## Information:

At the May 12, 2014 meeting of the Audit, Finance and Administration Committee staff were directed to prepare an Information Report to the Planning Committee with an overview of the businesses which require a licence to operate in Hamilton.

Under the authority of the <u>Municipal Act, 2001</u>, municipalities were allowed to exercise their business licensing powers for one or more of the following purposes:

- Health and safety;
- Nuisance control; and,
- Consumer protection.

However, on January 1, 2007, <u>Bill 130</u>, the <u>Municipal Statute Law Amendment Act</u> granted municipalities broader powers to pass by-laws respecting matters including:

- economic, social and environmental well-being of the municipality;
- health, safety and well-being of persons:
- services and things the municipality is authorized to provide that it considers necessary or desirable to the public; and,
- protection of persons and property including consumer protection.

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The City of Hamilton Licensing By-Law 07-170 is a consolidation of the licensing by-laws of the seven pre-amalgamation municipalities. It consists of "General Provisions" applying to all business licences and 27 Schedules, representing 91 licensing categories, each applying to a specific business category.

The "General Provisions" and the Schedules were not subject to a comprehensive review when consolidation took place at municipal amalgamation in 2001. Further, with some exceptions, the Licensing By-law is quite out-dated and it does not reflect changes to legislation (in particular, its authorizing legislation, the Municipal Act, 2001) or relevant Court decisions.

Under the Licensing By-law the following businesses currently require licences:

Adult Entertainment Establishments Auctioneers

Bed and Breakfast, Hotel/Motel Body-Rub Parlours
Building Exterior Cleaner Food Service Vehicles

Kennels and Pet Shops Limousines

Lodging Houses Mobile Homes/Mobile Home Parks

Pedlars Personal Aesthetic Services

Personal Wellness Establishments Public Garages

Public Halls and Places of Amusement Recreational Camping Establishments

Residential Care Facilities Food Premises

Salvage/Second-Hand Goods/

Pawnbroker/Jewellery/Precious Metals Businesses

Seasonal Produce Vendors Sign Posters and Bill Distributors, etc.

Taxi Cab Mobile Sign Leasing or Renting

Tobacco Retailers Tow Trucks
Trades Transient Traders

In 2010 staff were directed to investigate licensing the following types of businesses:

Public Storage

Driveway Pavers/Sealers

Street Performers/Buskers

Fitness Clubs

Landscaping/Exterior Property Maintenance Businesses

**Driving School Operators and Instructors** 

**Demolition Companies** 

Home-based Businesses

Designated Driving/Shuttle Services

Computer Repair Services

However, with the exception of the decision to approve Guidelines for Street Performers/Buskers by the Community and Emergency Services Committee in 2011, little work has been done in this regard because staff are having trouble managing the

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current business license categories due to workload, lack of resources and the antiquated by-law.

Further, staff have been tracking new business categories which should be reviewed in the future for the potential to be licensed. These include:

Private Clubs
Delivery Drivers
Tanning Salons
Mobile Personal Aesthetics
Mobile Public Garages/Services
Private Parking Enforcement Companies

As time permits, staff also intend to evaluate current licensed business categories where there may no longer be a need to regulate because of Federal, Provincial or other oversight and/or the low risk nature of the business activity.
