## (i) 2020 Waste System Contract Planning (Item 8.1)

# (a) C11-46-20 – Management and Processing of the City of Hamilton's Green Cart Material

Staff provided an update on the Request for Proposals (RFP) for the management and processing of the City of Hamilton green cart material, which closed on January 4, 2021. A recommendation report outlining the RFP outcome will be presented at the May 17, 2021 Public Works Committee meeting.

## (ii) Waste-Free Ontario Act Updates (Item 8.2)

## (a) Status of the Blue Box Transition

Staff provided an update on the status of the Blue Box program transition. The Blue Box Program Regulation is expected to be released by Spring 2021. Hamilton Staff joined the Continuous Improvement Fund's (CIF) Transition Working Groups to help

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prepare Ontario municipalities and First Nations communities to transition their Blue Box Programs.

## (b) Proposed Hazardous and Special Products (HSP) Regulation

Staff provided information on the Proposed Hazardous and Special Products (HSP) Regulation. On April 29, 2021, the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) directed Stewardship Ontario to extend the deadline to wind up the existing Municipal Hazardous or Special Waste (MHSW) Program from June 30, 2021 to September 30, 2021. The proposed HSP regulation is to make producers environmentally accountable and financially responsible for collecting and managing HSP at end-of-life.

## (iii) Operations Update (Item 8.3)

## (a) Waste Collection Service Contract Commencement

Staff provided an update on the new waste collection service contract which began on March 29, 2021. GFL Environmental Inc. is the service provider for the new contract. The transition has been smooth with no service interruptions.

# (b) Hamilton-Wentworth Catholic District School Board Request for Tender for Waste and Recycling Collection and Disposal Services

Staff shared information on the Hamilton-Wentworth Catholic District School Board (HWCDSB) Request for Tender for Waste and Recycling Collection and Disposal Services.

On April 15, 2021, the HWCDSB) issued a Tender for the collection and disposal of garbage, recycling and organic materials with a work start date of September 1, 2021.

The City currently provides recycling and green cart collection and processing services for the HWCDSB. The City is unable to bid on the Tender since it is outside of the City's waste collection contract scope. The City's existing services for the HWCDSB will end by August 31, 2021.

## (c) Multi-Residential Waste Audits

Staff provided a summary of the multi-residential waste audits which were undertaken in January to March 2021. Preliminary audit information included waste generation, waste diversion rate, capture rate and contamination rate. Additional information on the final results will be presented at a future meeting.

## (d) Solid Waste Collection Design Requirements for Developments

Staff provided information on the proposed changes to the Waste Collection Design Requirements document. The new document will include the requirement for buildings to install a chute system capable of diverting waste, as per Council direction. Staff is developing the transition policy for development application to meet the new design requirements. The new design requirements will also include the parameters to consider private waste collection.

## (e) Community Outreach and Education

Staff provided an update on the implementation of online request forms for frequently used waste programs including scheduling a bulk waste pick-up and obtaining a service number to pick up a blue box or green bin at a Community Recycling Centre.

## (f) Clean and Green Initiatives

Staff provided information on Ontario's official Day of Action on Litter and shared a summary on local clean-up activities.

# Waste-Free Ontario Act Updates Status of Blue Box Program Transition Item 8.1 (a)

# Status of Blue Box Program Transition

- The final Blue Box program Regulation was released on June 3, 2021.
- The Regulation includes the following key items:
  - Introducing a common blue box collection system across Ontario;
  - Expanding the list of acceptable blue box materials;
  - Defining the eligible sources; and
  - Material management requirements for Producers
- The City's program will transition by April 1, 2025
- Producers are obligated to maintain the existing service levels during the transition period between 2023 to 2025
- The City may not have operational control post-transition (Jan. 1, 2026),
   e.g. collection frequency, container type, etc.



# Status of Blue Box Program Transition

- Municipalities are required to submit an Initial Report to RPRA
- Recycling service review to be completed including:
  - Determine if the City will continue to provide service to properties excluded in the new regulation, e.g. Business Improvement Areas, municipal buildings
  - Assess the impacts on the City's Materials Recycling Facility
  - Review recycling contract impacts, i.e. collection, processing
- Financial and cost benefit analysis on program changes
- Staff will continue to participate in industry subcommittees related to the Blue Box transition





# Waste-Free Ontario Act Updates Hazardous and Special Products Regulation Item 8.1 (b)

# Hazardous and Special Products Regulation

- On July 1, 2021, the HSP Regulation was approved which makes the Producer's responsible for the end of life of these materials
- Producers will be required to operate collection sites and provide public education on collection and management services
- The new regulation includes several product types, i.e. pressurized containers, oil filters, paints and coatings, solvents, pesticides, fertilizers, and propane cylinders; however, it excludes materials which are currently collected in the existing Municipal Hazardous or Special Waste (MHSW) program
- Producers have a 15-month transition period from October 1, 2021 to December 31, 2022

# **Next Steps**

- The City's MHSW depots will continue to operate during the transition (status-quo)
- Staff will meet with the Producer Responsibility Organizations (PROs) to determine if there is interest in utilizing the City's MHSW depots as collection points under the new HSP program.
- If required, a staff report will be prepared to provide information on whether the City should continue to operate the MHSW depots for the products that are not covered under the Regulation.

- Seasonal curbside leaf and yard waste collection will end during the week of November 29<sup>th</sup> to December 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2021
- Yard waste drop-off is available year-round at the Community Recycling Centres

# Waste Processing Service Operations – Central Compost Facility

- Operations and Maintenance Contract C11-46-20 for processing the City's Source Separated Organics was transitioned on June 29, 2021.
- Commissioning of the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system at the Central Compost Facility (CCF) was completed
- Staff completed a ventilation assessment for the CCF and submitted it to the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) which was required by the new Air Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA)



# Waste Processing Service Operations – Material Recycling Facility

- Lighting upgrades were completed at the Materials Recycling Facility (MRF).
- This has reduced the facility's energy consumption by approximately 270,000 Kwh per year, resulting in savings of approximately \$38,000/year



# Waste Processing Service Operations – Traffsfer Stations/Community Recycling Facilities

- Staff revised the scope of work for the construction of the expanded Transfer Station/Community Recycling Centre (TS/CRC) due to cost of land.
- Staff is currently working on securing additional land near the Mountain site (close to reaching capacity) to construct a new CRC and turn the Mountain site exclusively as a Transfer Station.



# Waste Processing Service Operations – Glanbrook Landfill

 Staff is drafting a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the design and construction of Cells C, D and E within stage 3 at Glanbrook Landfill

# Solid Waste Collection Design Requirements

## Overview:

- Staff report currently scheduled to go to PWC on November 1<sup>st</sup>
- Report recommends extending service to multi-residential buildings to include front-end containers for organics and recycling containers

# **Consultation with Development Industry:**

- Presentations on proposed policy were made on January 11th, February 1st, May 11th and July 26th, 2021 to the Development Industry:
  - Development Industry Liaison Group (DILG),
  - West End Home Builder's Association (WEHBA)
  - Hamilton/Burlington Society of Architects (HBSA)
- On July 15, 2021, a draft version of the policy was circulated to both the WEHBA and the HBSA. WEHBA provided comments on August 11<sup>th</sup>, 2021

## **Consultation with PED:**

Waste staff have received support from PED staff on the proposed policy





# Operations Update Waste Management System By-law Item 8.2 (d)

# Waste Management System By-law

## **Amendments:**

- Waste Management System By-law (20-221) requires amendment to:
  - Allow fines to be issued under the by-law per direction from the Ministry of the Attorney General
  - Permit front-end containers to be used at multi-residential buildings for organics and recycling containers
  - Limit the size of garbage and yard waste containers for curbside collection
  - Make minor numbering and grammatical revisions

## **Next steps:**

- The staff report is currently scheduled to go to PWC on October 18<sup>th</sup>
- Includes rationale for updated fines and updated fine schedule

- Waste collection safety videos are available on the City's website: Hamilton.ca/WasteCollectionSafety



### **Purpose**

This report (BOH20015) and the accompanying presentation provide the Board of Health (BOH) with an overview of the profile of the social determinants of health (SDOH) among Hamilton's COVID-19 cases, and outlines actions staff are taking to address health inequities among vulnerable populations.

### Background

The SDOH are the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live and age. The Ontario Human Rights Commission (OHRC) emphasizes that collecting and analyzing data that identifies individuals by their race, ethnicity, or similar factors can assist institutions to promote human rights and to improve equitable service delivery<sup>1</sup>.

# SUBJECT: Social Determinants of Health in COVID-19 (BOH20015) (City Wide) - Page 2 of 3

On May 26, 2020 Hamilton Public Health Services (PHS) began collecting SDOH data on COVID-19 cases using a tool adapted from Middlesex London, Toronto and Peel Health Units. On June 26, 2020 the Ministry of Health made changes to Regulation 568 under the Health Protection and Promotion Act to include the collection of data on race, income, household size, and language from individuals whom test positive for COVID-19.

Between March 1, 2020 and August 31, 2020 just under 1,000 residents in Hamilton were infected with COVID-19. PHS collected the required SDOH data, along with data on employment status and Indigenous status, from 630 of those individuals. The findings should be interpreted with caution due to the level of response achieved.

### **Findings**

Our data suggests that racialized populations, health care workers and people living with low-income are disproportionately affected by COVID-19 in Hamilton. We also found that males and seniors are more likely to be hospitalized and die from COVID-19.

These findings are not unique to Hamilton. Toronto Public Health also found that people in the lowest income group have the highest rate of COVID-19 and that there is a higher case and hospitalization rate for racialized communities<sup>2</sup>. Similar trends have been shown in Waterloo Region<sup>3</sup> and in the City of Ottawa<sup>4</sup>.

The COVID-19 pandemic is magnifying the impact of the SDOH and the inequities that have long existed in communities. For example, we know that people living with low incomes have difficulty affording basic resources (e.g. food, paying bills). During a pandemic, difficult choices between needed supplies (e.g. hand sanitizer, masks) and basic resources is exacerbated.

#### **Actions Taken**

The Hamilton EOC, PHS and the health system partnership of the Hamilton COVID Response Table (HCRT) continue to work in close alignment to support vulnerable populations throughout the pandemic. Actions taken include:

- Collect and analyze data on social determinants;
- · Support shelters to follow public health measures;
- Delivery of essential supplies (e.g. medicine to people without social supports);

- Mobile testing for isolated individuals unable to get to assessment centres; and,
- Help people to access mental health and addictions supports

## **Next Steps**

The EOC, PHS and the HCRT will continue to support vulnerable populations to achieve greater health equity throughout the COVID response, including:

### Continue to...

- Work on previous Actions Taken;
- · Work with Mental Health partners;
- Ensure social service providers who work with vulnerable populations know when and how to access testing;
- Support congregate settings as they undertake IPAC reviews.
- Advocate for basic income principles;
- Work to mitigate the unintended consequences of COVID-19 control measures (e.g. deferred immunizations, dental and vision health care, as well as adverse impacts on mental health and loss of income).

#### Advocate for...

- Public policy to protect seniors and low-wage frontline workers;
- Adequate human resources to support vulnerable populations.

#### Collaborate with...

- Communities disproportionately impacted by COVID-19, including racialized and low-income communities;
- Community service provider agencies serving populations impacted by COVID-19 or public health measures.

## Exploration of...

Voluntary isolation centres to minimize household transmission.
