

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT



 The Urban Forest includes all publicly and privatelyowned trees and supporting vegetation in the urban boundary.


What is Tree Canopy Cover?

 Canopy cover represents the amount of land area covered by individual trees and woodlands as seen from above.
