Council Direction: A comprehensive Legal Services report be provided annually.

Information:

Following an Operational Review of Legal Services conducted by an external consultant, a decision was made by Council in 2005 to reorganize Legal Services in order to in-source more of the work with a view to controlling costs. While Legal Services, in 2010, provided a litigation report summarizing files closed in 2009 and outcomes, there has not been a comprehensive document provided to Council outlining the services provided by the Legal Services Division. This Report presents the first comprehensive overview of the Legal Services Division since the reorganization in 2005.


The City's Legal Services Division is a full-service legal department, comprised of lawyers, law clerks, legal assistants and prosecutors, that provides a full range of legal services to the City. Subject matter expertise includes municipal law, planning and development law, environmental law, litigation, real estate law, public health law, administrative law, privacy law, procurement law, corporate and commercial law. The Legal Services Division advises and represents the City and Council, as well as City departments and agencies. The division mandate is to provide timely, accurate, relevant and strategic legal advice and representation to support Council and the City's various portfolios, departments and agencies on corporate objectives, legislative compliance, strategic initiatives, general administrative and operational issues, policy changes and risk management.

Overall Legal Services Costs Effectively Controlled

As noted, following an operational review in 2005, the division was organized into two practice areas, the Dispute Resolution Section, and the Commercial/Development/Policy Section. Additional staff were recruited to expand Legal Services' capacity to handle more of the work inhouse which has been effective in reducing the need for outsourcing and in controlling overall costs.

Ontario Municipal Benchmarking Initiative ("OMBI") is an initiative which provides municipal performance statistics and data, enabling municipalities to benchmark and compare their performances. In 2011, the most recent year for which comprehensive OMBI results are available, Hamilton's Legal Services in-house lawyers delivered 34,065 hours of legal advice and services with an operating cost per in-house Lawyer of \$121/hour. An hourly rate which is at the lower end of the range (\$106-169/hour) reported by other large/comparable Ontario municipalities in OMBI.

Overall, the legal costs of the Legal Services Division have been reduced from \$7.4 M in 2004 and have stabilized at \$6 M annually. The following tables reflect the Legal Services Division overall costs from 2004 (pre-reorganization) to December 2012:

^{**} Hiring a short-term Contract lawyer rather than retaining outside legal counsel for specific short-term projects provides the Client Groups with significant savings over the cost of retaining outside legal counsel.

Dispute Resolution Section

The Dispute Resolution Section advances and defends the City's interests in both civil and administrative litigation, including Provincial Offences prosecutions, insurance defence, breach of contract, debt collection, human rights and a host of other matters involving administrative tribunals.

Disputes, and litigation, can originate from a myriad of circumstances, linked to many legislative requirements and fact situations. Municipal liability for roads and sidewalks, and winter maintenance issues, environmental regulation and spill response, municipal water and waste water infrastructure, municipal property and occupiers' liability for publicly owned facilities such as recreational facilities and other lands are significant sources of litigation in all municipalities. Litigation also arises in the context of contracts, construction, and collections. The City, to carry out its statutory duties and protect its rights to operate and legislate also engages in administrative litigation.

<u>Litigation File Activity</u>


New Litigation Files in 2012:


Where the City is plaintiff, it is generally pursuing debt or contract damages.

Source or Target of Litigation for files received in 2012, by Department





The majority of new files in 2012 were claims against the City for personal injury or property loss. Of the approximate 110 new files of this sort, eleven involved motor vehicle accidents, and twelve involved ice or snow. The remainder are mainly falls alleged on City property or minor property losses.

Litigation Files Concluded in 2012:

The City concluded 133 litigation files in 2012, primarily through settlement. As a result 2012 was an active year for settlements and claim payments, though the majority of claims are resolved without any contribution by the City. Settlements are counted as wins in the following figure, as these settlement achieve certainty of liability without further costs or risks involved in the much higher claims, and again because the City is often escaping from the litigation without contributing to a settlement. Of the concluded files, approximately 100 involved personal injury or property loss, eighteen involved alleged motor vehicles accidents, and the remainder alleged personal injury (mainly falls) or minor property loss. Twelve claims alleged ice or snow as part of the causation.

Again the City was primarily a defendant in claims resolved. In those cases where the City is plaintiff, it is often seeking payment of a debt or damages, or enforcement of statutory rights. While debtors often cannot be located or are unable to pay debts, Legal Services assisted in the collection of \$262,321 in 2012.

The majority of claims against the City arise from its property holdings, operations and facilities, reflected by the number of claims for Public Works, Community Services (Recreation/Culture), Police, Planning and HECFI. Approximately one half of the 25 Planning files involved claims against Building Services for loss or negligence, but the City only paid \$6,000 in total towards claims and was awarded \$4,000 in costs. Twenty-eight of the files resolved were commenced in the Small Claims Court. The remainder of files were in tribunals and higher courts, including matters before the Ontario Court of Appeal and a leave motion seeking an appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Provincial Offences Act Activity (POA)

Pursuant to the 'downloading' of POA prosecutions in 2000, the City's Prosecution unit handles almost 60,000 court appearances on charges per year. Staff ensure continuous operation of 2 full time courts and one part time court as well as appeals and office duties. The majority of charges involve offences under the Highway Traffic Act, the Building Code Act, Fire Protection and Prevention Act, and other various municipal by-laws.

Following industry "best practice" to employ paralegal staff wherever feasible, a staff of paralegal prosecutors, under the direction of an Assistant City Solicitor, handles proceedings to enforce City by-laws, and prosecute certain categories of charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act, pursuant to the Provincial Offences Act.

Commercial/Development/Policy Section ("CDP")

The other practice group, Commercial/Development/Policy ("CDP") provides broad and diverse core legal services to support day-to-day operations as well as priorities of the City in such areas as planning and development, economic development initiates, water and wastewater, waste management, roads, public works and infrastructure, affordable housing, fire, emergency response services, transit and transportation, library services and taxation. Lawyers in this group provide advice to Public Health Services and Community Services in regard to the implementation of various programs and projects, both independent initiatives and those in collaboration with agencies such as local school boards, universities, colleges and not-for-profit organizations. Lawyers in this group advise, negotiate and draft agreements in regard to public-

private partnerships, third party agreements, commercial and industrial re-development ventures, purchasing and procurement, environmental issues, construction contracts, among other matters. The CDP Section provides advice on agreements through which the City secures and disburses substantial funding from higher levels of government, which in 2012 exceeded \$43 million.

In 2012, the CDP lawyers were engaged in a variety of significant projects including the Pan-Am Agreements, the Tiger-Cats License for the new Pan Am Stadium, HECFI and Public-Private Partnership Agreements with Global Spectrum and Carmen's, the Bulldog's License Agreement, the Mohawk Transit Hub Agreement, RFP for the Integrated Library System, the Residential Protective Plumbing Program, the Randle Reef Contaminated Sediment Remediation Project, the purchase of the Lister block building and the expropriation of the City Motor Hotel among others.

Procurement represents a significant body of work which the CDP Section supports through drafting, interpretations, advice and legal opinions. In addition, a lawyer participates on the Procurement Advisory Committee, a staff level committee which meets bi-weekly to review potential revisions to the Procurement Policy and implementation of the recommendations from the Purchasing Review conducted by the National Institute on Governmental Purchasing. Some of the larger RFPs which Legal Services has provided support on include the Waste Transfer and Disposal Operations System, the Waste Collection Services Contracts, several large IS procurements, and the Woodward Avenue Wastewater Treatment Plan Expansion Professional Engineering Consultant RFP. The following table reflects the volume and value of construction-related contracts drafted, reviewed and concluded over the past several years:

Lawyers in the CDP Section support the diverse needs of the Planning and Economic Development Department on a variety of real estate transactions including acquisitions of property for such projects as community centres, road construction and repair, municipal redevelopment of surplus properties, and public-private partnerships. They are also involved in the sale or disposal of surplus City properties so as to maximize revenues to the City. In addition, this group negotiates and drafts easements, encroachments, covenants, leases and offers to lease, and processes expropriations.


Lawyers in this section provide advice and support to the Planning and Economic Development Department on interpretation of the legislation, by-laws, and a wide variety of planning-related matters including official plan and zoning documents, draft plans of subdivision and condominium, site plan applications, disputes involving cash-in-lieu of parkland, development charges, and other fees and tariffs.

2012 was an active year for subdivision and condominium development. A higher volume in common element condominiums and phased subdivision growth was experienced.

Lawyers represent the City before the Ontario Municipal Board or other tribunals and courts including contested development applications, zoning by-law and official plan appeals, committee of adjustment application appeals, expropriations, and any other land-use related disputes. Appeals may be made by landowners seeking development approvals which have been refused by Council or where Council has not made any decision within the prescribed time provided under the Planning Act. Appeals may also be filed by individuals and public bodies, and may also be filed against City-initiated official plans/amendments, zoning by-laws and heritage districts. These matters frequently extend over a period of many months involving extensive preparation of witnesses, mediations and pre-hearings and negotiations, in advance of presentation of evidence and arguments at the OMB or other tribunals.

A number of major City initiatives have resulted in files at the OMB, including over the past couple of years, the Development Charges By-law, the Urban Hamilton Official Plan, and the 'Setting Sail' Secondary Plan. In 2012, there were 27 planning appeal files to the OMB, resulting in 25 matters successfully argued and/or settled, and 2 matters unsuccessfully argued at the OMB. To date, for 2013, there are 84 days scheduled at the OMB. The attached Appendix "A" sets out the 2013 Hearings currently scheduled.



Support to Council, Committees, Agencies

Legal Services provides support to Council and Standing Committees, as well as to a variety of sub-committees and staff advisory committees, including Governance Sub-Committee, Accountability and Transparency Committee, Portfolio Management Committee, Procurement Advisory Committee and Development Review Team. In addition, Legal Services provides support to Licensing Tribunal and Property Standards Committee, when they adjudicate on appeals. Legal advice and guidance is also provided as required to Library Services and the Board of Health.
