Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS)

- Federal funding program designed to prevent and reduce homelessness
- 2014 2019 allocation = \$21,141,270
- Annual allocation = \$4,228,254
- \$634,238 (15%) = HPS administration (city staff)
- \$718,803 (20%) = the Aboriginal Community
- \$2,875,212 = Housing First and Homelessness Prevention Projects



Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS)

According to federal Terms & Conditions for HPS funding effective 2015/16:

- \$2,875,212 (100%) HPS Project funding
- \$1,868,887 (65%) of HPS funding must be spent on "Housing First" to house people most at risk
- \$1,006,325 (35%) of HPS funding must be spent on Homelessness Prevention programs



What is Housing First?

- Provides people experiencing homelessness permanent housing quickly and aligns supports as needed
- Evidence-based model (local and national evidence)
- Focus is chronic and episodic homelessness populations
- One of few homelessness interventions considered "best practice"
- Currently Hamilton allocates 45% of the HPS allocation on Housing First programs such as Transitions to Homes, Supporting Our Sisters and the Youth Housing Support Team



Housing First Activities

Activity	Description	Amount
Housing First Readiness	Planning activities (coordination of resources, training, research, etc.)	\$149,510
Intake & Assessment	Ensuring that people are provided the right kinds of service through cross-community assessment tools	\$149,510
Connecting to & Maintaining Housing	Establishing housing placements and building relationships with landlords	\$448,530
Case Management	Providing referrals, supports to increase social integration.	\$1,046,580
Data & Tracking	Tracking the housing outcomes of participants to ensure the interventions are working	\$74,750

Total: \$1.86 million

What are Homelessness Prevention Programs?

- Activities that mitigate risk factors for homelessness
- Risk factors include: poverty, family breakdown, leaving jail, leaving the child welfare system, poor mental health and experiencing trauma
- Homelessness Prevention responses can include eviction prevention through direct benefits, financial supports, shelter diversion programs
- Little evaluation on interventions but some common understanding on promising practices



Homelessness Prevention Activities

Activity	Description	Amount
Direct Services	Housing placement and housing loss prevention	\$805,060
Facilities	Increasing the capacity of facilities	\$0
Coordination of Resources	Ensuring best practices in homelessness prevention, coordination of services, community planning	\$150,950
Data	Better understanding of the homeless population and tracking the housing outcomes	\$50,315

Total: \$1.006 million

Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative (CHPI)

- Provincial funding program designed to assist people to attain and maintain housing
- 2014 CHPI allocation = \$15,668,792
- Majority of CHPI funding is allocated to the Emergency Shelter,
 Domiciliary Hostels and the Housing Stability Benefit
- 2014 Homelessness Prevention = \$762,000
- Homelessness Prevention is final phase of CHPI review and recommendations



Combined Funding for Call for Applications

Two Call for Applications:

- 1. Housing First
- 2. Homelessness Prevention

Combined funding totals \$3,637,212

- A Call for Applications will be released in late June or early-July for both Housing First and Homelessness Prevention programs
- The applications will be evaluated in the early fall
- Agencies will be notified of the decisions in December
- A follow-up report with the decisions will go to E&CS Committee in early 2015
- New projects will begin April 1, 2015
