Zoning By-law Definitions and regulations

- Outdoor Commercial Patio is defined as any outdoor area used in conjunction with any establishment licensed under the *Liquor Licence Act* R.S.O. 1990
- live and / or recorded music not permitted on Outdoor Commercial Patios
- Other regulations deal with location of patios and seating capacity.
- Outdoor patio associated with a non-licensed establishment is not subject to the Zoning By-law general provisions applicable to "Outdoor Commercial Patios".



Research into 10 other municipalities

- there is not a consistent approach for location of patios or entertainment on Outdoor Commercial Patios and the neighbourhood impacts.
- Location Most municipalities establish a minimum distance (e.g. 30-45 m) between a patio and a Residential/Institutional/Open Space zone; only permitted in front yard;
- Entertainment on patios 4 municipalities prohibit commercial entertainment ; London and Burlington have made recent changes

Different Options Explored

- Option 1 Status Quo
- Option 2a Temporary Use By-laws for specific urban and rural areas
- Option 2b Temporary Use By-laws for the entire City
- Option 3 Delete the Prohibition for Outdoor Entertainment from all Zoning By-laws

Hamilton Proposed Zoning By-law Changes (Cont'd)

Preferred Option 2a – Temporary Use By-laws for specific urban and rural areas

- Establish Temporary Use By-law for seven pilot project areas (urban) and 18 specific properties in the rural area
- Urban pilot project areas concentrations of 5+ patios generally within 50 m of the property line from each other
- Rural area licenced establishment mainly golf courses, restaurants,

Hamilton Proposed Zoning By-law Changes (Cont'd)

- Zoning By-law Amendments would temporarily delete the regulation to prohibit entertainment on the patio
- Owner would be required to obtain a permit for activities on the patio from MLE
- Not all restaurants/clubs within these pilot project areas have outdoor patios at the present time
- By-laws affected:
 - Zoning By-law No. 6593 (Hamilton)
 - Zoning By-law No. 3581-86 (Dundas)
 - Zoning By-law No 05-200

Hamilton Pilot Project Areas (Rural)

Lands zoned P4 and have outdoor patios

- Golf courses 14 properties
- Restaurants 2 properties
- Clubs 1 property
- Campground 1 property

 Note: Copetown Woods golf course's address should be changed from 1450-1472 2nd Concession Rd w to 1430 2nd Concession Rd w



General provisions creates an offence that prohibits:

"... noise that is likely to disturb the inhabitants of the City."

AND deems, in part, that:

"... a radio, amplifier, speaker or other similar device [related to music entertainment] that is clearly audible at a point of reception is considered to be unreasonable noise."



Current Noise Control By-law:

- Authorizes the MLE Director to grant, refuse and revoke an exemption permit, and impose conditions specific to the application.
- Conditions to each permit may vary to the circumstances
- Appeals to the application are made before the Planning Committee.



Applicants provide additional information to the facts routinely collected, i.e.:

- a Certificate of Compliance by a certified acoustic consultant/engineer;
- a detailed Floor Plan

\$300 application fee



Key Elements:

- Thursday to Saturday, 11am 11pm;
- Noise restricted to a maximum equivalent sound level (Leq) 60 dBA measured at the permit holder's property line
