>st</sup> Street, Hamilton, as described in Report PW19089, in accordance with the City of Hamilton Sale of Land Policy By-law 14-204;

- (3) The City Solicitor be authorized to complete the transfer of the Subject Lands to the owners of 263 East 21<sup>st</sup> Street, Hamilton, pursuant to an Agreement of Purchase and Sale or Offer to Purchase as negotiated by the Real Estate Section of the Planning and Economic Development Department;
- (4) The City Solicitor be authorized and directed to register a certified copy of the by-laws permanently closing and selling the alleyway in the proper land registry office; and,
- (5) The Public Works Department publish any required notice of the City's intention to pass the by-laws and/or permanently sell the closed alleyway pursuant to City of Hamilton Sale of Land Policy By-law 14-204.

### 4. Wastewater Treatment Plant Bypass and Combined Sewer Overflow Reporting (PW19091) (City Wide) (Item 9.1)

- (a) That staff be directed to conduct a formal engineering study to analyse the unmonitored combined sewer overflow locations and assess the feasibility and budget estimates for monitoring installations, and that staff report back to the Public Works Committee no later than June 1, 2020 with an interim Information Report and no later than December 31, 2020 with the results of the study;

WHEREAS, these products create issues in municipal water/wastewater treatment systems because they do not breakdown;

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the Federal and Provincial Governments initiate legislation to require the makers of "flushable" products to indicate that these products are "not flushable".

### 6. Functional Traffic Study for Kenilworth Avenue from Main Street to Barton Street (PW17032(a)) (Ward 4) (Item 10.1)

- (a) That the proposed capital project for Kenilworth Avenue from Main Street to Barton Street be brought forward for consideration in the annual capital project programming process, to permit construction of Phase 1 (Britannia Avenue to Roxborough Avenue) and Phase 3 (Roxborough Avenue to Main Street) in 2027 or upon the completion of LRT;
- (b) That the design and construction of Phase 2 (Barton Street to Brittania Avenue) commence in 2020 and be completed in 2021, to be funded from the Ward 4 Area Rating Reserve Fund (108054) in an amount not to exceed \$300,000; and,
- (c) That the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized and directed to execute any required agreement(s) and ancillary documents, with such terms and conditions in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

#### 7. Gage Park Accessible Swing Addition (Ward 3) (Item 11.1)

WHEREAS, Gage Park is an active City-wide park in Ward 3, with recreational amenities supporting the community:

WHEREAS, a community minded and engaged resident initiated a fundraising program to support the addition of an independent swing for children and adults in wheelchairs at the westerly play area of Gage Park; and,

WHEREAS, the addition of this new amenity would also require site preparation and rubber surfacing;

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

(a) That Environmental Services Division staff be directed to initiate the implementation of a new wheelchair swing at the Gage Park westerly play area, including site preparation, rubber surfacing and swing, with an upset limit of \$50,000, to be funded from the Ward 3 Area Rating Reserve Account 108053;

- (b) That money received by the City from the citizen-led fundraising program for the implementation of a new wheelchair swing at the Gage Park westerly play area, be placed in the Ward 3 Area Rating Reserve Account 108053 to offset the costs of the project; and,
- (c) That the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized and directed to execute any required agreement(s) and ancillary documents for the implementation of a new wheelchair swing at the Gage Park westerly play area, with such terms and conditions in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

#### 8. RA Riddell School and Gilkson Park Improvements (Ward 14) (Item 11.2)

WHEREAS, an existing basketball court located on Hamilton Wentworth School Board (HWDSB) lands at 200 Cranbrook Drive (RA Riddell School), adjacent to Gilkson Park, provides active use for the Gilkson community residents;

WHEREAS, the basketball court was constructed and maintained by the City of Hamilton on HWDSB lands in 1994;

WHEREAS, the basketball court is beyond its lifecycle and the community and park users would benefit from the replacement of this amenity; and,

WHEREAS, the community and park users would also benefit from a pathway connection from the play structure to the basketball court;

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That the existing basketball court located at 200 Cranbrook Drive, adjacent to Gilkson Park, be replaced with a new standard multi-use court and new park pathway, at a cost of \$120,000, to be funded from the Ward 14 Area Rating Account #108064; and,
- (b) That the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized and directed to execute any required agreement(s) and ancillary documents for the replacement of the existing basketball court located at 200 Cranbrook Drive with a new standard multi-use court and new park pathway, with such terms and conditions in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

### 9. Investigation of the Installation of a Traffic Signal at the Intersection of Beach Boulevard and Eastport Drive (Ward 5) (Item 11.3)

WHEREAS, Hamilton Beach Neighbourhood residents have noticed an increase in the volume and speed of vehicles travelling along Eastport Drive;

WHEREAS, Eastport Drive is the alternative route to the Queen Elizabeth Way during service interruptions on the QEW;

WHEREAS, Eastport Drive can become quite congested during full or partial closures on the QEW, creating an unsafe condition for motorists attempting to turn in or out of the Beach neighbourhood;

WHEREAS, residents have requested the installation of a traffic signal at the aforementioned intersection to assist with safe access in and out of their neighbourhood; and,

WHEREAS, Eastport Drive is maintained by the Province of Ontario;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the City of Hamilton request the Ministry of Transportation to investigate the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Beach Boulevard and Eastport Drive.

### 10. Mohawk Sports Park Ball Diamond Lighting Improvements (Ward 6) (Item 11.4)

WHEREAS, ball diamond #3, located in Mohawk Sports Park is consistently booked by user groups such as, the Cardinals Association; and,

WHEREAS, ball diamond #3 would benefit from the installation of sport lighting to extend the duration of playable time for user groups;

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That staff be directed to convert existing traffic islands to floral traffic islands for beautification at the intersections of Upper Gage Avenue and Stone Church Road East, Upper Ottawa Street and Unsworth Drive, and Dartnall Road and Stone Church Road East, at a cost of \$126,317, to be funded from the Ward 6 Area Rating Reserve (108056);
- (b) That \$18,755 for the annual planting, irrigation and maintenance of the traffic islands at the intersections of Upper Gage Avenue and Stone Church Road East, Upper Ottawa Street and Unsworth Drive, and Dartnall Road and Stone Church Road East be included in the Public Works Department's 2020 annual base operating budget; and,
- (c) That the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized and directed to execute any required agreement(s) and ancillary documents for the beautification of the traffic islands at the intersections of Upper Gage Avenue and Stone Church Road East, Upper Ottawa Street and Unsworth Drive, and Dartnall Road and Stone Church Road East, with such terms and conditions in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

### 12. Replacement of Deficient Portions of Pathways and the Multi-Use Court Within Father Sean O'Sullivan Memorial Park (Ward 5) (Item 11.6)

WHEREAS, portions of the pathways through Father Sean O'Sullivan Memorial Park were recently assessed and determined to be in fair to poor condition; and,

- (b) That \$26,400 for the annual planting, irrigation and maintenance of the T.B. (i) Modification of the Waste Collection Services Request for Proposal to Include Options for Bi-Weekly Collection of Landfill Waste (City Wide) (Added Item 12.1)

WHEREAS, in September 2019 City staff reported that the successful Request for Proposal for the Operations and Maintenance of the Material Recycling Facility would result in a net annual increase in cost of \$2.697 million for a total increase in cost to taxpayers of \$13.485 million over the five-year contract term;

WHEREAS, Hamilton taxpayers are facing significant municipal property tax increases in the following years and Council is dedicated to identifying savings and efficiencies in waste management;

WHEREAS, in October 2019 the Regional Municipality of Niagara approved changing from weekly collection of one container of landfill waste to bi-weekly collection of two containers of landfill waste;

WHEREAS, nine comparable municipalities including Halton, Waterloo and Ottawa all have bi-weekly collection of landfill waste which has resulted in significant improvements to diversion from landfills;

WHEREAS, the City of Hamilton has a landfill waste diversion goal of 65%:

WHEREAS, the City of Hamilton currently has a landfill waste diversion rate between 40% to 50% which has remained stagnant over the last several years;

WHEREAS, it is estimated that bi-weekly landfill waste collection will improve diversion rates and for every 5% of landfill waste diverted, the life of the Glanbrook Landfill would be extended by another four years resulting in an estimated value to taxpayers of \$63 million in landfill space;

WHEREAS, in January 2012 City staff recommended bi-weekly collection of landfill waste as the preferred option for the 2013 to 2020 waste collection service contract with an estimated savings of approximately \$3 million annually over the collection period of 2013 to 2020;

WHEREAS, in April 2017 the previous term of Council directed staff to "investigate opportunities for various alternative service delivery methods for the City's waste collection programs for Council's consideration, while retaining the current public/private service delivery model, the weekly collection service and the garbage collection days…";

WHEREAS, City Staff executed a contractual one-year extension to the 2013 to 2020 waste collection service contract in order to evaluate impacts of the Waste Free Ontario Act, Extended Producer Responsibility; and,

WHEREAS, City staff are currently preparing a Request for Proposals for waste collection services including the weekly collection of landfill waste, bulk waste, yard waste, organic waste and front-end bin service garbage collection for the term of 2021-2028, and weekly collection of recyclables for the term of 2021 to 2025 to align with the Waste Free Ontario Act, Extended Producer Responsibility;

- (a) That staff amend the Request for Proposals for waste collection services that is currently being prepared to include the following two separate options for private sector bid:
  - (i) CONTRACTED WEEKLY LANDFILL WASTE COLLECTION of a single container of landfill waste and weekly collection of recycling, call-in bulk waste, yard waste, organic waste and front-end bin service garbage collection; and,
  - (ii) CONTRACTED BI-WEEKLY LANDFILL WASTE COLLECTION of two containers of landfill waste and maintaining weekly collection of recycling, call-in bulk waste, yard waste, organic waste and front-end bin service garbage collection:
- (b) That staff conduct an internal costing exercise to bring the procured waste collection service contract work in-house including the following two separate options:
  - (i) CITY WEEKLY LANDFILL WASTE COLLECTION of a single container of landfill waste and weekly collection of recycling, call-in bulk waste, yard waste, organic waste and front-end bin service garbage collection; and,
  - (ii) CITY BI-WEEKLY LANDFILL WASTE COLLECTION of two containers of landfill waste and maintaining weekly collection

of recycling, call-in bulk waste, yard waste, organic waste and front-end bin service garbage collection;

(c) That staff report back to the Public Works Committee on the results of the private sector bid for waste collection services and the staff internal costing exercise to bring the procured waste collection service contract work in-house.

# Keep Hamilton Clean and Green Committee 2018-2022 Work Plan

#### Introduction

The role of the Keep Hamilton Clean and Green Committee is to encourage Hamilton residents, property owners and visitors to engage in neighbourhood and City initiatives that aim to beautify our community and prevent litter, illegal dumping, and graffiti as well as promoting desired behaviours in the community that support the Clean and Green Hamilton goals.

Throughout its existence, the Keep Hamilton Clean and Green Committee has supported the implementation of the City's Clean and Green Strategy. It was determined that their four-year work plan would include implementation of actions related to the theme areas with the existing strategy. In addition to this, it was recognized by the committee that the time has come to update the strategy.

#### Background

This work plan was developed by LURA Consulting in collaboration with the Keep Hamilton Clean and Green Committee, based on the current themes of the Clean and Green Strategy (Litter, Illegal Dumping, Graffiti, Beautification and Environmental Stewardship). The activities that informed the workplan included an ideation session, an online survey, and an implementation session, detailed below:

- Ideation Session Committee members were asked to reflect on their
  motivations to join the committee and how their interests aligned with the theme
  areas within the current Clean and Green Strategy. Members were also asked to
  identify 3 goals they would like to achieve during their term on the Committee.
  Following this activity, LURA facilitated a discussion on what is being done within
  each area of focus, and by whom, to understand the current conditions and
  identify potential partners.
- Online Survey following the first session, LURA staff synthesized the actions
  and asked committee members how they would like to implement the actions,
  who should be involved in implementation, and what they felt were the most
  important actions through an online survey.
- **Implementation Session** LURA staff presented the results of the survey to the Committee and discussed any actions that required further clarification for implementation.

#### Work Plan

The following work plan is organized by the theme areas of the existing Clean and Green Strategy, in addition to an "Other" section which includes broader actions that apply across all theme areas.








PROPOSED CLOSURE OF PORTION OF UNASSUMED ALLEY AT 263 EAST 21  $^{\rm s}$  ST

The Hamilton branch of Westinghouse Air Brake Company was founded in 1867 and was the first site of the company outside the United States. In 1903 they incorporated and the Canadian Westinghouse Company Limited was established.

Designed by the Hamilton architectural firm of Prack & Perrine, the new head office of the Canadian Westinghouse Company Limited was built in 1917 in the Classical Revival style. This beautiful five-storey office building was constructed across the street from the factory and included a bridge for easy movement between the office and the manufacturing buildings. In 1928, two additional floors were added.

Falling on tough economic times, these offices closed and the building sat vacant since the mid-80's. The was Designated in 1988, highlighting the original architectural features of all four exterior facades, including the brick masonry walls, stone trim and wood-framed, double hung windows.

It has only been in recent years that the property was purchased by Electric City Developments and the adaptive reuse of this landmark building has been undertaken to create modern office and event space that is sustainable and accessible.

### 7. Multi-Purpose Community Hub for Diverse and Marginalized Communities (Item 11.1)

WHEREAS, according to StatsCan reports, Hamilton has the highest level of police reported hate crimes per capita in three of the last five years, while also recognizing not all hate crimes and incidents are reported to police;

WHEREAS, since December 2018 there have been weekly demonstrations held on the forecourt of Hamilton City Hall by extremist individuals and organizations using it as a platform to spread Islamophobic, homophobic, anti-immigrant, and anti-black racist views;

WHEREAS, this year residents have experienced hate-based violence and targeting at Pride, on personal properties, at mosques and on synagogues making communities feel less safe;

WHEREAS, responding to the rising levels of hate in the City of Hamilton requires an approach that includes empathy for lived experiences, clear policies and strategies to de-radicalize extremism, while also adequately resourcing and supporting the resilience of residents facing hate, and actively fostering a sense of solidarity and belonging across communities;

WHEREAS, the *Mapping the Void* report, released in 2019, surveyed over 900 people over the age of 16 who identified as Two-Spirit and LGBTQ+ in the City of Hamilton reporting 40.9% of respondents had sought services or community outside of Hamilton because they were either not available or sufficient in Hamilton;

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that in order to prevent and redress systemic and social inequities policies focused on equity, diversity and inclusion must guide service and programming provision;

WHEREAS, there is a gap in safe spaces, programs and services for Hamiltonians who have been historically marginalized and who have faced hate in their communities, and there remains a need to better resource community-informed and community-led initiatives that prioritize the needs of marginalized communities in our City;

WHEREAS, community groups play a critical role in meeting these needs and providing accessible and responsive supports and services;

WHEREAS, co-locating community groups increases access for residents while also fostering intersectional collaboration, strengthening integrated service and programing provision among community groups, and helps mitigate the impact of rising costs of operations; and,

WHEREAS, multi-purpose community hubs are demonstrated models in assetbased community development which provide excellence in meeting the needs of localized and marginalized communities;

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That staff be directed to convene with residents, community groups and organizations engaged in serving equity-seeking communities that are interested in collaborating to develop a business case for a multi-purpose community hub;
- (b) That the multi-purpose community hub aim to strengthen community capacity, resilience and responsiveness to address safer space, programming and service needs and gaps for historically marginalized communities; and,
- (c) That the business case for the creation of a "hub" include viable locations, possible sustainable funding sources, and a multi-year operations plan and report back to the General Issues Committee in Q2 2020 for review and consideration.



#### RECOMMENDATION:

That the Library Board endorse the Government Relations Campaign on Accessing Digital Publications lead by the Canadian Urban Library Council (CULC).

That the Library Board direct the Chief Librarian/CEO to request the City of Hamilton endorse the campaign and send communication to appropriate elected officials and candidates.

#### FINANCIAL/STAFFING/LEGAL IMPLICATIONS:

CULC is seeking assistance in increasing government and stakeholder awareness of the barriers libraries face in acquiring digital content. Through the Government Relations Campaign on Accessing Digital Publications, launched in June 2019, CULC is working with governments on a solution that would benefit library users and Canadian authors. By participating in the campaign, the Board can continue to play a leadership role in digital content advocacy in order to support cost effectiveness and access to collections in support of lifelong learning and literacy.

#### BACKGROUND:

Hamilton Public Library as an active member of Canadian Urban Library Council has participated in both the #eContentForLibraries and eOne Read Canada campaigns this year.

Barriers to accessing digital content for libraries continue to grow due to licensing models which include embargoes [different release days for libraries] and exclusives [content not available to libraries]. The current barriers around digital content causing concern for libraries are:

- Restrictive pricing models of eBooks and eAudio from the five largest multinational publishers; Hachette Book Group, HarperCollins, MacMillan, Penguin Random House and Simon & Schuster; and
- 2. The limited access Canadian libraries have to eAudio including eAudio by prominent Canadian authors.

CULC was incorporated in 2008 to improve library service in Canada's urban areas though research, advocacy and knowledge transfer. CULC members are made up of over forty large urban libraries in Canada. CULC members spend approximately \$100 million in public funds annually on library acquisitions; and increasingly struggle to obtain digital content [eBooks and eAudio] from multinational publishers.

On January 14, 2019 a social media campaign was launched by CULC to continue the efforts to lobby for equitable access and flexible, affordable pricing for eBooks and eAudio. Over 700 customers from Hamilton participated in the campaign was a call to action to demand better access and terms from the five multinational publishers: Hachette Book Group, HarperCollins, MacMillan, Penguin Random House and Simon & Schuster.

CULC would like to secure government support to eliminate the barriers libraries face in accessing digital content. This campaign aims to raise awareness at the Federal level to this issue prior to the October election.

CULC will be reaching out to engage key policy makers in discussions as well as engaging all major party candidates during the Federal election campaign this Fall. CULC will be asking policy makers and candidates to participate in a social media campaign pledging their support for libraries to have the resources to build their collections;

CULC will be presenting a policy solution to the access issues to the Federal government immediately following the election in October, seeking a funding allocation in the 2020 budget for libraries including data that shows publishers that library cooperation supports book sales.

### **Additional Background Information**

- Members of the Canadian Urban Libraries Council / Conseil des Bibliothèques Urbaines du Canada (CULC/CBUC) spend approximately \$112 million in public funds annually on library collections.
- The Hamilton Public Library spent \$3 million on physical collections and \$1 million on digital collections in 2018 –\$800K of which was spent specifically on eBooks and eAudiobooks
- Even with our significant expenditure, we increasingly struggle to obtain e-content from multinational publishers due to a combination of pricing issues and restrictive licensing models that are unique to eBooks and eAudiobooks.
- In order to properly serve our communities including vulnerable groups like seniors, lower income individuals, and youth at risk— we need to ensure that all Canadians have timely access to digital content.
- Multinational publishers (collectively known as the "Big 5"), primarily headquartered outside Canada, are limiting Canadian libraries' access to eContent. Even when a publication is made available, the "Big 5" are making it prohibitively expensive to acquire eContent. For example, Canadian author Louise Penny's book, A Better Man, is available to libraries for \$22 in hard cover, for \$60 in eBook, and for \$81.50 in eAudio. The \$60 ebook cost allows the book to be checked out electronically 52 times or for 2 years whichever happens first. A paper edition would be expected to last 3 to 4 years at just over a third of the cost.
- This has been an issue for many years, but recently the problem has worsened with publishers further limiting access and embargoing content for public libraries. The resulting business model is financially unsustainable for libraries and detrimental to free and equitable access to information for the public.
- Licensing restrictions and high costs make it difficult for libraries to provide invaluable services that contribute to thriving and engaged communities. Public libraries and the programs that they provide

### **Draft Letter to Federal Members of Parliament**

#### Dear

I am writing on behalf of the public libraries in the City of Hamilton which provide an essential service and are essential parts of our communities.

Libraries and the early literacy programs that they run are integral to developing proficient readers and ensuring that kids succeed in school. More and more, digital literacy programs run by public libraries also help ensure that citizens can contribute to our digital world. Additionally, for many seniors, lower income families, youth, and new Canadians our public libraries provide access to information they may not otherwise be able to obtain.

Members of the Canadian Urban Libraries Council (CULC)/Conseil des Bibliothèques Urbaines du Canada (CBUC) spend approximately \$100 million in public funds annually on library acquisitions. In Hamilton we are spending \$3.2 million every year in our 22 library branches to ensure that we acquire publications and other resources in demand by library users.

Even with this significant expenditure, we increasingly struggle to obtain digital publications from multinational publishers, due to other cost pressures we face locally and because of the often strict licensing limitations applied to digital publications. By way of example, Canadian author Louise Penny's book Kingdom of the Blind is available to libraries for \$13 as a paperback, \$22 in hard cover and \$60 in digital form. The \$60 cost would allow the book to be checked out electronically 52 times or for 2 years - whichever happens first. A paper edition would be expected to last 3 to 4 years at a substantially reduced cost. The book is currently not available to Canadian libraries in any e-audio format.

The critical problem is that multinational publishers are limiting access to digital publications by Canadian libraries, and, even when a publication is made available, are making it prohibitively expensive to acquire most digital publications.

If we can not correctly serve library users and provide access to digital publications, our community will suffer. The lack of access to digital publications is a problem we feel governments need to be aware of and help us develop solutions for - especially as governments seek to identify community tools that can help vulnerable groups grow and reach their potential.

Along with other CULC/CBUC members across Canada, we are asking the Federal government to recognize the critical role that libraries play in serving priority groups in our communities. Libraries do this by providing access to materials that allow community members to learn and grow. The Federal government has a vital role to play in ensuring that Canadian libraries can meet the growing demand for digital publications. We ask you to prioritize finding a solution for the barriers that Canadian libraries face in accessing digital publications.

# CITY OF HAMILTON BY-LAW NO.

To Impose a Sanitary Sewer Charge Upon Owners of Land Abutting Garner Road East from Approximately 30m West of Raymond Road to Approximately 280m Westerly, in the City of Hamilton

**WHEREAS** the Council of the City of Hamilton authorized recovering a portion of costs associated with the construction of Sewer Works by approving, on September 26, 2007, Item 17 of Public Works Committee Report 07-011 (Report TOE02005(b)/FCS02026(b)/PED07248);

**WHEREAS** developers, Marz Homes (Garner) Inc. and A. DeSantis Developments Ltd., in satisfaction of terms and conditions of subdivision agreements "Cortland", Plan 62M-1255 and "Garner Estates", Plan 62M-1253, did construct certain Sewer Works, in the City of Hamilton, as more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached to this By-law; and,

**WHEREAS** the cost of the Sewer Works, including sanitary drain connections and a watermain connection is \$147,043.98 to be recovered from benefiting property owners. Cost recovery in favour of Marz Homes (Garner) Inc. for the water service connection.

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the City of Hamilton enacts as follows:

- 1. Sewer Charges are imposed upon the owners or occupants of land who benefit from the construction of the Sewer Works (the "Assessed Owners").
- 2. The Assessed Owner's lands and the respective Sewer Charges are more particularly described in Schedule "A", which Schedule is attached to and forms part of this By-law.
- 3. The Sewer Charges have been established using the approved method for cost apportionment per City of Hamilton Report TOE02005(b)/FCS02026(b)/PED07248 (Funding Methodologies for Municipal Infrastructure Extensions Review and Update), establishing a Flat Fee Sanitary Sewer Charge of \$7,745.00 attributable to each Assessed Owner of an existing residential lot, in addition to the actual cost of \$6,588.23 for each 150mm sanitary drain connection by A. DeSantis Developments Ltd.; \$6,455.67 for each 150mm sanitary drain connection by Marz Homes (Garner) Inc. and the actual cost of \$4,639.60 for a water service connection attributable to 954 Garner Road East.

The Flat Fee shall be annually adjusted to the current rate in the City's User Fees and Charges By-law. The Sanitary drain and water service connection charges shall be indexed in accordance with the percentage change in the composite Canadata Construction Cost Index (Ontario Series) commencing from the completion date of construction, July 2018, to the date of permit issuance.

- 4. The amount resulting from the application of the Sewer Charges (the "Indebtedness"), shall be collected at the time of permit issuance for any connection to the said Sewer Works, in addition to any applicable permit fees.
- 5. The Assessed Owners have the option of paying the Indebtedness by way of annual payments over a period of 15 years from the date of permit issuance for connection by entry on the tax roll, to be collected in like manner as municipal taxes. The interest rate utilized for the 15 year payment shall be the City of Hamilton's then-current 15 year borrowing rate (2019 rate-3.50%).
- 6. Notwithstanding Section 5, an Assessed Owner of a parcel described in Schedule "A" may pay the commuted value of the Indebtedness without penalty, but including interest, at any time.
- 7. Should an Assessed Owner sever or subdivide their parcel of land, the Sewer Charges owed to the City of Hamilton, whether the parcel of land is connected or not, and whether or not the Assessed Owner has previously exercised the repayment option set out in Section 5 above, shall be paid forthwith to the City of Hamilton in a lump sum as a condition of the severance or subdivision approval.
- 8. Unpaid Sewer Charges constitute a debt to the City and may be added to the tax roll and collected in the same manner as municipal taxes.
- 9. If any provision or requirement of this By-law, or the application of it to any person, shall to any extent be held to be invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of the By-law, or the application of it to all persons other than those in respect of whom it is held to be invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected, and each provision and requirement of this By-law shall be separately valid and enforceable.
- 10. This By-law comes into force on the day following the date of its passing.

The following text, together with Appendix "A": Volume 2, Map B.6.2-1 – Ainslie Wood Westdale Secondary Plan – Land Use Plan, constitutes Official Plan Amendment No. 127 to the Urban Hamilton Official Plan.

#### 1.0 Purpose and Effect:

The purpose and effect of this Amendment is to establish a Site Specific Policy Area within the Mixed Use – Medium Density designation in the Ainslie Wood Westdale Secondary Plan – Land Use Plan to permit the development of McMaster University student residences.

#### 2.0 Location:

The lands affected by this Amendment are known municipally as 1190 Main Street West, 43, 47, 51 and 55 Forsyth Avenue South, 75, 77, 81, 83, 99, 103, 107, 111 and 115 Traymore Avenue, and 50 Dalewood Avenue, in the former City of Hamilton.

#### 3.0 Basis:

The basis for permitting this Amendment is:

**AND WHEREAS** the Council of the City of Hamilton, in adopting Item 4 of Report 19-017 of the Planning Committee, at its meeting held on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of November 2019, recommended that Zoning By-law No. 6593 (Hamilton), be amended as hereinafter provided; and.

**AND WHEREAS** this By-law conforms to the Urban Hamilton Official Plan.

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the City of Hamilton enacts as follows:

- 1. That Sheet No. E106 of the District Maps appended to and forming part of Zoning By-law No. 6593 (Hamilton), is amended as follows:
  - a) By changing the zoning from "AA" (Agricultural) District to the "C/S-1790" (Urban Protected Residential, Etc.) District, Modified (Block 1); and,
  - b) By changing the zoning from "C" (Urban Protected Residential, Etc.) District to the "C/S-1790" (Urban Protected Residential, Etc.) District, Modified (Block 2);



on the land the extent and boundaries of which are shown on a plan hereto annexed as Schedule "A".

- 2. That the "C" (Urban Protected Residential, Etc.) District provisions as contained in Section 9 of Zoning By-law No. 6593 applicable to the subject lands, be modified to include the following special requirements:
  - a) Notwithstanding Section 18 (14) (i), not less than 41% of the gross area of the front yard shall be used for a landscaped area excluding concrete, asphalt, gravel, pavers or other similar materials.
  - b) Notwithstanding Section 18A (14a), except for single family dwellings, two family dwellings and three family dwellings erected prior to the 14<sup>th</sup> day of December 1971, no part of a required parking space for a single family dwelling in a residential district shall be located in a required front yard and not less than 41% of the gross area of the front yard shall be used for a landscaped area excluding concrete, asphalt, gravel, pavers or other similar materials.
- 3. That no building or structure shall be erected, altered, extended or enlarged, nor shall any building or structure or part thereof be used, nor shall any land be used, except in accordance with the "C" (Urban Protected Residential, Etc.) District.
- 4. That By-law No. 6593 is amended by adding this By-law to Section 19B as Schedule S-1790.
- 5. That Sheet No. E106 of the District maps is amended by making the lands referred to in Section 2 of this By-law as Schedule S-1790.
- 6. That the Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to proceed with the giving of notice of the passing of this By-law in accordance with the *Planning Act*.

#### CITY OF HAMILTON BY-LAW NO. 19-

To amend Zoning By-law No. 05-200 with respect to lands located at 328, 336, Part of 344, 400, 532, 536, and 538 Beach Boulevard, Hamilton

**WHEREAS** Council approved Item 5 of Report 19-017 of the Planning Committee, at its meeting held on November 13, 2019;

AND WHEREAS this By-law conforms to the Urban Hamilton Official Plan;

**NOW THEREFORE** Council amends Zoning By-law No. 05-200 as follows:

- 1. That Maps 735, 793, and 834 of Schedule "A" Zoning Maps is amended by changing the zoning from the Neighbourhood Commercial (C2) Zone, to the Neighbourhood Commercial (C2, 499) Zone for the lands attached as Schedule "A" to this By-law.
- 2. That Schedule "C" Special Exceptions is amended by adding the following new Special Exception:
  - "499. Within the lands zoned Neighbourhood Commercial (C2) Zone, identified on Maps 735, 793, and 834 of Schedule "A" Zoning Maps, and described as:

Property Address	Map Number
328 Beach Boulevard	834
336 Beach Boulevard	834
Part of 344 Beach Boulevard	834
400 Beach Boulevard	735
532 Beach Boulevard	793
536 Beach Boulevard	793
538 Beach Boulevard	793

The following special provisions shall apply:

- a) Section 4.6 d) shall not apply to the side yard.
- b) Notwithstanding Section 4.8.1, the following provisions shall apply:
  - No accessory building shall be located within a front yard or side yard.

ii) Minimum Rear Yard 0.6 metres

iii) Maximum Height 4.5 metres

- iv) All accessory buildings shall not exceed 30% total lot coverage of the yard in which the accessory buildings are located, included areas devoted exclusively to parking.
- v) Where an accessory building is designed and intended for parking of motor vehicles, such accessory building shall be set back a minimum of 6.0 metres from any street line.
- vi) In no cases shall an eave or gutter extend more than 0.3 metres into a minimum yard.
- c) Notwithstanding Section 10.2.3 c) i), the following provision shall apply:
  - i) Minimum Interior Side Yard 1.7 metres
- d) In addition to Section 10.2.3: Regulations, the following provisions shall apply:
  - i) The minimum ground floor elevation of any building or any building addition shall be 76.5 metres above mean sea level, as defined by the Geodetic Survey Datum, except for any building addition less than 14 square metres in ground floor area, and any accessory building or structure.
  - ii) No basement or cellar shall be permitted for any buildings.
  - iii) Any building addition less than 14 square metres in ground floor area, shall have a minimum ground floor elevation at or above the existing ground floor elevation of the building.
- e) Notwithstanding clause c) of this By-law, an interior side yard may be reduced to a minimum 1.5 metres, provided a common swale between the interior side yard and the adjoining property has been approved under an approved Site Plan.
- f) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this By-law, any lot and the location thereof of any building or structure, existing on the effective date of this By-law, shall be deemed to comply with the regulations for any required setbacks, front yard, façade building length, flankage yard, rear yard, lot width, lot area and building height and are permitted by this By-law."


