We would like to take this opportunity afforded to us to voice our concerns over the proposed development of a 19 story high rise complex. The approval of this project would be a detriment to the neighbourhoods that are connected to the land that this building is to be on. When you look at the area in question, Queenston Road between Centennial Parkway and Lake Street to King Street, you see existing high rise buildings, older and established homes and a variety of businesses. The construction of this would probably take a number of years affecting the current residents who reside and work to the degree that their homes would decrease in value and people who support the current businesses would take their needs elsewhere. On top of that major concern is the construction would cause a heavier traffic burden, noise and construction pollution.
