What is Royal Botanical Gardens?

- Canada's largest botanical garden on the basis of the size of lands: 1,100 hectares or 11 square km
- RBG manages 30 km of Lake Ontario shoreline
- A national historic site and part of a UNESCO World Biosphere Reserve
 - 27 kilometres of nature trails that are home to over 50 species at risk as well as the largest concentration of plant species in Canada – Biodiversity Hotspot



Protecting Nature Right in Our City

- RBG works with other agencies in the immediate area that also own green space to better protect ecological corridors, preserve and restore nature, and plan for sustainable recreation
- Now called the Cootes to Escarpment EcoPark System, this area will maintain the only corridor of natural lands from Hamilton Harbour to the Niagara Escarpment

EMPLOYEES


- Spring and summer: 82 full-time, 175 parttime

• The Auxiliary of Royal Botanical Gardens' 325 members dedicated 39,000 hours of volunteer service in 2015.



REVENUE





- RBG generates roughly 63 per cent of its annual revenue through admissions, memberships, donations, fundraising and government grants
- 37 per cent of RBG revenue comes from the support of the Provincial and municipal governments

•	City of Hamilton	\$ 599,206
•	Regional Municipality of Halton	\$ 736,295
•	Self-generated	\$ 8,905,277
•	2015 revenues totaled	\$14,276,778

Operations - Revenue






Membership

 Total membership for 2015 was 8,603 memberships representing an estimated 16,316 members.

 Renewal retention remained strong with an 81% retention rate and annual revenues exceeded \$740,000.






2015 Annual Visitation

- Paid visitation 263,145
- Estimate of trail users 250,000
- Total visitation 513,145
- Using the Ministry of Tourism, Culture & Sport's Tourism Regional Economic Impact Model (TREIM) RBG visitors generate \$35,661,500 in spending in the Hamilton Region.
- TREIM is the industry standard for assessing investments in Tourism projects in Ontario





2015 Visitor Origin

- Paid visitation 263,145
- Estimate of trail users 250,000
- Total visitation 513,145
- 90% of visitation comes from people who live less than 40km from RBG
- Of the estimated 460,000 local visitors/users of RBG Natural Lands, 60% or 276,000 are from Hamilton.





Visitor Economic Impact

In 2015 RBG Visitation alone generated:

- \$35,661,500 in visitor spending in Hamilton
- \$15.1 million in Labour income in Hamilton
- 404 jobs in Hamilton area
- \$11.8 in total taxes to all levels of government
- \$23.1 million in total GDP impact in Hamilton

Impact of Rock Garden Rejuvenation

The \$20 million Capital Investment in the Rock Garden renovation, generated a further economic impact of:

- \$14.6 million in Labour Income
- 206 Jobs
- \$7.7 million in tax revenues for all Governments
- \$19.4 million in GDP

Teaching the Importance of Biodiversity

- Education touches all parts of Royal Botanical Gardens.
- We work hard to bring people of all ages in contact with nature and have that connection last for the rest of their lives.
- 15,000 school children attend educational programs each year.
- 2,100 kids per year attend RBG Camps
- 2,000 attend youth programs at RBG









A Community Steward

- Through the Green Angels Fund, RBG aims to ensure that all children, regardless of their financial situation, have the opportunity to fall in love with nature
- Green Angels subsidized in 2015
 - 81 kids for educational programs
 - 42 school groups
 - 34 camp programs
 - 1,189 children and youth









Environmental Benefits

As a member of the American Public Gardens Association RBG works with other industry professionals to advance the following sustainability impacts:

Air quality improvements from green space.

Water quality improvements via marshland conservation.

Storm water management for flood control.

Plant bio-diversity









Quality of Life Benefits

- Green spaces improve property value
 - There is a significant link between the value and access to nature.
- Health and Wellness
 - Recreation opportunities and green space improve overall community health and wellness.
- Employment Attraction
 - People want to work in cities with good access to outdoor recreation.





Investment Attraction

- Hamilton Waterfront Development
 - RBG is linked to the promotional story of Hamilton Waterfront development
- Green spaces renew business districts.
 - Greening of business districts increases community pride and positive perception of an area, drawing customers to the businesses - Westdale
- Employment and tourism boost
 - Jobs and tourism dollars are generated from visitors from parks, gardens and natural lands.





Conclusion

- RBG Grows the economy of Hamilton by:
 - Creating Jobs
 - Generating tax revenues needed to fund community infrastructure expansion.
 - Improving the Quality of Life of local residents.
 - Supporting key Hamilton economic development objectives and strategies.
