What is the ACPD?

The Advisory Committee for Persons with Disabilities recommends to the City of Hamilton policy, procedure and standards that address the needs and concerns of all disabilities. Our task is to identify barriers in municipal programs and try to prevent new barriers from being created in accordance with the **ODA** (Ontarians with Disabilities Act) and the AODA (Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act) in matters of Customer Service. Employment, Transportation, Design of Public Spaces and Information and Communication.

Have a disability related issue? Any Citizen can raise disability related issues or ask questions of the ACPD. We will decide if the issue is within our mandate as an Advisory Committee of Council and send it to the appropriate working group for discussion and recommendations. The issue is then sent back to the ACPD for approval. The Advisory Committee for Persons with Disabilities reports directly to the General Issues Committee. 



To recommend activities for the stabilization and strengthening of the arts community.

To monitor and assist with the implementation of the Arts Awards Program and Public Art Program.

City of Hamilton Arts Awards





The City of Hamilton Arts Awards is one of the oldest programs of its kind in Canada and has been at the forefront of recognizing creative talent since 1976.

Each year, citizens nominate artists for consideration by independent juries of arts professionals who choose notable artists and arts community leaders to honour for their excellence and contributions to Hamilton.

The purpose of the program is to:

Celebrate and build awareness of the incredible contribution that artists make to Hamilton

Foster growth in the arts sector

Develop the talent that drives this vital part of our city

Celebrate Resilience in the Arts

The COVID -19 pandemic has affected us all, including the arts community, in unique ways. Each of us has survived this historical period of sickness and healing, loss and life, struggles and accomplishments.

The Arts Advisory Commission (AAC) for the City of Hamilton, in partnership with Hamilton Arts Council (HAC), were seeking submissions from Hamilton artists that represent the overall theme of resilience and that contain a message of hope for the future.

We want you to be part of the response and recovery! Selected submissions will be featured on HAC and City websites, on social media and at future AAC events to help guide conversations and work about response and recovery of the Arts Community in Hamilton. Your experiences from this extraordinary time will express the physical, social and emotional impact of the pandemic, and act as tools for inspiration. (Call for submissions is now closed).



Big Picture Recovery Symposium

Based on the responses from Celebrate Resilience in the Arts and an accompanying survey, the Arts Advisory Commission will host a symposium.

The symposium will address concerns as originally identified in the Big Picture Report (2017) along with new information pertaining to the newly collected data from Celebrate Resilience in the Arts (Covid Recovery specific collected data).

The Big Picture Recovery Symposium is projected to take place during the first quarter of 2022.



Food Advisory Committee

Mandate

- Advisory committee to the Board of Health
 - ► 13-18 members represent food related sectors incl. production, processing, distribution, buying/selling, consumption, waste mgmt.
- Supports and advises on:
 - ► Implementation of Hamilton's Food Strategy
 - Development of food related policies and programs

Mandate cont'd

Other roles include:

- Identify and inform about innovative food security policies and programs
- Identify and advise about emerging issues affecting Hamilton's food system
- ► Facilitate and share information with members and community
- Support research, monitoring and evaluation, identify gaps and opportunities related to community food security
- ► Facilitate cross promotion of community food security within existing programs, policies, events, services and other actions

Hamilton's Food Strategy

- Ten year strategy endorsed by Council in August 2016
- ▶ Based on research, best practises and engagement with 2700+ people
- ► Four goals:
 - Support food friendly neighbourhoods to improve access to healthy food for all residents.
 - Increase food literacy to promote healthy eating and empower all residents.
 - Support local food and help grow the agri-food sector.
 - Advocate for a healthy, sustainable, and just food system with partners and at all levels of government.
- Fourteen recommendations and forty-six actions

Current Committee Activities

- Regrouping after 1 year hiatus due to redeployment of Public Health support staff. Membership declined during hiatus
- Pre-pandemic focus on 5 priority actions:
 - ► Funding criteria & process
 - ► Food skills and employability program
 - Community and Neighbourhood Infrastructure
 - ► Food Literacy Network
 - ► Local Food Promotion
- ► Evaluating implementation of all 46 actions by the municipality and community partners. Outcomes will inform priority actions

About the City of Hamilton Cycling Committee

Challenges we have experienced

- Scope is limited to cycling, but often give broader advice to Council because other transportation modes (i.e. walking, e-scooters, etc.) are not represented by anyone other committee
- Understanding how to make the most impact when advising Council or Public Works
- Constraints on our ability to advocate for cycling issues (i.e. SoBi. climate emergency)
- Attrition of members feeling bogged down in process and other organizations being more effective
- Councillor members unable to attend consistently because of scheduling conflicts
- City-wide representation across membership
- Limited partnerships
- Inconsistent application of City policy

How we might connect

- Cycling for all ages and abilities
- Active transportation
- Intersectional research project on gender and cycling in Hamilton
- Public art opportunities on multi-use trails and bike lanes
- Cycling is clean and green, and a financially accessible mode of transportation








Mandate

- Maximize the Engagement of Youth in Remembrance activities.








Remembrance Day & Memorial Services

Digital Community Programming








Previous and Ongoing Projects



Mandate

- ➤ Makes recommendations and advise City Council about challenges impacting immigrants or refugees
- Influences policies, procedures and guidelines which address immigrant and refuge needs and concerns

Scope of Services

Review, development and implementation of policies, procedures, programs and services that affect, directly or indirectly immigrants and refugees.

Motions:

- Education programs for immigrant communities about Indigenous History
- Supporting Hamilton's status as a sanctuary city
- Develop public education that generate awareness about immigrant issues

Scope of Services

Ensure the facilitation, organization and promotion of open lines of communications with relevant organizations about the service needs of newcomers, immigrants and refugees.

 Mental health services for immigrants especially challenges brought about by the pandemic

Scope of Services

Conduct presentations, host workshops and/or open house to educate service providers and professional regulation bodies and other relevant services and programs about immigrant and refugee issues.

- Hosted annual open house for Newcomers in Hamilton where city departments and community organizations provided information about services in the community.
- Published an updated Welcome to Hamilton newcomers' guide

Challenges

- ➤ Reaching quorum during meetings
- ➤ Moving to virtual meetings
- ➤ Receiving current information about issues faced by new immigrants
- Lack of collaboration with other advisory committees
- Lack of access and collaboration with different immigrant communities in Hamilton

KHCG Advisory Committee Mandate

Promotes desired behaviors in the community that support the Clean and Green Hamilton goals Supports and provides advice to City staff, elected officials and other stakeholders to implement the Clean & Green Hamilton Strategy and Our Future Hamilton community vision

Primary focus is on effecting behaviors and attitudes conducive to a clean, healthy and safe community through leadership and action

Provides annual grants to the local community for green and beautification initiatives

KHCG Advisory Committee Mandate

Supports and provides advice to City staff, elected officials and other stakeholders to implement the Clean & Green Hamilton
Strategy and Our Future
Hamilton community vision

Engages in neighbourhood and City initiatives that aim to beautify our community, promoting environmental stewardship and prevent litter, illegal dumping and graffiti

The Four-Year Work Plan

In 2019, the KHCG's Four-Year Work Plan was updated in collaboration with LURA Consulting based on our current themes:

- Litter
- Illegal Dumping
- Graffiti
- Beautification
- Environmental Stewardship
- "Other Initiatives" to include actions that apply across all theme areas

KHCG Committee Successes

- The KHCG Committee annually supports the community through the 'Clean and Green Neighbourhood Grant Program'. In 2021, \$4,675 in grant funds were awarded to 8 local grass-roots community projects.
- Annually supports the 'Team Up to Clean Up' Program, ensuring cleanup supplies are made available to local residents wanting to conduct a community or individual cleanup within Hamilton's communities. Pre-Covid, typically over 20,000 residents and organizations register and participate in the program.
- Advocates clean and green initiatives such as the Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup, Clean Together Canada, the Butt Blitz and municipal graffiti awareness programs.
- As a 'Keep America Beautiful' (KAB) Affiliate, conducts annual litter and waste scans.

Brief History of the LGBTQAC

- In part, this Committee was borne out of a lawsuit filed against the City for refusing to recognize "Gay Pride Day" in the City of Hamilton in 1992 (which was ultimately resolved between 1995 and 2002)
- It was initially formed in the early-mid 2000s and has been operating for about 16 years as an "Advisory Committee"

Mandate

The LGBTQ Advisory Committee for the City of Hamilton exists to eliminate barriers experienced by LGBTQ communities by giving voice to the perspectives of LGBTQ individuals and evaluating the City on its related efforts. The Committee does this by making recommendations to Council and staff in order that the City of Hamilton will excel in providing services to and interfacing with members of the LGBTQ communities.

Where This Term of Council Started

- May 15, 2019 Our Committee hadn't met for several months
 - The question was put to us at our first meeting, "What do you plan to do for the flag raising event this year?"
 - Our recommendation, in response, was not received well by City Council; much of the Committee's work was done in this political context

 Started social media accounts on Twitter and Facebook to communicate about LGBTQAC meetings and events

 Accepted delegations from lawyers working on the Independent Review of the event surrounding Pride 2019 and from a community organization looking to connect with Two Spirit and LGBTQIA+ communities

Established 4 Working Groups (2 currently on hiatus) -

- Needs Assessment (on hiatus)
- Expanding the Committee's Membership (on hiatus)
- Reviewing the Committee's Documents
- Changing the Name of the Committee

 Held a Community Conversation after the violence at Pride 2019 in Council Chambers that brought together hundreds of member of Two Spirit and LGBTQIA+ communities (moderated by our Chair)

Held another Community Conversation, virtually, in June
 2021 to continue to advance and advocate for issues

 Completed an overhaul of the template for our minutes, in cooperation and collaboration with the City Clerk and their office, to increase both legibility and ease of use

 Successfully worked with the Audit, Finance and Administration Committee to increase the number of members on the LGBTQAC from 9 to 15

- Submitted recommendations to various bodies with respect to reconsidering City Council's citizen appointee to the Hamilton Police Services Board; including a delegation to the Board on February 14, 2020
- Held an event at the YWCA in December 2019 to introduce the LGBTQAC to the community and to gather in the spirit of friendship and conversation

- Recommended that there be an All Advisory Committee event in order to bring groups together to share information and ideas and to talk about their successes and challenges (approved by City Council)
- Successfully delegated to other Committees about the event and worked with staff and Council to streamline our recommendation (approved by City Council)

 Planned and delivered a community survey through the Engage Hamilton platform to get feedback about the LGBTQAC's plans for Pride 2021 (approved by City Council)

 Advertised fill the vacancies on our Committee; hired a member of the queer community to design the marketing and advertising materials (more diverse)

 Recommended a donation to Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR) events in the City of Hamilton (approved by City Council)

 Recommended support to community organizations helping members of Two Spirit and LGBTQIA+ communities who are struggling during the pandemic (approved by City Council)

- New Land Acknowledgement developed by a member of our Committee in collaboration with local Indigenous youth
- Committee members participated in a number of very successful delegations to the Audit, Finance and Administration Committee including one that streamlined the process for delegating itself

 Delivered our very first Annual Presentation in December 2020 to the Audit, Finance and Administration Committee (they were very appreciative of it)

 Recommended that we report to the Emergency and Community Services Committee (more in line with our mandate) (approved by City Council)

Advocated on key intersectional issues including -

 Sidewalk snow clearing (approved, in part, by City Council)

 Accessible captioning for all City committee meetings (approved by City Council)

Challenges

 Responsibilities were unclear around who could call meetings / policies

 The Mayor and City Manager called a meeting of our Committee, unilaterally, on May 28, 2019

 Policies were often unclear, untested, or added without much notice

Challenges


- Sudden changes in administrative support and a lack of clear guidelines around communication were persistent throughout 2019 and 2020, also including -
 - No committee email
 - No central records storage for minutes, motions, etc.
 - No clear policy regarding media contact

Challenges

- COVID-19, especially that virtual meetings were suspended until August 2020, meaning that the LGBTQAC could not participate in celebrating or supporting Digital Pride 2020
- City Council's complaint against the LGBTQAC Chair for sharing public information that they had posted on their own website, including a lengthy public adjudication of the matter and an investigation by the Integrity Commissioner

- 7 men and 10 women with a variety of backgrounds and interests



Age-Friendly Hamilton

 SAC is a full partner with the City of Hamilton and the Hamilton Council on Aging in the development, governance and implementation of Hamilton's Plan for an Age-Friendly Community (2021-2026) and Hamilton's Plan for an Age-Friendly City (2014-2019)





Working Groups and Committees

- SAC has 4 active working groups, aligned with the objectives of the Age-Friendly Plan:
 - Communications
 - ✓ Elder Abuse
 - ✓ Housing
 - ✓ Getting Around Hamilton
- SAC also has membership in several external committees/groups, including Vision Zero, Our Future Hamilton, McMaster Institute for Research on Aging, Senior of the Year Awards, International Day of Older Persons and the Seniors' month kick-off



Achievements

- Addition of "and to age successfully" to the City of Hamilton vision
- Presentation to Council on "Transportation Options in Underserved Areas of Hamilton"
- Safety information placemats for residents of City Housing seniors buildings in collaboration with Hamilton Police Services
- Revision of the seniors resources landing page on the City of Hamilton website
- Collaboration with 211 for dissemination of information of value to older adults
- Pedestrian Safety and "Let's Take a Bus" workshops in collaboration with the Hamilton Council on Aging
- "Housing Options for Older Adults" guide
- "Resources for Older Adults" guide in collaboration with the Hamilton Public Library and Red Book
- "Golden Age Pass" for residents age 80+



Current Projects

- Heat mitigation strategies for older adults
- Developing workshops on housing options and financial literacy for older adults in collaboration with the Hamilton Council on Aging
- Developing safety videos for the CCTV networks in City Housing seniors' buildings in collaboration with Hamilton Police Services
- Working with the Hamilton Public Library and 211 to ensure optimal dissemination of information relevant to older adults

The City's Waste Management Division provides administrative support for the Waste Management Advisory Committee



Committee Activities

- WMAC assists with the implementation of the City's 2012 Solid Waste Management Master Plan (SWMMP) and the 2020 SWMMP Action Items.
- The City has a 65% waste diversion target and the current diversion rate is 42%. WMAC provides input on actions to achieve the City's SWMMP goals.

SWMMP Guiding **Principles**

The City must lead and encourage the changes necessary to adopt the principle of waste minimization

The Glanbrook landfill is a valuable resource. The City must minimize residual waste and optimize the use of the City's diversion and disposal facilities.

The City must maintain responsibility for the residual wastes generated within its boundaries.
