40 Years of Human Experimentation in America: The **Tuskegee Study**

The goal was to "observe the natural history of untreated syphilis" in black populations, but the subjects were completely unaware and were instead told they were receiving treatment for bad blood when in fact, they received no treatment at all.

Sterilization of Indigenous Women

Traditionally, Indigenous women commanded the highest respect in their communities as water carriers and the givers of life. They are sacred and powerful beings because they "birth the whole world." Unfortunately, racism, sexism, and colonialism have disrupted respect for Indigenous peoples and women. As a result, it has perpetuated violence, including the forced and coerced sterilization of Indigenous women and girls.

Coerced sterilization refers to the practice of sterilizing Indigenous women without free and informed consent. Based on eugenics beliefs and policies, Sexual Sterilization Acts were passed in Alberta (1928 to 1972) and British Columbia (1933 to 1973) and were not repealed until the 1970s. Under the Acts, a board of eugenics could order sterilization of institutionalized patients who "if discharged without being subjected to an operation for sexual sterilization would be likely to beget or bear children who by reason of inheritance would have a tendency to serious mental disease or mental deficiency."

Charles Cook has survived a stroke, a heart transplant, a kidney transplant and months in Toronto General Hospital. The 53-year-old knows he's one of the lucky ones. But he worries that while waiting for his next new kidney, his luck will run out.

Cook is Black. And he is all too aware that means his chances of receiving a live donor kidney transplant — the preferred treatment for kidney failure — are half that of non-Black Canadians. Cook's kidney failure was the result of post-operative complications that automatically placed him on the donor list. But he knows he will one day need another kidney and his good luck may change.




