Personal background:

- First visited Hamilton in early '60s. I lived in several cities with historical centres in US, Canada and Europe, have seen efforts at preservation and adaptive re-use varying degrees of success.
- Examples: Kingston re-vitalization, Brampton and Oakville centres; Heritage Cons. Districts.
- To attract top business people and visitors essential for city to have a centre that is attractive and unique Gore is centre of historical Hamilton.

Gore today:

- All agree the Gore area is in need of a facelift.
- You have seen the architectural and historical features of these buildings in original pictures.
- LRT to re-activate the core. The properties present ideal opportunity for a Gore focal point.
- 18-28 King St E. pre-Confederation properties showcase Hamilton's commercial heritage.
- THEY ARE LEGACY BUILDINGS REPRESENTING OUR PAST, as such they deserve to be part of a Heritage Conservation District. Hamilton already has 7, make the Gore the eighth!

Downtown core:

- Much adaptive re-use already taking place in downtown core, time for the Gore to be involved.
- I believe the owner appreciates he is privileged to own such unique historic properties. He has already done valuable work on the nearby Landed Banking and Loan Company Building.
- Recent complimentary Globe and Mail article re. King William Street restoration etc.

Alternative to proposed applications:

- Integrate the restored buildings into complex with access via covered area to proposed buildings behind. Options are endless: restaurants, shops, galleries etc. All will provide a focal point and entice business people and visitors to visit and explore.
- Seen such work in Hamburg eating/shopping area they are destination points.

Current first impressions of downtown Hamilton:

- On my return in late '90s I could not believe the number of buildings that had been removed and replaced with parking lots or nondescript towers! Photographs show what we have lost.
- How to explain the parking lots to visitors from both Canada and abroad? Impressions?
- We have already lost so much unique and valuable architecture and must not be known in the future as the city that destroyed its heritage!

PLEASE DO NOT PERMIT DEMOLITION OF THESE ARCHITECTURALLY UNIQUE AND VALUABLE BUILDINGS. KEEP THEM INTACT FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS AND DESIGNATE THE GORE AS A HERITAGE CONSERVATION DISTRICT — MAKE IT OUR SEQUICENTENNIAL PROJECT!
