Subject: Licensing: the deplorable student housing in the west end

Hi Vanessa and Brian;

I wrote my concerns last year and the concerns remain the same:

FILTHY RENTALS: Many landlords do not adequately clean their rentals for new tenants. Each September there is a mountain of garbage in the area, as incoming students clear rental houses of garbage and debris left by previous tenants. The city has a special garbage pick-up at this time to handle the increased load.

Several student tenants clean and paint their rooms before moving in.

The public would not rent rooms in such deplorable conditions.

POOR AND UNHEALTHY MAINTENANCE OF BUILDINGS AND AND FURNISHINGS;

Students over many years have reported to us, that they have encountered rodent and vermin infestation, mould, malfunctioning stoves, refrigerators, plumbing, heating and poorly maintained buildings.

Last fall, contractors replaced a nearby leaking sunroom roof of a rental house. They found mould, raccoon feces, a pool of stagnant water and rotting lumber under the shingles. A student's bedroom is directly under this unhealthy roof.

This house has had three different landlords in the past three years.

FIRE, ELECTRICAL AND CO2 SAFETY: Many students live in sub-standard unhealthy housing units; some without adequate fire and carbon monoxide detectors. Adequate exits, in the event of a fire, is one of the concerns. Over-crowding is another issue. Nearby houses have 10, 18 and 22 bedrooms.

PROPERTY STANDARDS: Lack of lawn-cutting, snow-shovelling and waste management problems are regularly reported to the Bylaw Department. Landscaping consists of overgrown bushes and weeds. These houses are eyesores. I lived next to one owned by a McMaster prof.

INACCESSIBLE LANDLORDS: There are landlords who live out of the country and are difficult to reach concerning problems affecting their tenants.

OVER-CHARGING: This year we encountered a Chinese student and his wife who were living in one bedroom. The landlady charged them \$500.00/month for a room she charges \$300.00 to other single tenants, yet there is a glut of rooms.

UNHEALTHY COMM.UNITY BAL ANCE: Ainslie Wood North is hard hit with over 65% of the 305 houses being rentals. This is an unworkable ratio for a healthy community.

OVER-CROWDING: Garages, attics and basements have been converted. In the house where the Chinese couple lived, the house was made into 10 bedrooms, 1 kitchen and 2 bathrooms, no living room or dining room.
