WHEREAS the Province released Bill 108, *More Homes, More Choice Act, 2019* on May 2, 2019 and the Bill received Royal Assent on June 6, 2019;

WHEREAS Bill 108 will ultimately result in many services (generally referred to as soft services) that the City collects Development Charges for, to no longer to be eligible for inclusion in a Development Charges Study and By-law;

WHEREAS Bill 108 provides transition provisions for Development Charge By-laws that expire after May 2, 2019;

WHEREAS once Bill 108 is proclaimed in force Development Charges By-laws may only impose Development Charges for the services listed in subsection 2(4) of the *Development Charges Act, 1997, as amended* which results in the exclusion of soft services from Development Charges;

WHEREAS the draft Development Charge By-law being recommended to Council for approval in FCS19050 is before Council for passage on June 12, 2019 but contains a provision which would delay the by-law coming into force until July 6, 2019;

WHEREAS the date of proclamation of Bill 108 unknown;

WHEREAS the City of Hamilton has undertaken a Development Charges Background Study dated March 13, 2019;

WHEREAS extraordinary hours of staff and consultants time has been allocated to ensuring that the 2019 Development Charges Background Study and calculation reflect the costs necessary to service the anticipated development within the City;

WHEREAS the impacts of Bill 108 cannot be fully understood by municipalities since the regulations have not been released;

WHEREAS staff has identified a risk regarding the effective date of the 2019 Development Charges By-law and the transition provisions contained within Bill 108, given how quickly the Provincial Government may Proclaim the Bill; specifically, the effective date of July 6, 2019 in the 2019 Development Charges By-law and the ability to collect for soft services at the rates determined necessary to support the capital needs related to growth through the 2019 Development Charges calculation;

WHEREAS there is a \$3,593 difference per single family dwelling in the soft service Development Charges between the current Development Charges collected for soft services and the amount calculated for soft service through the 2019 Development Charges Background Study;

WHEREAS July 6, 2019 has consistently been communicated as the date that the 2019 Development Charge rates would take effect;

WHEREAS there is a need to mitigate the risk identified while acknowledging that developers have been working with July 6, 2019 as the date increased Development Charges would take effect;

WHEREAS Addendum #2 to the 2019 Development Charges Background Study, dated June 10, 2019, has been prepared and released by Watson Associates Economists Ltd. and communicated by the City through the City's website and twitter account;

WHEREAS the City has met all legislated timelines and consultation periods required prior to passing and enacting a new Development Charges By-law;

WHEREAS this motion addresses the request from the June 6, 2019 Audit, Finance and Administration Committee meeting for staff to report back to Council on June 12, 2019 with language regarding transitional concerns related to Bill 108 and the 2019 Development Charges By-law;

WHEREAS it is the intent of Council that the proposed 2019 Development Charges By-law to be passed, enacted and take effect prior to the proclamation of Bill 108;

Re: Update on Hamilton Light Rail Transit (LRT) Underground Cable Relocation Project

To Mayor Eisenberger and Members of Council:

In August 2018, we notified you of our intention to initiate a Class Environmental Assessment (EA) for the relocation of approximately 600 metres of the 115 kilovolt underground transmission cable (circuits HL3 and HL4) in support of Metrolinx's construction of the Hamilton Light Rail Transit (LRT) project. The existing underground transmission line proposed for relocation is located along Main Street W. between Paisley Ave. S. and Macklin St. S, in the City of Hamilton, as shown on the attached map.

We have been notified by Metrolinx that there is no longer a need for Hydro One to relocate the underground cable along Main Street W. as Metrolinx will be pursuing a different engineering design for the Hamilton LRT within the section on Main Street W. As such, the proposed transmission cable relocation is not being pursued at this time. We will continue to work with Metrolinx to ensure that the existing underground cable continues to operate safely throughout the Hamilton LRT project execution.

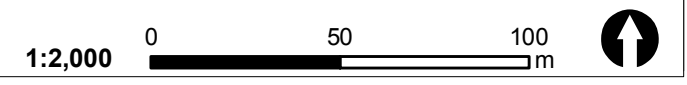

Re: Requesting your support to reduce red-tape; Regulation 828/20 – Niagara Escarpment Planning and Development Act

I am writing to seek your support for an important regulation change that will reduce red-tape and provide municipalities with the ability to make minor road improvements within the Niagara Escarpment Plan area.

The previous provincial government amended regulation 828/20 of the Niagara Escarpment Planning and Development Act to enact a permit requirement on local road authorities on minor roadway improvements or maintenance. This regulation has delayed an important road improvement in Clearview Township for over 7 years. The delay has meant that Clearview Township has been unable to maintain our road network to improve road safety.

The Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC) plays an important role in conserving key elements of the Niagara Escarpment, but providing the NEC with the power to restrict road improvements on existing roads and right-of-ways takes responsibility away from the elected local councils that are best placed to make these decisions. In contrast, we think NEC development permits for new roads and infrastructure are appropriate due to the additional environmental burden that comes with those decisions.

I am asking for your support in asking the Provincial Government to build on its commitment to reduce red-tape, and remove the powers vested in the NEC in Regulation 828/20 that allows them to overrule municipal authority to repair and improve existing roads within a right-of-way.

By sending a letter of support or passing a council resolution, together we can help the province streamline regulatory approvals and keep our roads in a good state of repair for all users.

Re: Urgent meeting request – Regulation 828/20 – Niagara Escarpment Planning and Development Act

I am writing to request an urgent meeting to discuss reducing red-tape on a significant project in Clearview Township.

Located in Simcoe County, Clearview is a community on the rise. The Township boasts affordable living opportunities, provides its residents with the unique rural Ontario experience, and has considerable employment opportunities in industries such as manufacturing and agriculture.

Clearview is also a prime location for the Ford Government to deliver on its promise of cutting red-tape, spurring job growth, and increasing investment in Ontario.

Clearview has been attempting to secure permission from the Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC) to make road safety improvements to a local sideroad for over seven years. After spending years working on this project, and finally receiving approval from the Environmental Review Tribunal and the Ontario Municipal Board to make the necessary road upgrades, the Wynne Government enacted a regulatory change to 828/20 of the Niagara Escarpment Planning and Development Act that confirmed Clearview required a special development permit

to carry out the necessary upgrades. Despite NEC staff recommending that Clearview be granted this permit, the NEC Commissioners denied the development permit application.

This situation provides the Ford Government with the opportunity to make good on its political promise of reducing burdensome, onerous, and job-killing red-tape. By removing this regulatory burden, the Ford Government can allow municipalities to make minor road improvements within existing right-of-ways that have limited environmental impact without seeking approval from the NEC. This position has been endorsed by the Ontario Good Roads Association.

I look forward to our meeting to discuss how we can work together to bring common sense and respect for our local road authority back to rural Ontario. RE: Proposed Modifications to Aberdeen Avenue

Your worship and Members of Council,

As a long-time resident of the Kirkendall South Neighbourhood I would respectfully object to the proposed measures to essentially narrow Aberdeen Avenue from a four lane arterial road to a two lane local street. In my opinion this will only create greater traffic problems in the area. Over the years turning from Flatt Avenue onto Aberdeen Avenue has become more difficult, due to increased traffic and the proposed measures will only make things worse.

Aberdeen Avenue has been an arterial road and a key link in the Hamilton road system for a very long time. If I am reading the traffic numbers correctly approximately 15,000 vehicles exit Hwy 403 at Aberdeen and about 20,000 vehicles access Hwy 403 from Aberdeen Avenue on an average day. The proposed narrowing of Aberdeen Avenue will undoubtedly increase traffic congestion on routes to west Hamilton, the Downtown and escarpment accesses, which will only be exacerbated with construction of an LRT.

If you really want to make Aberdeen Avenue a two lane local street, you would have to remove the bus routes on this street and arrange to close the Hwy 403 / Aberdeen Avenue interchange, which is one of the few accesses into the City.

Earl Kitchener School has been in its present location for a century. I doubt that today's children are more reckless and foolish regarding road safety than previous generations, which seems to be the basis of the additional safety measures argument. In fact parking on both sides of a busy street can cause increased accidents at intersections due to poorer visibility.

My observation is that whenever the City reduces the traffic capacity of the arterial / collector road system it:

- Creates greater gridlock, which is bad for the environment, the economy and the folks stuck in traffic
- Forces additional traffic to move through the established neighbourhoods on local streets, which reduces safety.

In my opinion the recommendation in Mr. Soldo's report to the Public Works Committee should be rejected or at least delayed until alternate measures are in place to accommodate traffic in the area, including completion of LRT construction.

When the City makes transportation decisions, due consideration should be given to drivers, not just the demands of special interest groups.

WHEREAS other Canadian cities, including London and Sarnia are already piloting and/or assessing the feasibility of menstrual product access programs; and

WHEREAS recreation centres and libraries service a large population, diverse in age and socioeconomic status; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of St. Catharines work towards providing free menstrual products (pads and tampons) in all public-facing municipally-run facilities in the following ways:

1. That staff report back to Council outlining options and costs for a pilot project that would offer menstrual products in select recreation centres and library locations;
2. That the evaluation of the pilot project also include qualitative data from people using the products;
3. That the results of the pilot project inform the feasibility of expanding the provision of free menstrual products in all public-facing municipal buildings;
4. That if passed, the Clerk's Office notify all school boards and municipalities in Ontario of the City of St. Catharines' initiative and encourage them to do the same.

(This is a statement that I delivered in person on June 18, 2019 to the LGBT Community Conversation).

My name is Michael Demone, Executive Director for the Canadian Working Group on Industrial Hemp and resident of the Durand neighbourhood.

I am ashamed to be here today.

I am ashamed to be here because only after a vicious, coordinated, violent attack on my fellow citizens, friends, vulnerable and marginalized communities, did I decide to stand up.

I did not stand up when known extremist and white supremacist groups were allowed to occupy space at City Hall.

I did not stand up when it was revealed that the co-founder of one of Canada's most infamous hate groups was employed by the City, with access to sensitive information, and that attempts to conceal this were made by City staff.

I did not stand up when our Mayor refused to offer his seat on the Police Services Board to a member of a community that might actually benefit from such an appointment.

Nor did I stand up when our Mayor, in complete defiance of the Pride Committee's decision not to raise our flag, did so anyways.

Individually, each one of these items is an assault on those you were elected or appointed to protect. Individually, each one of these is a call to action.

Taken together, they reveal a municipal culture that is completely out of step with contemporary Canada, and one that holds Canadian values and targeted communities with contempt.

You have allowed those recognized as some of the most dangerous elements in our society to invade our public spaces. You have caused your citizens to wonder if they need to carry weapons to feel safe. You have eroded trust and confidence in our elected officials.

You have brought attention of the most sinister kind to our city.

You have allowed children to be hunted like dogs and women to be assaulted for sport.

You have shattered our sense of dignity.

The allegations of questionable police conduct — from the failure to activate the Operational Plan, the written protocols used to ensure public safety, to allegations that the Police Service intentionally positioned themselves in such a way that would restrict their ability to respond adequately and appropriately if needed, to members of the Police Service refusing to do their job even as they witnessed violent crimes being committed — are so utterly obscene, so contrary to the most basic principles of a functioning democracy and human decency.

Should our community determine that the Police Service contributed in any way to these violent attacks, nothing less than an official public inquiry will be accepted.

You have demonstrated repeatedly and carelessly that the government of this city is unable or unwilling to fulfill its duties and responsibilities to its citizens by allowing a sequence of events to occur that will mark this city and those you have injured for years to come.

I assure you that I will pursue every legal and political course of action, and the sustained attention of human rights and other international organizations, to ensure that significant and satisfactory changes are made.

Mr. Mayor, in your statement dated June 17, 2019 you committed to ensuring that the violence visited upon your constituents, your neighbours, would never happen again.

I ask you now, will you dedicate the financial, legal, and logistical tools and resources necessary to keep that commitment?



Ombudsman Report

**Investigation into a complaint about
closed sessions held by the City of
Hamilton on January 16, 2019**

Complaint

- 1 In January 2019, my Office received a complaint about closed sessions held by the General Issues Committee (the “committee”) for the City of Hamilton (the “city”) on January 16, 2019.
- 2 The complaint alleged that during a regular meeting, the committee moved into closed session twice to discuss contributing to a bid by the Hamilton Tiger-Cats (the “Tiger-Cats”) for the 2020 or 2021 Canadian Football League (the “CFL”) Grey Cup championship.

Ombudsman jurisdiction

- 3 Under the *Municipal Act, 2001*¹ (the “Act”), all meetings of council, local boards, and committees of council must be open to the public, unless they fall within prescribed exceptions.
- 4 As of January 1, 2008, the Act gives citizens the right to request an investigation into whether a municipality has complied with the Act in closing a meeting to the public. Municipalities may appoint their own investigator. The Act designates the Ombudsman as the default investigator for municipalities that have not appointed their own.
- 5 The Ombudsman is the closed meeting investigator for the City of Hamilton.
- 6 In investigating closed meeting complaints, we consider whether the open meeting requirements of the Act and the municipality’s governing procedures have been observed.

Council procedures

- 7 The city’s procedural by-law (By-law No. 18-270) lists the General Issues Committee as one of six standing committees in the city. The committee is made up of all of council. The procedural by-law states that all meetings of the committee shall be open to the public except as provided by the Act.

Investigative process

- 8 On January 31, 2019, we advised the city of our intent to investigate this complaint.
- 9 Members of my Office's open meeting team reviewed relevant portions of the city's by-laws and policies, and the Act. We also reviewed the records from the open and closed sessions of the committee meeting on January 16, 2019. The city audio and video records the open session portions of the committee's meetings. The recording of the open portion of the January 16 meeting was reviewed.
- 10 We interviewed members of council, the clerk, the Acting Director of Culture and Tourism, and the city solicitor.
- 11 My Office received full co-operation in this matter.

Background

The Tiger-Cats' bid for the 2020 or 2021 Grey Cup

- 12 We were told that the Tiger-Cats submitted a bid to the CFL to host the Grey Cup championship in 2020 or 2021. The bidding process is not a public process. Interested teams submit confidential bids to the CFL for consideration. The team awarded the bid acts as the host team for the Grey Cup and facilitates the delivery of the championship game and related festivities.
- 13 We were told that if the Tiger-Cats were awarded the bid, the City of Hamilton, as host city, would be involved in the planning for logistics and provision of city services during the championship. We were told it is a generally accepted practice for a potential host city to bolster a team's chances of being awarded the Grey Cup with financial or in-kind contributions to the team's bid.
- 14 In November 2018, the Tiger-Cats requested that the city provide a contribution to the Tiger-Cats' bid. Staff engaged in negotiations with the Tiger-Cats for the provision of city services, fees, venue rentals, and other city-led programming and community engagement which would make up the city's contribution.

- 15 The recommended contribution by city staff was put together in a confidential staff report (the “report”) and placed on the committee’s January 16 meeting agenda for *in camera* consideration.
- 16 The report outlined the city’s involvement in logistical planning and the provision for city services should the Tiger-Cats be successful, and provided an overview of staff negotiations with the Tiger-Cats to determine an appropriate contribution by the city.
- 17 The report’s recommendations comprised specific contributions by the city for city services, contract staff, and city operating expenses. The report also recommended that the committee permit staff to continue negotiations and enter into any appropriate agreements with the Tiger-Cats to formalize the city’s contribution.

The January 16 meeting

- 18 Before moving into closed session to discuss the report, the committee held a discussion in open session about whether the report should be discussed behind closed doors. This discussion was captured by the city’s audio and video recording of the meeting.
- 19 Councillor Brad Clark stated that a discussion involving the city’s finances would not qualify for *in camera* consideration. Councillors John-Paul Danko, Brenda Johnson, and Sam Merulla also spoke in favour of holding the discussion in public. Mayor Fred Eisenberger said the city should not discuss the contribution in open session because it risked tipping its hand to other bidders.
- 20 Members of the committee questioned staff about the reasons for discussing the report in closed session. The Acting Director of Culture and Tourism (the “acting director”) noted that the discussion should happen in closed session, because a public discussion of the city’s contribution might prejudice the bid process and the city’s future negotiating position for other large-scale events. She stated that the city’s practice is to maintain confidentiality around investment in major events to avoid “[setting] a bar for event organizers of what the city’s tolerance is for investment.” The acting director explained that in her experience, when the city negotiates in public, other competitors are able to use that information to outbid the city.

- 21 However, staff also indicated that in most cases, the city ultimately releases financial information relating to contributions to large-scale events. The committee was told that in the event that the Tiger-Cats' bid was successful, the city would ultimately report publicly on the amount of its contribution to the bid.

The closed session discussions

- 22 At 3:25 p.m., the Committee moved into closed session to receive legal advice from the city's solicitor on whether or not the report qualified for *in camera* consideration.
- 23 The committee passed the following resolution prior to closing the meeting:
- Hosting Grey Cup - November 2020 or 201 (PED18234(a)) (City Wide) (Item 14.2) - 239(2)(f) Advice that is subject to solicitor-client privilege
- 24 The closed session minutes indicate that the city solicitor provided legal advice to the committee about if the report was appropriate for *in camera* consideration and answered the committee's questions.
- 25 We were told by most council members that after receiving legal advice *in camera*, they were generally satisfied that the topic was appropriate for closed session consideration.
- 26 The committee subsequently moved into closed session a second time at 6:25 p.m. to consider the report and to discuss the city's contribution to the Tiger-Cats' bid. Councillors Johnson and Clark voted against moving into closed session. This closed session lasted one hour.
- 27 The committee passed the following resolution prior to closing the meeting:
- That Committee move into Closed Session, respecting Item 14.2, pursuant To Section 8.1, Sub-sections (f), (j) and (k) of the City's Procedural By-law 18-270;and, Section 239(2), Sub-sections (f), (j) and (k) of the *Ontario Municipal Act, 2001*.
- 28 The closed session minutes state that staff presented the report and answered the committee's questions.
- 29 We were told that, overall, the committee was excited for the opportunity to act as Grey Cup host city and the potential benefits for the city if the Tiger-Cats' bid was successful.

- 30 The deputy clerk told my Office that the committee's discussion focused on the city's financial contribution to the Tiger-Cats' bid. Members of council asked staff questions about particulars contained in the report. The acting director told my Office that she answered questions about staff negotiations with the Tiger-Cats and what would happen if the committee did not approve the recommended contribution. According to the acting director, in that event, staff would return to the negotiating table with the Tiger-Cats based on what the committee was prepared to contribute.
- 31 Ultimately, the committee accepted staff's recommendations and reported out that it had directed staff to coordinate with the Tiger-Cats for all requirements for hosting the Grey Cup. The financial component of the contribution was kept confidential.

Analysis

Applicability of the "advice subject to solicitor-client privilege" exception

- 32 The committee cited the exception for advice subject to solicitor-client privilege found in section 239(2)(f) of the Act when it moved into both closed sessions.
- 33 The exception for advice subject to solicitor-client privilege covers discussions that include communications between the municipality and its solicitor in seeking or receiving legal advice intended to be confidential. The purpose of the exception is to ensure that municipal officials can speak freely about legal advice without fear of disclosure. My Office has found in the past that the exception can only be used where legal advice or related communication actually exists.²

First closed session

- 34 Our interviews indicate that during its first closed session, the committee received and discussed legal advice from the city's solicitor regarding the appropriateness of discussing the report and the city's contribution to the Tiger-Cats' bid in closed session. The committee asked the solicitor questions and discussed her advice.

35 Accordingly, the committee's discussion fit within the exception for solicitor-client privilege.

Second closed session

36 The committee cited the solicitor-client privilege exception when it moved into closed session for the second time.

37 In order for the exception to apply, legal advice must actually be received and discussed during the closed session.³ In this case, based on my Office's interviews and the closed session minutes, it does not appear that the solicitor provided legal advice during the second closed session. Accordingly, the discussion does not fit within the exception for advice subject to solicitor-client privilege.

Applicability of the "information belonging to the municipality" exception

38 Four new open meeting exceptions came into force on January 1, 2018, as part of the *Modernizing of Ontario's Municipal Legislation Act, 2017*. The exception for information belonging to the municipality is found in subsection 239(2)(j) of the Act. It allows for a meeting to be closed if the subject matter being considered is:

a trade secret or scientific, technical, commercial or financial information that belongs to the municipality or local board and has monetary value or potential monetary value.

39 The committee cited this exception when it moved into the second closed session.

40 This is the first meeting my Office has investigated under this exception.

41 When reviewing the parameters of the open meeting exceptions, my Office has often considered the case law of the Information and Privacy Commissioner (the IPC). These decisions are not binding on my Office; however, they are often informative with respect to the applicability of the open meeting exceptions in the Act.

- 42 In the context of information and privacy legislation, government institutions may refuse to disclose records that include information belonging to an institution.⁴ The IPC has found that the purpose of this exemption is to protect the interests of government, economic or otherwise, and it is generally intended to protect commercially viable information to the same extent that valuable third party information is protected.⁵ The protection is class-based, in that the exemption is concerned with the type of information and its inherent value, rather than the consequences if the information is disclosed.⁶ The IPC has found that there is no requirement to consider whether disclosure of the information may cause harm.
- 43 The IPC established a three-part test to determine if an institution can refuse to disclose a record on the basis that it contains information belonging to the institution. The institution must show that the information contained in the record:
1. is a trade secret, or financial, commercial, scientific or technical information;
 2. belongs to the institution; and
 3. has monetary value or potential monetary value.⁷
- 44 The first part of the test examines whether the information qualifies as a trade secret, financial information, commercial information, scientific information, or technical information.
- 45 The IPC has found that trade secrets include, but are not limited to:
- a formula, pattern, compilation, program, method, technique, or process, or information contained or embodied in a product, device or mechanism which:
- (i) is, or may be used in a trade or business,
 - (ii) is not generally known in that trade or business,
 - (iii) has economic value from not being generally known, and

(iv) is the subject of efforts that are reasonable under the circumstances to maintain its secrecy.⁸

The IPC has found that financial information is information that relates to money and its use or distribution and must contain or refer to specific data. Examples include cost accounting methods, pricing practices, profit and loss data, overhead, and operating costs.⁹

- 46 The second part of the test considers whether or not the information belongs to the institution. According to the IPC, information belongs to the institution if it is owned by that institution in the sense that the institution has a proprietary interest in the information in a traditional property sense, or in the sense that the “law would recognize a substantial interest in protecting the information from misappropriation by another party.”¹⁰
- 47 The third part of the test requires that the information have monetary value, either real or potential. According to the IPC, the term “monetary value” requires that the information itself have intrinsic value, such that disclosure would deprive the institution of that monetary value. The fact that an institution had to pay to create a record does not mean that the information in that record has monetary value.¹¹ Nor does the fact, on its own, that the information has been kept confidential.¹²
- 48 In the open meeting context, the exception for information belonging to the municipality will apply where the *in camera* discussion was about:
1. A trade secret, or financial, commercial, scientific or technical information;
 2. that belongs to the municipality or local board; and
 3. has monetary value or potential monetary value.

Was the discussion about a trade secret or financial, commercial, scientific or technical information?

- 49 In the present case, the city told my Office that the information contained in the report was a trade secret. The information included details about how the city allocates funding to large-scale events like the Grey Cup. According to the city, its approach to funding is a trade secret and is applied to other large-scale events within the city.
- 50 The information contained in the report does not qualify as a trade secret. We received no information that would indicate that the City's approach to allocating funding is used in trade or business, is not generally known, or if this information has economic value. In addition, contrary to the acting director's opinion that the city's financial contributions of this nature remain confidential to protect the funding approach, we were told that the city has publicly released financial information related to funding large-scale events in the past.
- 51 The city's contribution qualifies as financial information because it relates to the expenditure, use and distribution of money by the city. The report contained specific financial data related to how the city's contribution would be distributed and allocated to the Tiger-Cats.

Does the information belong to the municipality?

- 52 The second part of the test requires that the information discussed in closed session belong to the municipality or local board. In this case, the information regarding the city's contribution belongs to the city because it was prepared by city staff. There is no indication that the city does not have a proprietary interest in the information.

Does the information have monetary value or potential monetary value?

- 53 The third part of the test requires that the information have monetary value, either real or potential, such that disclosure would deprive the municipality or local board of that monetary value.
- 54 It is important to note that whether or not the municipality or local board would suffer harm from the disclosure of the information is not relevant to determining if the information has monetary value.

- 55** In a case involving Ontario Power Generation (“OPG”)¹³, the IPC found that spreadsheets with cost estimates belonging to OPG did not have monetary value. OPG argued that if the spreadsheets were disclosed, its ability to secure future contracts would be adversely impacted and it would be deprived of the opportunity to negotiate with bidders for the most favourable pricing. The IPC rejected this argument and found that while the OPG could suffer harm that results from the disclosure of the spreadsheets, disclosure would not deprive the OPG of the spreadsheets’ monetary value, if any. That is, the fact that disclosure of the spreadsheets could adversely affect the OPG’s ability to secure contracts in the future does not mean that the information at issue also has an intrinsic or monetary value.
- 56** The IPC relied on the OPG case to find that records relating to a request for proposals for student transportation do not have monetary value.¹⁴ In that case, the Thunder Bay Catholic District School Board sought to prevent the disclosure of records including evaluators’ comments, scoring, and pricing information of responses to the request for proposal. The IPC found that those records do not have intrinsic monetary value and that the school board’s arguments against disclosure related to the harms that will result from disclosure, not whether disclosure of the information would deprive the school board of its monetary value.
- 57** In another case involving the Municipality of Chatham-Kent, the IPC found that records relating to alternative ambulance and fire service delivery models do not have monetary value.¹⁵ The municipality argued that it developed the delivery models with the intent to sell the delivery models to other municipalities or ambulance service delivery companies. The IPC found that the delivery models were specific to the municipality and did not reveal details of ambulance or fire services. As such, the information had no monetary value.
- 58** In the present case, the city told my Office that monetary value exists in the report because if the amount of the city’s contribution is disclosed it will negatively impact the city’s competitive position as a potential host city for the Grey Cup and other large-scale events in future. The city explained that if the information is made public, other municipalities and football teams also bidding for the 2020 or 2021 Grey Cup could outbid the Tiger-Cats. In addition, future large-scale events would be negatively impacted on the same basis.

- 59 I do not agree and find that the third part of the test is not satisfied. The city's position does not address whether or not the information at issue has monetary value. Rather, the city focuses on the harm of the disclosure – that is, the potential loss of economic benefits and revenue for the city. The IPC has consistently found that the fact that the disclosure would adversely affect an institution's ability to secure contracts in the future does not mean that the information has an intrinsic monetary value. There is no indication that the information contained in the report has any monetary value, nor is there any indication that disclosure of the information would deprive the city of its monetary value.
- 60 Accordingly, the closed session discussion does not fit within the exception for information belonging to the municipality.

Applicability of the “negotiations” exception

- 61 The new exception for negotiations is found in subsection 239(2)(k) of the Act and provides for a meeting to be closed if the subject matter being considered is:
- a position, plan, procedure, criteria or instruction to be applied to any negotiations carried on or to be carried on by or on behalf of the municipality or local board.
- 62 The committee cited this exception when it moved into the second closed session.
- 63 In a recent report to the City of St. Catharines, my Office considered the new negotiations exception and reviewed the case law of the IPC.¹⁶ As I have previously stated, these decisions are helpful with respect to the applicability of the open meeting exceptions. In that case, my Office found that the purpose of the exception is to protect information that could undermine a municipality or local board's bargaining position or give the public an unfair advantage over the municipality or local board. In order for the exception to apply, the municipality or local board must show that:
1. the *in camera* discussion was about positions, plans, procedures, criteria or instructions;
 2. the positions, plans, procedures, criteria or instructions are intended to be applied to negotiations;
 3. the negotiations are being carried on currently, or will be carried on in future; and

4. the negotiations are being conducted by or on behalf of the municipality or local board.

- 64 We were told that in November 2018 city staff began confidential negotiations with the Tiger-Cats to determine a satisfactory contribution by the city to the Tiger-Cats' bid. The negotiations focused on determining an appropriate role and responsibilities for the city based on the Tiger-Cats' concept for the 2020 or 2021 Grey Cup. According to the acting director, if the Tiger-Cats were successful, the city would experience economic benefits from increased tourism and a boost to the city's profile as host city. The Tiger-Cats would benefit from the infusion of city services to their bid which would otherwise be unavailable or come at a direct cost to the team.

Was the discussion about positions, plans, procedures, criteria or instructions?

- 65 In a 2002 decision, the IPC determined that in order to satisfy the first part of the test, there must be "some evidence that a course of action or manner of proceeding is "pre-determined", that is, there is some organized structure or definition given to the course to be taken." ¹⁷ The IPC found that a "plan" is "a formulated and especially detailed method by which a thing is to be done; a design, or scheme." With respect to positions, procedures, criteria, and instructions, the Commissioner found that these terms "are similarly referable to pre-determined courses of action or ways of proceeding."
- 66 The *in camera* discussion fits within the definition of a plan. During the January 16 closed session, we were told that staff sought direction from the committee on how to proceed in negotiations with the Tiger-Cats. We were told by staff that the committee discussed staff's recommended contribution to the Tiger-Cats' bid and other options for proceeding with the city's contribution.

Are the positions, plans, procedures, criteria or instructions intended to be applied to negotiations?

- 67 This part of the test is satisfied. The committee approved the recommended contribution and directed staff to proceed via certain steps with respect to the negotiations with the Tiger-Cats. These steps are contained in the direction to staff passed during the closed session and include formalizing the city's contribution in an agreement with the Tiger-Cats.

Are the negotiations being carried on currently or will be carried on in the future?

68 This part of the test is satisfied. At the time of the January 16 meeting, city staff were engaged in negotiations with the Tiger-Cats.

Are the negotiations being conducted by or on behalf of the municipality?

69 This part of the test is satisfied. Staff conduct the negotiations with the Tiger-Cats on behalf of the city.

70 The four-part test for the negotiations exception is satisfied. While *in camera*, the committee formulated a plan and directed staff with respect to the city's ongoing negotiations with the Tiger-Cats to participate and contribute to the Tiger-Cats' bid for the 2020 or 2021 Grey Cup.

71 Accordingly, the *in camera* discussion fit within the negotiations exception.


72 To assist municipal councils, staff, and citizens, we have developed an online digest of open meeting decisions that contains summaries of the Ombudsman's open meeting cases. This searchable repository was created to provide easy access to the Ombudsman's past decisions on, and interpretations of, the open meeting rules. Council members and staff can consult the digest to inform their discussions and decisions on if a matter should or may be discussed in closed session, as well as issues related to open meeting procedure. Summaries of all the Ombudsman's previous decisions cited in this report can be found in the digest.

Opinion

73 The General Issues Committee for the City of Hamilton did not violate the *Municipal Act, 2001* on January 16, 2019 when it discussed the city's contribution to the Hamilton Tiger-Cats' bid for the 2020 or 2021 Grey Cup in two closed sessions. The first closed session fit within the exception for advice subject to solicitor-client privilege. While the second *in camera* discussion did not fit within the exceptions for advice subject to solicitor-client privilege or information belonging to the municipality, the discussion fit within the exception for negotiations.

Report

- 74 The city was given the opportunity to review a preliminary version of this report and provided comments to our office.
- 75 My report should be shared with council and made available to the public as soon as possible, and no later than the next council meeting.

I'll begin by introducing myself. My name is Darren Stewart-Jones.

I am two-time nominee for a City of Hamilton Arts Award for my work with The HamilTEN Festival, a festival of ten minute plays that I founded eight years ago. HamilTEN has become one of the Hamilton theatre community's most popular annual events. It runs every year in April.

I am also a Real Estate professional and a member of the Realtors Association of Hamilton-Burlington. I have been buying and selling homes for clients in Hamilton for a couple of years now, including police officers and members of the LGBTQ community.

My volunteer activities include delivering Meals on Wheels through the Victorian Order of Nurses here in Hamilton. I believe I am an active, civically engaged citizen of the City of Hamilton. I also happen to be gay.

I am so disheartened by the anti-queer sentiment that seems to be festering in the City of Hamilton over the past several weeks. I have made my disappointment with the Chief of Police and the Mayor clear on social media.

A few items I would like addressed by the Mayor and Council are as follows:

1. Although the Hamilton Police Service feels they were placed in a somewhat difficult situation to do their best to protect Pride participants while not actively participating themselves in the event, they need to figure out what went wrong at the event and how things could have gone better. The dismissive quote of "We weren't invited" by Police Chief Eric Girt is not enough. Your citizens deserve better than that. We also deserve a Mayor and Police Department that truly respect ALL of Hamilton's citizens no matter their religion, gender, race or sexual orientation. Are you, truthfully, fully supportive of Hamilton's LGBTQ community? I need to know. I need to feel safe again in the city that I call home. I believe an investigation into police conduct at Pride is warranted. Hurt feelings cannot interfere with the HPS performing their duties.
2. I am shocked that the City of Hamilton has allowed groups that have ties to white supremacy to congregate in front of our City Hall every weekend for months now. These hate groups have become the face of Hamilton online and in the media. Is this the message we want to send to the world? I believe there must be a way for the city to disallow protests that involve hate speech from happening on city property. There should be a zero tolerance policy for hate speech in Hamilton.
3. Why was the LGBTQ candidate denied a seat on the Police Advisory Board? Is there perhaps an extra seat on the board for said candidate considering the events of this past week?
4. Is the individual identified as a White Supremacist still on City payroll? If so, why?

5. What is the point of having an LGBTQ advisory board if the Mayor refuses to take their advice? The Pride flag should not have been raised. Does the Mayor now admit that there are severely strained relations between City Hall/HPS and Hamilton's LGBTQ community? Perhaps heeding the advice of the advisory board would assist.

Your attention to the above matters would be greatly appreciated. Please advise me on what dates council expects to review my inquiries.

Re: Violence at this year's Pride events and protests in the City Hall forecourt

Dear Mayor and Councillors:

Like many other Hamiltonians, we condemn the violence and hatred directed against people attending this year's Pride celebrations at Gage Park. We, as a religious faith built on the principle that all people have worth and dignity, stand with all people of good will in condemning hatred.

While we respect religious freedom and the right of people to make up their own minds about what they believe, we reject shaming directed at any identifiable group as contrary to the Golden Rule, found in Christianity but also most other major religions, that calls for us to do to others what we would want done to us, and to not do to others what we would not want done to us.

We note with dismay the continuing presence in the City Hall forecourt each Saturday of people who express hatred of Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people and other minority groups and that they are joined by members of other extremist groups, from Proud Boys to the Canadian Nationalist Party. Even before Pride, some of these rallies turned violent.

We note with dismay that a significant minority of Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people in Hamilton, and most trans and gender non-conforming people, do not feel safe here, as the recent *Mapping the Void: Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ Experiences in Hamilton* (June 11, 2019) report showed. The June 18 community meeting at City Hall made clear that those feelings have been heightened by the violence against Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people at Pride.

We note with dismay the evidence that relations between Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people and the City, as well as with the Hamilton Police Service, were already strained before Pride and have become more strained since. A particular sore point is that the rallies in the City Hall forecourt still continue. They are an ongoing affront to Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people, and ought to be to all Hamiltonians.

In the spirit of inclusion, and in solidarity with our Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ siblings, we urge Council:

- To immediately suspend and ultimately deny permission for the City Hall forecourt to be used for rallies that express hate against identifiable people. These rallies have shown they can spill from nasty words to violence and are reasonably likely to do so again.
- To engage in dialogue with willing participants from Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ communities. The first order of business should be for councillors to listen to and

learn about the experiences of living in Hamilton today as Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people.

- To encourage the Hamilton Police Service to engage in a similar exercise of listening.
- To avoid reacting to the expressions of frustration from the Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ communities until Council has taken the time to do that listening.
- And we urge each councillor to read the *Mapping the Void* report and the earlier *Speak Out! Community Consultations on Making Hamilton an LGBTIQ+ Positive City* (September 2018) and for Council to act on the reports' recommendations.

We offer any help we can provide, including use of our space, for dialogue and efforts to advance issues important to Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people, to improve where possible relations between them and the City and police, and most importantly, to ensure that Two Spirit and LGBTIQ+ people are safe and welcome wherever they are in this city.

Dear Mr. Mayor,

It is with great disappointment that I witness the deteriorating situation in Hamilton specifically regarding the City's failing relationship with the 2SLGBTQ Advisory Committee, Pride Hamilton and the increased bravado of Yellow Vests (among other groups') demonstrations at City Hall.

I believe partial blame rests with myself and other residents who attempted to ignore the weekly demonstrations in the City Hall forecourt by Yellow Vests and other nationalist groups. It was hoped they would halt their activity if they did not get attention. Unfortunately, this was not the case.

The escalation of their activities to violence at the Pride Festival was to be expected, and indeed was warned about by the Pride Committee Chair, Cameron Kroetsch. The HPS handled the event very badly -- there is no getting around that fact. The subsequent arrest of Cedar Hopperton at the peaceful demonstration on Saturday, June 22 was a disgusting display of ignorance by the HPS.

I question the role the City has played in the increasing tension with its utter obliviousness to the inequity and discrimination suffered in the 2SLGBTQ community. The following are examples of the lack of leadership displayed by City officials:

- The continued employment of [REDACTED] in the city's I.T. department (who may indeed have access to read this email before it reaches your inbox);
- The secrecy around [REDACTED]'s employment, including the absence of his name from staff lists – who was responsible for that cover-up?
- The decision to appoint Fred Benninck to the citizen seat on the HPS board despite calls from the community to revisit the decision and appoint a community member from a marginalized group;
- The arbitrary decision to cap the membership of the LGBTQ Advisory Committee to nine members;
- Not conducting interviews with applicants for the LGBTQ Advisory committee;
- Raising the Pride flag at City Hall despite the LGBTQ Committee's request not to do so.

There is a lot of work to be done. Passing statements about "solidarity" and claiming to "not tolerate hate" will not repair the damage that has been done.

I contend the root of most issues within the relationships between the leadership at City Hall and marginalized communities is the continued mishandling of our own procedural by-law, specifically Bylaw 18-270, By-Law to Govern the Proceedings of Council and Committees of Council and the refusal of Council and the Acting City Clerk to strive towards more transparency and accountability in city governance.

Who made the decisions to cap the membership of the LGBTQ Advisory Committee and to not conduct interviews? Who made the decision to appoint Fred Benninck to the HPS board? These decisions and the process for arrival at the

decisions should be evident in the public record. The longer this city continues to refuse to follow its own rules and procedures, the more relationships with citizen groups will suffer. We have seen the effects in the last couple of years as tensions rise and residents become angrier about the underhandedness of city governance.

I love my city, as you are probably aware, however, during the last couple of weeks, it has been impossible to maintain my support for city politicians and the HPS.

You have made the first step in issuing your statement on Tuesday. But the work to repair relationships will not be completed within a short time frame. I recommend humility and willingness to learn and listen to what needs to be done. Listen with your whole heart and mind to the voices of the communities you, and other city leaders, have ignored.

Dear Councillors,

I am writing today to share my deep concern over the events that began at Hamilton Pride on June 15th and that are continuing.

I know that many councillors have received letters about this issue, and I am sure I do not need to go into to detail about how hate groups physically attacked Hamilton citizens and then left the city to do the exact same things in Toronto. I do not need to talk about how these groups brag online about how the police are “probably saluting and cheering for us all right now” for their attacks on Hamilton Pride.

I'm sure council is also aware that Hamilton has the third highest level of reported hate crimes in Canada. These are, of course, only the reported ones. There has been an acknowledgement from the Mayor just yesterday that the city needs to do better. That the City is committed to listening to the 2SLGBTQ community. It would be good if the City started with volunteer advisory committee that is already in place.

But while the Mayor was composing these heartening words, Hamilton Police was arresting another 2SLGBTQ activist. That's the second one. Instead of arresting the members of hate groups who attacked the 2SLGBTQ community, the our police force is arresting members of the community who experienced the violence.

It's no wonder the Yellow Vests believe the police are applauding them.

This builds on Chief Grit's on air statement that if his officers had been invited to Pride he would have deployed them differently. The chief noted the service's request to have a recruitment booth at Pride was denied. I guess in Hamilton, you only get police protection if the police chief likes you and you give him what he wants.

Of course, members of the 2SLGBTQ community have long known they cannot expect protection from the police. A friend shared a heart-rending story of how he and his partner were beaten up after he dared to console him in public. His partner had collapsed in his arms sobbing after learning of a cancer diagnosis and the necessary treatment. When my friend came to with broken ribs in St. Joe's the police officer assigned to investigate his attack told him to "act less gay and maybe you won't get beaten." No charges were laid despite there being multiple eyewitnesses to the beatings.

It is rank hypocrisy for the Mayor to call on members of this community to come forward to the police in this kind of climate.

Right now I know of four young people who are part of the 2SLGBTQ community. They are gifted musicians and artists, they excel academically and they are deeply committed to helping others. They volunteer for their communities, they want to share, they want to make this world a better place. They have so much to give. And their lives are in danger in Hamilton.

Because the Hamilton Police have made it clear it's okay to attack their community here. They'll sit in their squad cars at the far end of the park, and stroll over when the violence starts. They'll ignore the hate crimes reported to them. They'll tell people to not be so "gay" if they don't want a beating.

We need a full review of the culture of the Hamilton Police Department. We need better oversight, and we need a new Chief of Police. Let's do this before one of these bright, bright young people I know are found dead in our streets.

It is our understanding that there is a report going to Council for final approval this Wednesday to restrict Aberdeen Avenue between Queen Street and Dundurn Street to only two lanes with the other two lanes being used for parking. As a Ward 1 business, with significant youth programming, lane reductions on Aberdeen will cause my customers significant hardship and risk their safety. A red light camera at Queen and Aberdeen would do significantly more for safety than eliminate half the lanes for traffic.

Soccer World offers early evening programming for over 300 children each weekday. Our programs range from 17months – 12yrs which requires their parents to drive. Although the majority of traffic is counter rush hour direction there is always significant traffic on Aberdeen and Dundurn. Further reducing the lanes will mean additional idling of vehicles and redirection of significant volumes onto residential side streets.


Aberdeen/Beckett/Garth and Wilson/Main West are the only two detour options when the Linc and/or 403 are closed. Days when there is a vehicle accident on the 403 forces traffic or bad weather significant traffic is diverted to the Aberdeen/Beckett/Garth emergency corridor. 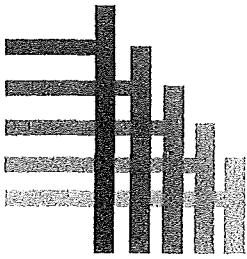



On balance, this has been a collaborative relationship that has benefitted both the City of Hamilton and the workers that call Hamilton home.

That Councillors would vote in support of ripping up any collective agreement, and to use Premier Doug Ford as their excuse, flies in the face of the many positive public statements that the Mayor and many members of this Council have made in support of organized labour.

In a race to the bottom, it is workers health and safety, and community building efforts such as apprenticeships and equity programs that are first to go. The negative social costs that will occur through ripping up this collective agreement are not worth the costs.

It is bad enough, as an employer, to not use unionized labour or actively prevent the use of unionized labour.

Worst of all, however, is to take a signed commitment made by the City of Hamilton and tear it up in the faces of workers who have brought quality and dedication to the builds in this city.

What trust can we have in future Hamilton contracts and agreements if this one is so easily discarded.

We should be better than this. We should look to strengthen relationships that give Hamiltonians the best value builds for the money and not frivolously squander the safety of workers and our citizens for a few percentage points.

We should be proud to pay for the best value builds where our Hamilton workers go home safe.

It is not too late to reconsider and reverse Committee's decision. Vote to uphold Hamilton's values and your labour agreement with the Carpenters' Union.

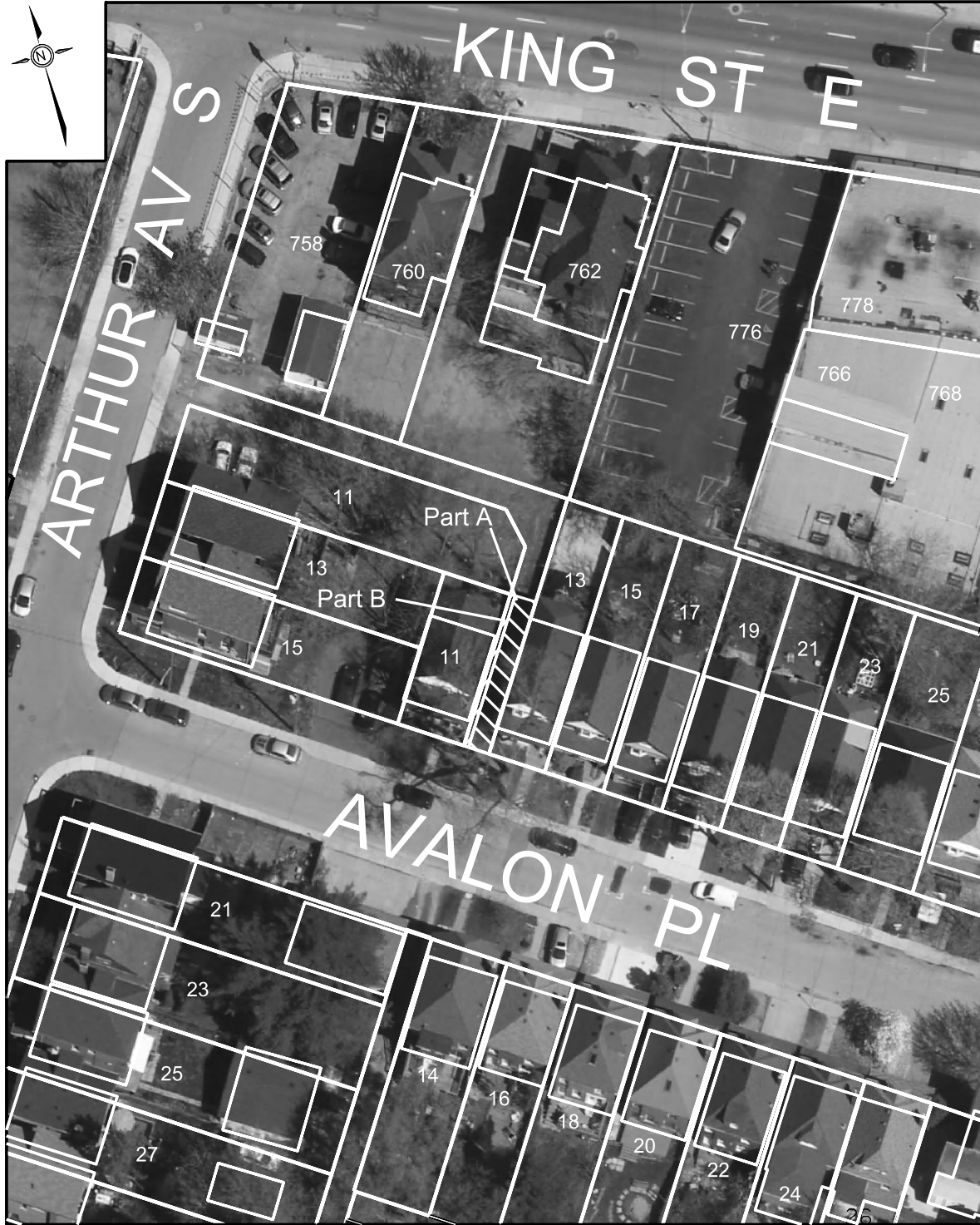

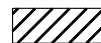

That Planning staff report back to Planning Committee on a strategy for informing residents that goes beyond the traditional newspaper advertisement in the event of future disruptions in mail delivery service.

14. 1 Main Street North, Waterdown (The Royal Coachman) - Register of Property of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest (Item 11.2)

WHEREAS, 1 Main Street North, Waterdown, known as the Royal Coachman property, is listed on the *Inventory of Building of Architectural and/or Historic Interest*, but is not currently recognized through registration or protected through designation under the *Ontario Heritage Act*;

WHEREAS, based on a preliminary evaluation of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest conducted as part the Waterdown Village Built Heritage Inventory, 1 Main Street North, Waterdown meet the criteria specified in Ontario Regulation 9/06 including, but not limited to:

- Historical associations with early transportation and lodging in the village. The property has a direct association with the Kirk family, who built and operated the Kirk House Hotel (now the Royal Coachman) for approximately 80 years (1880's-1960's). Additionally, the property has the potential to yield information that contributes to the understanding of the community through additional research.
- Physical and architectural design value as the property is a representative style of the Queen Anne Revival style, which was popular in Ontario between 1870 and 1910. The property displays a high degree of craftsmanship, including but not limited to the projecting bay with wood paneling and decorated barge board on the primary elevation.
- Contextual associations as it is important in defining the historical character of the area, is physically, functionally and historically linked to its surroundings, and is considered to be a local landmark.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That Council add the property located at 1 Main Street North, Waterdown, to the City's *Register of Property of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest* as a non-designated property, providing 60-days of interim protection from demolition; and,
- (b) That Council direct staff to add 1 Main Street North (the Royal Coachman), Waterdown, to staff's designation work plan and be assigned immediate priority for Heritage Designation in Q4.

WHEREAS, these incentive programs have contributed to the creation of approximately 700 new residential dwelling units and 134 renovated dwelling units since 2002;

WHEREAS, these incentives require that all residential units meet current property standards, fire code standards, and proper zoning as well as building code requirements; thereby, creating safe and legal residential dwelling units;

WHEREAS, these incentive programs continue to provide an important means by which the City is helping to increase housing supply in Hamilton;

WHEREAS, there is community concern that there is the potential that the property improvements supported by these incentive programs could potentially contribute to the displacement of vulnerable tenants;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- (a) That staff be directed to make any necessary modifications to the guidelines and criteria for the Barton/Kenilworth Tax Increment Grant Program; the Barton/Kenilworth Commercial Corridor Building Improvement Grant Program; the Barton/Kenilworth Commercial Planning and Building Fee Rebate Program; the Commercial Corridor Housing Loan and Grant Program; and, the Hamilton Tax Increment Grant Program to ensure that:
 - (i) Any property improvements funded by these incentive programs do not result in the permanent displacement of an existing tenant, as a result of the improvement;
 - (ii) Tenants are provided full and comprehensive information, verified by, and in consultation with Housing Services staff, regarding their legal rights if any property improvements that are funded by these incentive programs have the potential to disrupt or impact the tenants; and,
 - (iii) The explicit value and nature of the City's financial contribution to any property improvement is disclosed to the Landlord and Tenant Board in any matter involving an application for an above-guideline rent increase.

ROXBOROUGH HOUSING INCENTIVE PILOT PROGRAM

Program Guidelines

Background

Located in the McQueston Neighbourhood, the Roxborough Community Improvement Project Area (CIPA), is intended to encourage revitalization initiatives and stimulate development in what has been identified as a vulnerable area with acute housing needs. The CIPA allows municipalities to provide incentives to assist in the revitalization of lands and/or building within the defined Community Improvement Project Area.

Through Community Improvement Plans, municipalities can:

- focus public attention on local priorities and municipal initiatives
- target areas in transition or in need of repair, rehabilitation and redevelopment
- facilitate and encourage community change in a co-ordinated manner
- stimulate private sector investment through municipal incentive-based programs

The goal of the Roxborough Housing Incentive Pilot Program is to minimize the financial barriers to create affordable housing in the existing Roxborough CIPA by introducing incentives in the form of providing exemptions in the forms of forgivable loans for development charges and parkland dedication fees. The intent of this Pilot project is to demonstrate how a mixed tenure, mixed income development can produce positive outcomes and be used as a model for future incentive programs to promote the development of affordable housing across Hamilton including outside of the downtown.

1. Program Details

The Roxborough Housing Incentive Program (the “RHIPP”) is available to property owners within the Roxborough CIPA. It allows developers of affordable rental or ownership housing units to receive exemptions of the City of Hamilton’s development charges and parkland dedication fees for 10 years after the issuance of a building permit.

Developers of rental units will be required to enter into an agreement with the City, registered on Title, to maintain that unit prices and rents meet the City’s definition of affordable for a minimum period of 10 years.

Developers of affordable homeownership units will be required to enter into an agreement with the City stating that the funding will be provided to off-set development charges and parkland dedication fees. This funding is then converted by housing providers/developers into reductions in the purchase price of newly created units. The program is modelled after the existing federal/provincial down payment assistance program so that funds can potentially be combined for even deeper affordability.

2. Program Terms & Criteria

Approval is at the absolute discretion of the City and subject to the availability of funds

Eligibility Criteria

All projects must meet these minimum requirements:

- have primary use as residential
- be located in the Roxborough CIPA
- For rental units, not exceed 175% of the average market rent, by unit size in the applicable rental market zone
- For affordable homeownership units, exemptions provided the homes are sold for a minimum 20% below average sale price of new construction and individual purchasers have demonstrated moderate to low income and do not own any other residential property.

2.2.- Affordability Period

Rental Units

The development charge and parkland dedication fee exemptions will act as a forgivable loan provided rents remain affordable for 10 years after the issuance of a building permit. The loan is secured on Title throughout the affordability period ensuring rents remain affordable for the full period regardless of a transfer of property ownership.

Affordable Homeownership

Funding will be provided to off-set development charges and parkland dedication fees. This funding is then converted by housing providers/developers into down payment assistance loans to make the homes more affordable for eligible purchasers.

2.3 – Eligible Proponents

The RHIPP is open to:

- community housing providers (i.e. public or private non-profit housing organizations or rental co-operatives)
- municipalities
- Indigenous groups and organizations
- private sector organizations

2.4 - Location

Developments shall be located within the City of Hamilton, Roxborough CIPA [Map \(attached as Appendix “B” to Report HSC19034\)](#)

3. Maximum Grant Amount

Grants are up to a total maximum of 100% of the municipal development charge and parkland dedication fees. Educational development charges are out of scope as part of this program and will be due at the time of building permit issuance.

4. Repayment Terms

Repayment of the loan is not required unless there is a violation of any program terms and conditions.

5. Application Process and Approvals

Developers will complete the application package, submit the completed package to the Housing Services Division in advance of obtaining a building permit. The full amount of the development charge and parkland dedication fee will be exempted at the time of payment of the initial building permit. Agreements securing the exemptions will be signed with the City in advance of permit issuance.

6. Documentation Required for Records

The Housing Services Division is responsible for retaining the following documents seven years beyond the life of the program:

- Signed application package, including all required accompanying documentation
- Letter of approval to proponent from City of Hamilton
- All invoices and internal journals for all eligible expenditures
- Records of all payments and defaults
- Copies of rent rolls, unit information
- For affordable homeownership units, personal information about prospective unit

owners confirming income, age, ability to pay and confirmation purchasers do not own other residential property. This information is gathered through a supplemental application package completed by the prospective home buyer.

7. Remedies

In the event there is a violation of the terms of the pilot program at any point during the affordability period, the value of the development charge incentive and parkland fees are due to the City on a pro-rated basis. The City has the authority to collect debts through a variety of measures including adding outstanding accounts to the tax roll of the property and collect them in the same manner as municipal taxes.

For Rental Units

The property owner must provide an annual statement and information package to the City confirming that each unit remains affordable. Rents may increase annually in accordance with market prices as long as they continue to meet the City's definition of affordable.

The 10-year affordability period is secured on Title ensuring rents remain affordable regardless of a transfer of property ownership. If at any point during the 10-year affordability period, the units are no longer deemed affordable by the City or the developer fails to meet program criteria, the developer or subsequent property owner will be required to pay the City development charges and parkland fees.

Proportional expiry – for each year the rental property conforms to the affordability requirements of the plan the cost of violation is reduced by 10% of the original investment.

For Homeownership

The development charges and parkland waivers will be secured through an agreement between the City and the Developer. This agreement will ensure the following eligibility of future purchasers is secured prior to final purchase and sale:

- The purchaser is of moderate to low income;
- The purchaser shall not own any other residential property; and,
- The purchaser is not a business or entity.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC), in conjunction with McMaster Children's Hospital, has requested that the Hamilton Paramedic Service, operated by the City of Hamilton, provide a dedicated ambulance resource to support their neo-natal intensive care medical outreach team.

The MOHLTC, through an Inter-Facility Transfer funding agreement proposes to fund 100% of the required capital equipment and staffing costs of this dedicated ambulance resource, with such agreement to be extended from year to year as mutually agreed.

Alternatives for Consideration – Not Applicable

FINANCIAL – STAFFING – LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Financial:

Financial staff were involved in the development and costing of all aspects of a preliminary 2018 proposal and the November 2019 operating proposal.

The MOHLTC is providing 100% funding for the capital and staffing costs of the dedicated transport vehicle. There is no net levy impact.

Staffing:

The equivalent of ten (10) full time staff are required to provide the dedicated ambulance coverage 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 52 weeks of the year, inclusive of all related backfill costs.

Legal:

The proposed agreement as received from the MOHLTC has been reviewed by legal staff and is in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The Hamilton Health Sciences McMaster Children's Hospital (MCH) operates a 47 bed, tertiary level, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). This NICU is the referral centre for a catchment area of 2.2 million and 27,000 births. The closest adjoining similar NICU programs are located in London and in Toronto. An outreach program, and medical transport team, is operated by the MCH to enable the highest level of assessment, stabilization, and treatment at various outlying hospitals and to then provide care of the patient during transport by ambulance from the referring hospital back to MCH.

The process for several years when an outreach is required for the MCH transport team and related equipment to be transported from MCH to the referring hospital, to stabilize

the patient at the referring hospital, and when the patient is ready for transport back to MCH is for a local ambulance to be assigned to bring the medical team, equipment, and patient back to MCH for a higher level of care.

In accordance with the *Ambulance Act*, the core legislated operating responsibility for the City of Hamilton is to provide the required resources for the provision of emergency land ambulance service to meet the needs of the residents and visitors to the City of Hamilton. Accordingly, our ambulance deployment plan, and our current staffing level, has not provided HPS resources at City of Hamilton expense to pick up a medical team and equipment at MCH, take them to an out of town referring hospital, wait for the medical team at the referring hospital, or to return the medical team, equipment and patient from the out of town referring hospital back to MCH. Such purpose is outside the core funding responsibility of the City of Hamilton.

With an interest on the part of MCH and the MOHLTC to improve the operational capacity of the MCH medical team, the HPS has been contacted several times over the past few years to discuss options for the provision of a dedicated land ambulance resource, operated by the City of Hamilton, for the purpose of transporting medical teams and equipment to the sending hospitals, await the team and patient readiness to return to MCH, and to then transport the patient, team, and equipment back to MCH.

Our expressed position with the MOHLTC and MCH has been that provision of a dedicated ambulance resource to support the MCH operations, and in support of various referral hospital needs, would require 100% funding from either MCH or the MOHLTC.

On October 11, 2018, the MOHLTC convened a teleconference to discuss the potential for implementation of a dedicated ambulance resource in support of the NICU needs.

Subsequent to the October teleconference on November 19 a request for an implementation plan was received from the MOHLTC South West Field Office. An implementation plan was provided in response to this request providing for the addition of one ambulance and the required paramedic staff to provide Neonatal Intensive Care Unit Transport Team transport support 24 hours per day, 365 days of the year.

The proposed implementation of the program for the 2019 calendar year included a one-time capital support in the amount of approximately \$272,345 and staffing wage and benefit costs in the amount of \$1,133,677. For the operating years after 2019 inflationary wage cost increases will be required.

The MOHLTC responded to this on April 5, 2019, with a confidential and embargoed agreement for the provision of the requested dedicated inter-facility transport ambulance in support of the MCH NICU outreach program. That embargo has now been lifted and we are able to bring this report forward for approval. Initiation of the project is possible

within four to six weeks of confirmation of available funding and agreement on the operational aspects of this additional resource

POLICY IMPLICATIONS AND LEGISLATED REQUIREMENTS

Pursuant to the *Ambulance Act* (the Act) the City of Hamilton is the “Designated Delivery Agent (DDA) for all land ambulance services provided in the City of Hamilton. This service is known, and operated under Certificate 718, as the Hamilton Paramedic Service (HPS). The HPS is the sole ambulance provider for the entire City of Hamilton, an area of approximately 1,117 square kilometres and a population of approximately 537,000 people.

In accordance with the Act, the Regulations pursuant to the Act, and the various Directives and Standards pursuant to both the Act and the Regulations, the City of Hamilton, in part;

- Determines the level of land ambulance service required to provide an appropriate level of service to the public within the City of Hamilton; and
- Funds the cost of land ambulance service required to meet the needs of the public; and
- Receives a conditional grant from the Province of Ontario as subsidy for the cost of provision of land ambulance service; and
- Ensures their provision of land ambulance service meets the standards required by the Province of Ontario to achieve and to maintain certification; and
- Ensures the plan provided to the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC) Central Ambulance Communications Centre (CACC) for the deployment of the land ambulance resources it provides is approved in the manner designated by the MOHLTC.

RELEVANT CONSULTATION

Consultation has occurred with McMaster Children’s Hospital and with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care over the past 20 months to identify their needs and to develop a solution.

ANALYSIS AND RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

The need to support the MCH outreach team activities in responding to out of town referral hospitals and returning these critical patients to a higher level of care is apparent. The proposed agreement provides the capacity to support these needs without negatively impacting City of Hamilton taxpayers.

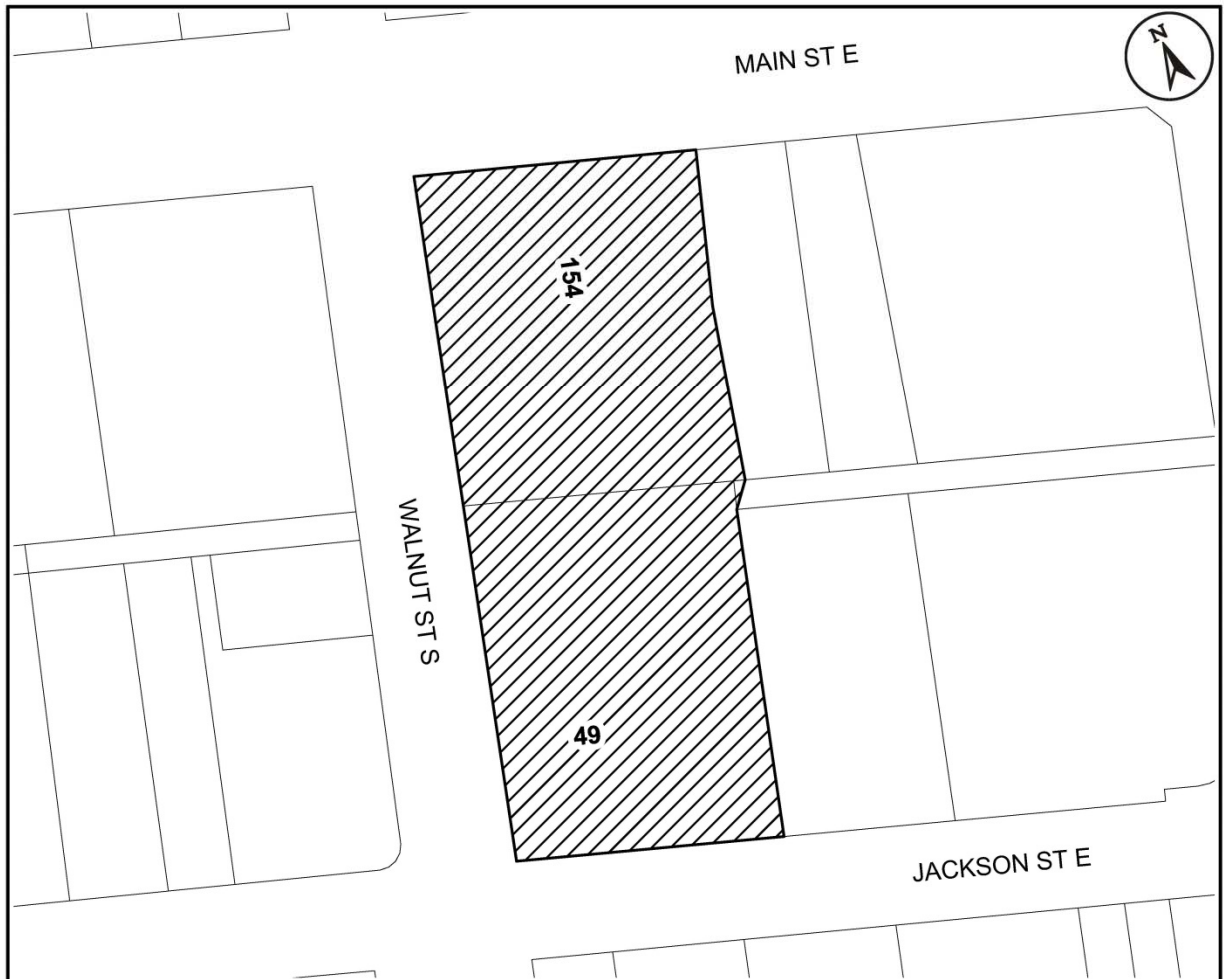

Amendment No. 242
to the
Official Plan of the City of Hamilton

The following text, together with Appendix "A", attached hereto, constitutes Official Plan Amendment No. 242 to the City of Hamilton Official Plan.

1.0 Purpose and Effect:

The purpose and effect of this Amendment is to amend the West Harbour (Setting Sail) Secondary Plan by increasing the building height of the subject lands to permit the development of an eight-storey mixed use building.

2.0 Location:

The lands affected by this Amendment are located at 468, 470, 474, and 476 James Street North in the City of Hamilton.

3.0 Basis:

The basis for permitting this Amendment is as follows:

- The proposed development efficiently utilizes the existing infrastructure, positively contributes to the streetscape and makes use of an underutilized lot;
- The proposed development implements the vision of the West Harbour (Setting Sail) Secondary Plan in maintaining James Street North as a mixed use area, while providing intensification at a form and scale that is in keeping with the character of the surrounding neighbourhood and is in proximity to existing transit;
- The Amendment is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement, 2014 and the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, 2019.

4.0 Changes:

4.1 Mapping Changes:

That Schedule M-4: General Land Use Map of the West Harbour (Setting Sail) Secondary Plan is amended by establishing a new 6-8 storey building height category and apply the new 6-8 storey building height category to the lands at 468, 470, 474, and 476 James Street North, as shown on Appendix "A" of this Amendment.

5.0 Implementation:

An implementing Zoning By-law Amendment and Site Plan Control will give effect to the intended uses on the subject lands.

This is Schedule "1" to By-law No. 19-150 passed on the 26th day of June, 2019.

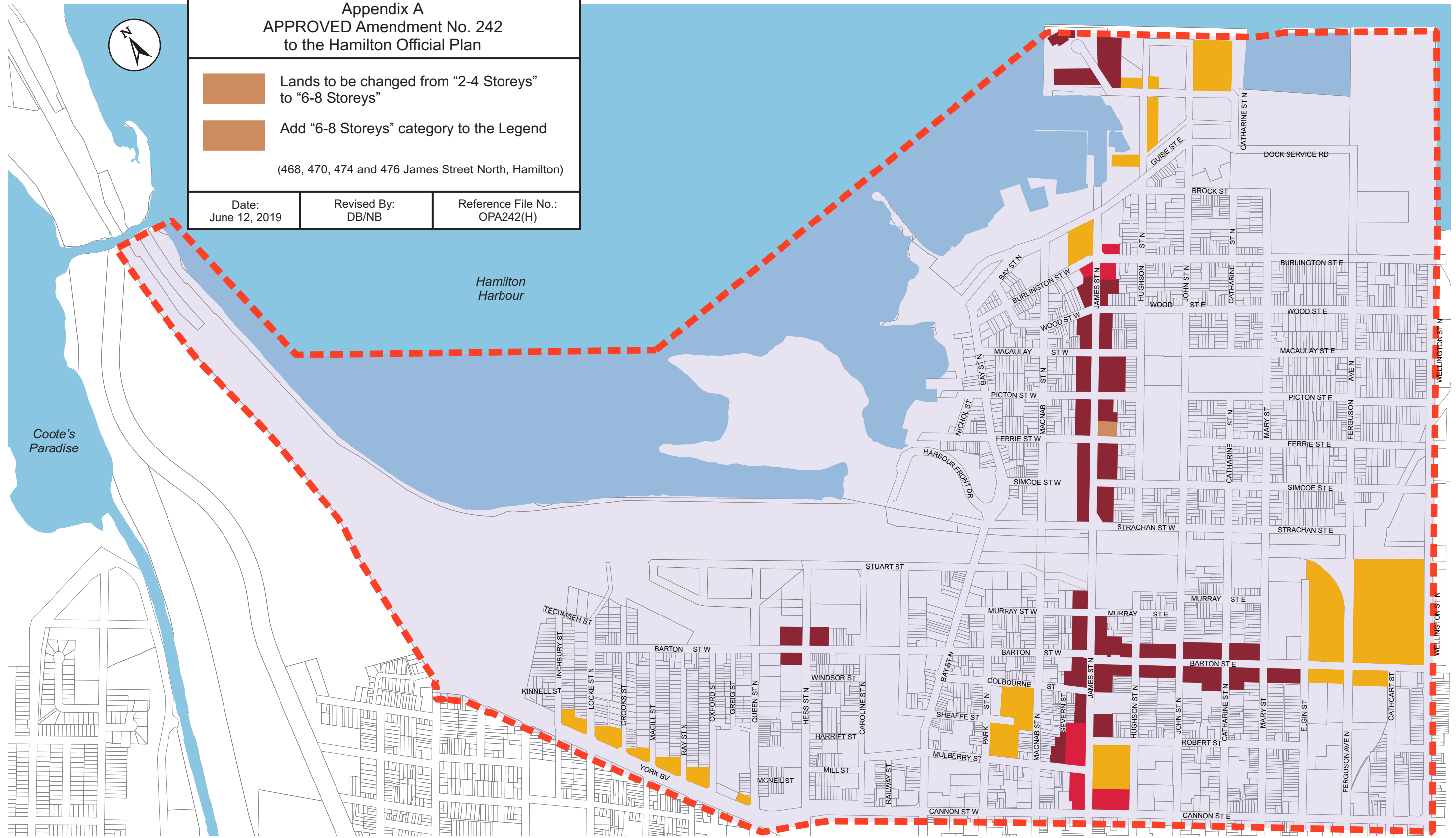

To Amend Zoning By-law No. 6593 (Hamilton) Respecting Land Located at 468, 470, 474 and 476 James Street North (Hamilton)

WHEREAS the Council of the City of Hamilton, in adopting Item 5 of Report 19-009 of the Planning Committee, at its meeting held on the 12th day of June, 2019, recommended that Zoning By-law No. 6593 (Hamilton), be amended as hereinafter provided;

WHEREAS this By-law conforms with the City of Hamilton Official Plan upon adoption of Official Plan Amendment No. 242;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the City of Hamilton enacts as follows:

1. That Sheet No. E2 of the District Maps, appended to and forming part of Zoning By-law No. 6593 (Hamilton) is further modify the "H/S-978" (Community Shopping and Commercial, Etc.) District, Modified, to the "H/S-978a – 'H1', 'H2'" (Community Shopping and Commercial, etc.) District, Holding, Modified, on lands the extent and boundaries of which are shown on plan hereto annexed as Schedule "A".
2. That Section 2 of By-law No. 87-117 (Hamilton) be deleted and replaced with "H/S-978a – 'H1', 'H2'", as follows:

"H/S-978a – 'H1', 'H2'"

That the "H" (Community Shopping and Commercial, Etc.) District provisions as contained in Section 14 of Zoning By-law No. 6593, applicable to the subject lands, be modified to include the following requirements:

- a) In addition to Section (2) (2) (d), a Live Work Unit shall be defined as "A dwelling unit which contains a permitted commercial business operated by the resident of the dwelling unit and provides direct access at grade".
- b) In addition to Section 14 (1), a multiple dwelling shall be permitted.
- c) In addition to Section 14 (1), Live Work Units shall be permitted.
- d) Notwithstanding Section 14 (1), a frosted food locker plant, a motion picture studio, automobile service station or other public garage, theatre and car wash, shall be prohibited.

- e) Notwithstanding Section 14 (2) (ii), no building or structure shall exceed eight storeys or 24.5 metres in height,
- f) Notwithstanding Section 14 (3) (i), a front yard having a depth of not less than 0.5 metres.
- g) Notwithstanding Section 14 (3) (ii), a side yard having a width of not less than 0 metres.
- h) Notwithstanding Section 14 (3) (iii), a rear yard of not less than 7.0 metres for the first and second storeys and 6.5 metres for the third through sixth storeys.
- i) In addition to Section 14 (3), the following yards shall be provided and maintained:
 - i. Where the yard abuts the westerly lot line a yard having a depth of not less than 4.6 metres for the seventh and eighth storeys, and 11.8 metres for the mechanical penthouse.
 - ii. Where the yard abuts the southerly lot line a yard having a depth of not less than 2.8 metres for the seventh and eighth storeys, and 9.0 metres for the mechanical penthouse.
 - iii. Where the yard abuts the easterly lot line a yard having a width of not less than 13.2 metres for the seventh and eighth storeys, and 14.5 metres for the mechanical penthouse.
 - iv. Where the yard abuts the northerly lot line a yard having a width or depth of not less than 15.0 metres for the mechanical penthouse.
- j) Notwithstanding Section 14 (9) (i), a planting strip of not less than 1.2 metres in width shall be provided and maintained, which may include raised planter beds, along the rear lot line, and no planting strip shall be provided along the northerly side lot line.
- k) A minimum of 4 square metres of amenity space per Class A Dwelling Units shall be provided or 655 square metres of amenity space whichever is greater.
- l) A minimum landscaped area of not less than 25% of the area of the lot on which the building or structure is situate, which may include raised planter beds, planter boxes, and green roof area, shall be provided and maintained.
- m) Notwithstanding Section 18 (3) (vi) (a), for a chimney, sill, belt course, leader, pilaster, lintel or ornamental projection may project up to the following:
 - i. within 0 metres of a front or side yard;

- ii. not more than 1.0 metres into a required rear yard for the first through sixth storey and eighth storey; and,
 - iii. not more than 6.7 metres into a required rear yard for the seventh storey.
 - n. Notwithstanding Section 18 (3) (vi) (b) (i) and (iii), a canopy, cornice, eave or gutter may project to within 0 metres of a front or side yard.
 - o. Notwithstanding Section 18 (3) (vi) (cc) (i) and (iii), a bay, balcony or dormer may project to within 0 metres of a front or side yard.
 - p. Notwithstanding Section 18A (1) (a) and (b), a minimum of 0.42 parking spaces per Class A Dwelling Unit shall be provided or 39 parking spaces whichever is greater, of which a minimum of 9 are residential visitor parking spaces and 2 parking spaces shall be for the exclusive purpose of accommodating car sharing vehicles.
 - q. A minimum of 0.07 short term and 0.48 secure long term bicycle parking spaces per Class A Dwelling Unit shall be provided or 7 short term and 45 secure long term bicycle parking spaces whichever is greater.
 - r. Notwithstanding Section 18A (11) (a), not less than 1.2 metres from the rear lot line and 0 metres from the northerly side lot line.
 - s. Notwithstanding Section 18A (12) (a), between the boundary of the parking area and the residential district an area landscaped with a planting strip that is 1.2 metres wide shall be provided along the rear lot line which may include raised planter beds and shall not be required along the northerly side lot line.
 - t. Notwithstanding Section 18A (12) (b), between the boundary of the loading area and the residential district an area landscaped with a planting strip that is 1.2 metres wide shall be provided along the rear lot line which may include raised planter beds and shall not be required along the northerly side lot line.
 - u. Notwithstanding Section 18A (25), where a multiple dwelling is adjacent to a residential district that does not permit such uses, every access driveway to the multiple dwelling shall be located not less than 1.0 metre from the common boundary between the district in which the multiple dwelling is located and the district that does not permit such uses.
 - v. Section 18A (36) shall not apply.
3. That the 'H1' symbol applicable to the lands referred to in Section 2 shall be removed conditional upon:

- (a) The Owner enters into a conditional building permit agreement with respect to completing a Record of Site Condition or a signed Record of Site Condition (RSC) being submitted to the City of Hamilton and the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP). This RSC must be to the satisfaction of the Director of Planning and Chief Planner, including a notice of acknowledgement of the RSC by the MECP, and submission of the City of Hamilton's current RSC administration fee.
4. For such time as the Holding Provision 'H2' symbol is applicable to the lands referred to in Section 2, the lands shall only be used in accordance with "H/S-1769" (Community Shopping and Commercial, etc.) District except where in conflict with the following:
 - (a) Regulations
 - i) The maximum dwelling units and live work units shall be restricted to 99 units.
 - (a) Condition for Holding Provision Removal
 - i) That the applicant submit and receive approval of a Traffic Impact Study where greater than 99 dwelling units/live work units are proposed, to the satisfaction of the Director of Transportation Planning.
 5. That By-law No. 6593 (City of Hamilton) is amended by adding this By-law to Section 19B as Schedule S-978a.
 6. That Sheet No. E2 of the District maps is amended by making the lands referred to in Section 1 of this By-law as Schedule S-978a.
 7. That the Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to proceed with the giving of notice of the passing of this By-law, in accordance with the *Planning Act*.

AND WHEREAS this By-law is in conformity with the Urban Hamilton Official Plan, upon finalization of Official Plan Amendment No. 123,

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the City of Hamilton enacts as follows:

1. That Map 1199 of Schedule "A" – Zoning Maps to Zoning By-law 05-200 are amended by:
 - (a) Incorporating additional Neighbourhood Institutional (I1, 726) Zone on lands described as Block 1, the extent and boundaries of which are shown on a plan hereto annexed as Schedule "A" and;
 - (b) For a change in zoning from the Neighbourhood Institutional (I1) Zone to Neighbourhood Institutional (I1, 726) Zone, on lands described as Block 2, the extent and boundaries of which are shown on a plan hereto annexed as Schedule "A".
2. That Schedule "C" – Special Exceptions of Zoning By-law No. 05-200, is hereby amended by passing the following site specific Neighbourhood Institutional (I1, 726) Zone:
 - "726. Within the lands zoned Neighbourhood Institutional (I1, 726) Zone, identified on Map 1199 of Schedule "A" – Zoning Maps and described as 514 and 516 Barton Street and 293 Dewitt Road, the following special provisions shall apply:
 - a) Notwithstanding Subsection 4.5 a) the following special provision shall apply:
 - i) Dwellings on a Lot Two single detached dwellings may be permitted on the same lot containing a place of worship.

b) Notwithstanding Sections 8.1.3.1d), 8.1.3.1e), 8.1.3.1g) of this By-law the following special provisions shall apply:

- i) Minimum Front Yard Setback 4.4 metres
- ii) Minimum Northerly Side Yard Setback 1.1 metres
- iii) Minimum Rear Yard Setback 4.6 metres

c) Notwithstanding Subsection 5.6b)ii) for a place of worship and in addition to Subsection 8.1.3.1 k) of this By-law the following special provision shall apply:

- Parking 1 parking space for every 14 square metres of gross floor area for a place of worship, inclusive of a basement or cellar, to accommodate such use.

3. That the Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to proceed with the giving of notice of the passing of this By-law, in accordance with the *Planning Act*.
4. That this By-law No. shall come into force and be deemed to have come into force in accordance with Subsection 34(12) of the *Planning Act*, either upon the date of passage of this By-law or as provided by the said Subsection.
