(i) Clean and Green Neighbourhood Grants Process 2022 (Item 10.1)

Staff Liaison, Whitney Slattery, Clean and Green Coordinator, provided an update on the status of the 2022 Clean and Green Neighbourhood Grant. Submission deadline for 2022 is March 16 at 4:20pm. Staff will conduct a review of all applications for program eligibility and completeness.

Staff asked for three volunteers from the Committee to act as adjudicators. Committee Members, Kerry Jarvi, Jen Baker, and Felisha Van Dyk volunteered to form the Adjudication Working Group.

An orientation meeting for the Working Group will be scheduled by Staff, to review the adjudication process and consensus meeting. Individual adjudication dates and consensus meeting to be determined.

Final adjudication scores and funding recommendations will be presented to the Committee at the April 19, 2022 meeting for discussion and approval.

Committee Members to engage with program applicants, visit project sites and attend events, if and where possible.

Lessons Learned

General Comments:

- Review eligible vs. ineligible projects (what projects fall out of the scope of this program)
- Review guidelines to allow for flexibility with timeframes (ex. Next grant cycle 2023/2024; like school years)
- Discuss returning applicants
- Look at adding a new category for 'reduce and reuse'
- Clear indications in grant application of supplies available through TUTCU
- Add contacts to the application respecting departmental permissions
