- Developed in partnership with the City of Hamilton and the Hamilton Best Start Network
- The product of community consultation that began in 2012 to determine the current state of early years services in Hamilton and to develop a plan for the future
- The plan includes:
 - > An environmental scan of the city's early years system
 - > The results of stakeholder consultation and community engagement
 - > An analysis of findings and recommendations

Importance of the EYCP

- Supports the Best Start Vision
 - > Best Start is about children
 - > Best Start is about families
 - Best Start is about community and connections
 - Best Start is about our future
- Supports the City's Vision:
 - Making Hamilton the best place to raise a child



Key Findings of the EYCP

- Twelve challenges were identified that can be categorized into four key themes
 - > Inclusion
 - > Child Care Stabilization and Transformation
 - System Integration
 - > Access to Information

INCLUSION How will these challenges be addressed?



- Children with special needs have access to high quality early years supports.
- All children, including Francophone, Aboriginal and newcomer children, are welcomed in all environments.

- Special needs resourcing review
- Review of supports available to children without identified special needs
- Cultural sensitivity training opportunities for early years professionals through a variety of approaches

CHILD CARE STABILIZATION AND TRANSFORMATION How will these challenges be addressed?



 With the introduction of full-day kindergarten, the licensed child care system is supported as centres focus on providing care to younger children.

- City of Hamilton's funding model
- City of Hamilton's child care fee subsidy waitlist strategy
- Communications between the City of Hamilton and early years service providers
- OneHSN, an on-line licensed child care registry

SYSTEM INTEGRATION How will these challenges be addressed?



 A seamless early years system is in place so that children and families can quickly and efficiently access services they require.

- Clear, measurable outcomes for the Best Start Network
- An inventory of early years services
- A "warm transfer" protocol between service providers
- An interactive tool to support the early years inventory

ACCESS TO INFORMATION How will these challenges be addressed?



 Families and service providers can quickly and easily access accurate/current information.

- Revised Best Start website (<u>HamiltonBestStart.ca</u>)
- Basic needs pilot in the Beasley neighbourhood
- Canada Learning Bond initiative in the Gibson/Landsdale neighbourhood
- Best Start magazine
- Evidence based decisions

- Will continue to work with the community to find and implement solutions that will address the identified challenges
- Will need to update the plan in 2016
- Continue to be pro-active in planning for the needs of Hamilton so that we can respond to new Ministry initiatives and/or directives
