Maximizing Economic Uplift:

#2 - McMaster Institute for Transportation & Logistics Report: The North American Light Rail Experience

One concern for B-Line LRT and the attraction of new riders is that movements along the corridor are fairly efficient for automobile commuters. Meanwhile, parking in the downtown core is cheap and abundant. The system of one-way streets along the prospective corridor, while good for auto commuting, is not ideal for LRT or for encouraging TOD.

Investments in light rail often take place in an auto-oriented environment where the path of least resistance is the status quo. As such, the need for a high degree of vision, conviction and strong support from the public is clear as all parties contemplate a time when the automobile is less dominant than at present.

LRT itself should be understood as a tool to *guide* development more so than one that *generates* development in and of itself, and likewise TOD is not a product of transit alone, but the interaction between a complex set of local factors. Apart from making travel by private automobile less attractive, a comprehensive array of planning incentives will likely be necessary to induce new investment along the route.
