

 - n 7 W atersheds
 - n Spencer Creek, Borer's Creek, Chedoke Creek, Red Hill Creek, Stoney Creek, Battlefield Creek and the Stoney Creek numbered watercourses
 - n 9 Major Conservation A reas-
 - Nalens Lake, Christie Lake, Webster's Falls/Spencer Gorge, Dundas Valley, Fifty Point, East Mountain (incl. Eramosa Karst), Beverly Swamp, Fletcher Creek and 140 kilometres of trails
 - n Many Species of Fbra and Fauna
 - n Including both species at risk and comm on species, such as Jefferson Salam anders, Chim ney Swifts, Butternut trees and deer

2014 H ighlights

- Near completion of Veldhuis restoration project in Dundas jointly funded by Federal (CIIF) and Hamilton Conservation Foundation (HCF) funds. Original land purchase and development funded by grant and loan from City of Hamilton. Total investment exceeds \$1 Million
- Embarked on cold stream project at Christie Lake which entails rem ovalofm an-made fishing ponds and returning to a natural free flowing stream thus in proving water quality (funding assistance from Fisheries & Oceans Canada and the HCF)
- Installation of a pedestrian bridge over Davis Creek on the East Mountain which brings us one step closer to completion of the East Mountain Trail bop which is a joint City HCA project

2014 H ighlights (cont'd)

- Conservation A reas infrastructure renewal focused on fundam entals such as trailupgrades, road resurfacing, drinking water system renewalat Christie Lake, installation of backflow valves on watermains and multiple facility roof repairs
- n O perational staff expanded their involvem ent in off-season majorm aintenance and capital work to the extent possible without compromising safety standards
- organization

 O rehestrated an organizational restructuring and redeployment which has created amore focused Authority, provided learning and growth opportunities for staff and generated savings for the organization

Expectations for 2015

- n Revenue growth difficult
 - n pricing in line with regional competition;
 - n always weather dependent for day traffic;
 - n expansion of camping sites to come on stream by late summer, and
 - n exploring increasing capacity of winterboat & camperstorage
- n Expenditures are more than half staff related
 - n continued em phasis on keeping fulltime staff to a core level and supplement as needed with contract and seasonal workers;
 - n cost of living adjustment and earned merit combined maximum of 3%
 - n fullyear in pact for last July`s m in in um wage increases will further pressure 2015
- n Continued utilities rate increases in excess of CPI

2015 Priorities

- pintly funded by the City, Heritage Green Trust, HCF and HCA involving all departments; initial funding secured -\$4.75 Million; the intent is to bring a natural area to the east end of Hamilton which provides both passive recreational and water flow attenuation benefits
- In order to attract more visitors and new members to HCA as well as providing better facilities and custom er service to existing patrons, conservation areas in frastructure renew alcontinues its focus on trail, site and facility upgrades
- Christie Lake cold stream project continuing its next phase with the rem oval of three more man-made ponds and replacing with fresh, meandering gurgling streams

2015 Priorities

- n Development of a new event at Christie Lake to compliment the Antique Show and Harvest Picnic
- n Increasing the skill levels throughout the Authority to push the greater utilization of core staff in multiple tasks
- n Review the standing personnel complement from the standards of service and activity of prior years to assist the confirmation of organizational right sizing
- n Continue evaluation of all capital works and maintenance opportunities based on criteria of
 - n Safety and legislative requirem ents
 - n Maintenance of viability
 - n Revenue generation
 - n Cost reduction

W estfield H eritage V illage

- As the result of a proposition made by the Ham ilton Conservation A uthority Board to the City in 2014 the City Council and HCA made an agreement in principle for the City to sell the Westfield Heritage Village to HCA
- The necessary legal docum ents required for this transaction are in the works with form al completion expected in the 1^{st} quarter of this year

Westfield Heritage Village

- A pioneer village of over 30 historic buildings in a town site setting with 330 acres of green space and 5 kilometres of trails
- -Open all year with special events such as Maple Syrup festival in March, Ice Cream festival in August, Halloween and Christmas as well as a multi-organization children's event called "Telling Tales"
- -Local school boards annually send over 12,000 students
- Operated by 5 full time staff, up to 7 casual staff and a strong network of 250 volunteers
- -Generates revenue which covers 1/3 of operating expenses

- n Dedicated volunteer group of 250 regularly assisting on the ground, in costume and behind the scenes
- n Dedicated group, "Friends of Westfield", annually raising funds
- n Staffing few but supplem ented by a City sponsored volunteer co-ordinator in 2014 and 2015
- n Efforts have begun to conduct a feasibility study to explore the potential of a new V isitor Centre. Funding will be assisted by the Friends of W estfield
