EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A review of the status of the City's Citizen Advisory (Volunteer) and Sub-Committees is performed prior to the new Term of Council. The information gathered during the review, is used to determine the functionality of the committees and to ensure that the membership and mandates of the established committees are current for membership recruitment in the new Term of Council.

FINANCIAL - STAFFING - LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

Financial: Funding for the City's Committees are provided through the Legislative Budget.

The funding is primarily for refreshments and the approximate cost for 2018 –

2022 Term of Council was \$5,400, which is considerably lower than in previous terms due to COVID and the implementation of virtual meetings.

In addition to the above, with each Term of Council, a selection/recruitment process is undertaken for the appointment of citizens to the various Citizen Advisory Committees (Volunteer) and Sub-Committees. Advertising costs for this recruitment is approximately \$18,500, which is also considerably lower than in previous terms due to the expertise of our Communications Division, and is funded through the Legislative Budget

Staffing: Each Sub-Committee and Citizen Advisory Committees (Volunteer) established by Council requires staff support.

Support is provided by both Clerk's staff and department Staff Liaisons to 88 Boards, Agencies, Commissions and Committees.

During this Term of Council staff provided in excess of 60,000 hours in support to our 88 Boards, Agencies, Commissions and Committees. This figure includes attending meetings, pre-meeting preparation (including the preparation of staff reports), post meeting follow-up and additional assistance as required.

It's important to note that the number of hours of support, staff provide to Council and it's Standing Committees, Tribunals, Shareholders and Board of Directors is not considered in the figure above.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The City of Hamilton currently has 88 Boards, Agencies, Commissions and Committees.

The current practice is to review the Citizen Advisory (Volunteer) and Sub-Committees prior to the end of each Term of Council and established those Citizen Advisory (Volunteer) and Sub-Committees who continue to meet and have not yet completed their mandated role for the Council.

During the 2018-2022 Term of Council, the following Committees have had challenges in acquiring quorum:

Hamilton-Wentworth Catholic District School Board (HWCDSB) Liaison Committee requires 2 members from Council and 2 members of the Hamilton-Wentworth Catholic District School Board (HWCDSB) for quorum, with the current membership, the Mayor and 1 Councillor, it has been a challenge, Clerk's is therefore recommending that the membership be increased to the Mayor and 2 Councillors.

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) Liaison Committee requires 2 members from Council and 2 members of the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) for quorum, with the current membership, the Mayor and 1 Councillor, it has been a challenge, Clerk's is therefore recommending that the membership be increased to the Mayor and 2 Councillors.

During the 2018-2022 Term of Council, the following Sub-Committees were established:

Expanding Housing and Support Services For Women, Non-Binary and Transgender Community Sub-Committee was established on February 27, 2019, reporting on emerging issues as required pertaining to expanding housing and support services for women, transgender and gender non-binary identified persons to address the intersections of identities such as race, sexual orientation, and gender identity which create unique experiences of housing instability and homelessness.

Transit Area Rating Review Sub-Committee was established on June 26, 2019, to evaluate options for rebalancing area rating for transit for the 2021 budget process, including enhanced service levels that align with the overall City Transit Strategy; to evaluate the option of directing the potential savings in the former Hamilton to support the transit service City-wide; to evaluate alternative funding options for transit considering jurisdictional kilometers, service levels and assessment information; to incorporate any changes into the 2021 budget process the Sub-Committee should complete its recommendations by December of 2020 and to consider the climate change lens when performing this review.

Mayor's Task Force on Economic Recovery was established on May 13, 2020 to provide multi-sectoral leadership and direction to guide Hamilton's economic recovery in the immediate aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic. It will formulate an aggressive, action driven plan to position the City of Hamilton now, for long-term, sustainable and equitable economic recovery.

2022-2026 Election Compliance Audit Committee was established on May 11, 2022, as required by Section 88.37(1) of the *Municipal Elections Act*, 1996 (the "MEA"), the City of Hamilton has established the Election Compliance Audit Committee (the "Committee") and is responsible for reviewing and making decisions on Applications for municipal election campaign finance compliance audits by electors and on reports from the City Clerk respecting apparent contraventions of contribution limits.

During the 2018-2022 Term of Council, the following Sub-Committees were renamed:

Expanding Housing and Support Services For Women and Transgender Community Sub-Committee was renamed the Expanding Housing and Support Services For Women, Non-Binary and Transgender Community Sub-Committee on June 24, 2020.

Hamilton Port Authority – City of Hamilton Liaison Committee was renamed the Hamilton-Oshawa Port Authority – City of Hamilton Liaison Committee on March 30, 2022.

During the 2018-2022 Term of Council, the following Sub-Committees were disbanded:

Mayor's Blue Ribbon Task Force on Workforce Development

City Manager Recruitment Steering Committee

Election Compliance Audit Committee - Selection Committee

Mayor's Task Force on Economic Recovery

Sub-Committees

The City of Hamilton currently has 46 Sub-Committees, which will be reduced to 39 following the disbanding of those being recommended. Sub-Committees consist primarily of members of Council. These committees are supported in most instances by Clerk's Legislative staff.

Sub-Committees operate in a manner similar to the City's Standing Committees, with Terms of Reference, agendas, minutes and complying with the *Municipal Act 2001* / Procedural By-law and complying with the open meeting provisions of the *Municipal Act, 2001* and the City's Procedural By-law as applicable.

Reports are submitted to Council through their respective Standing Committee.

ANALYSIS AND RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

Staff are recommending the disbanding of the following Sub-Committees for the following reasons:

Affordable Housing Site Selection Sub-Committee, whose mandate was to select City of Hamilton owned properties that could be offered at little or no cost to not-for-profit or private sector housing providers for the purpose of building new affordable housing, and to develop a process for the disposition of the selected lands for the development of affordable housing, has not met since November 24, 2020, as the Sub-Committee has fulfilled its mandate at this time.

Government Relations Sub-Committee, whose mandate was to outline the priorities that the City wishes to advocate to the Provincial and Federal governments and to develop proactive campaigns to inform the public and the Provincial and Federal Governments on the needs of the City as required, has not met since June 27, 2019, and now that a Director of Government Relations & Community Engagement, the Committee is no longer required.

Steel Sub-Committee, whose mandate was to protect the welfare and best interest of the employees and pensioners of US Steel in Hamilton; to ensure the best use of the land and assets at the US Steel facility in Hamilton; to prepare for the repurposing and redevelopment of the land and assets at the US Steel facility in Hamilton; to create and/or re-establish "living wage" jobs lost at the US Steel facility in Hamilton due to the shutdown; to maximize the tax generated from the site and minimize the impact to the City of Hamilton's budget; to engage community partners, industry stakeholders and residents of the City of Hamilton in planning process to optimize the use of the US Steel facility in Hamilton, has not met during the 2018 – 2022 term of Council.

Rental Housing Sub-Committee, whose mandate was to work with interested stakeholders to assist with the implementation of an approach to enforcement and legalization of appropriate rental housing including, but not limited to, process, fees and by-law regulations, has not met during the 2018 – 2022 term of Council. There is currently a pilot in place and all matters related to Rental Housing are being considered by the Planning Committee, therefore, this Committee is no longer required.

Hamilton Utilities Corporation Joint Advisory Committee and Working Group, whose mandate was to review and make recommendations on the future business mandate of HUC, including other potential areas of service delivery that could be of benefit to the City by the governance structure of HUC, has not met during the 2018 – 2022 term of Council.

Capital Projects Work In-Progress Review Sub-Committee last met on May 26, 2022 and is recommended to be disbanded, as any future Capital Status Updates are being communicated through regularly scheduled Information Updates to Council and/or Open Data; with the Capital Closing Reports be submitted through Audit, Finance and Administration Committee.

Multi-Year Budget Planning Sub-Committee, whose mandate was to provide leadership and direction during the 2014 to 2018 term of Council for the transformation of the City's Budget and Business Planning process, has not met since June 27, 2017 and has fulfilled its mandate at this time.

Staff are recommending that the establishment of the Physician Recruitment and Retention Steering Committee be postponed until after Council considers the review of the Physician Recruitment and Retention process in the Fall of 2022.

Staff are also recommending the postponement of the recruitment and establishment of the Citizen Advisory Committees (Volunteer) until after the training that will be focusing on Reimaging Public Participation Together on June 23, 2022 at a Special General Issues Committee meeting and the Report coming forward to the July 4, 2022 General Issues Committee meeting respecting the Public Engagement Policy and Administrative Framework. Staff further recommend that the new Term of Council establish these committees, so that they may be aligned with the Council Term priorities established by the new Council, with the exception of the Advisory Committee for Persons with Disabilities, which is required to be in place as per section 29(1) of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, S.O. 2005, c. 11.

Staff are also recommending that the Sub-Committees listed in Appendix "C" to this report be established, as they have all met the criteria of meeting as least three time during this Term of Council and are continuing to work towards their mandated role.
