# THE PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE PRESENTS REPORT 17-003 AND RESPECTFULLY RECOMMENDS:

### 1. Woodward Avenue Wastewater Treatment Plant Digester Gas Methane Sphere Recoating (PW17013) (Ward 4) (Item 5.2)

### 4. Proposed Permanent Closure and Sale of a Portion of Road Allowance Abutting 935 Ridge Road, Hamilton (PW17011) (Ward 11) (Item 6.1)

That the application of the owner of 935 Ridge Road, Hamilton, to permanently close and purchase a portion of road allowance abutting the east side of 935 Ridge Road, Hamilton, as shown on Appendix "A", attached to PW Report 17-003, be approved, subject to the following conditions:

- (a) That the City Solicitor be authorized and directed to prepare a by-law to permanently close the highway;
- (b) That the appropriate by-law be introduced and enacted by Council;
- (c) That the Economic Development and Real Estate Division of the Planning and Economic Development Department be authorized and directed to sell the closed highway to the owner of 935 Ridge Road, Hamilton, in accordance with the Procedural By-law for the Sale of Land, By-law No. 04-299 at fair market value;
- (d) That the City Solicitor be authorized and directed to register a certified copy of the by-law permanently closing the highway in the proper land registry office, upon confirmation from the Public Works Department that all applicable fees and costs associated with the application have been paid by the applicant;

- (e) That the by-law permanently closing the highway does not take effect until a certified copy of the by-law is registered in the proper land registry office;
- (f) That the Public Works Department publish a notice pursuant of the City's intention to pass the by-law pursuant to City of Hamilton By-law 04-299 being a By-law to Establish Procedures, including the Giving of Notice to the Public, Governing the Sale of Land Owned by the City of Hamilton.

- (c) That in the event that the sewer pipe is not a functioning storm sewer, staff be authorized and directed to either remove or abandon-in-place the sewer pipe, whichever is determined by the General Manager of Public Works to be most appropriate, and that the City be responsible for 100% of the associated costs for this work,
- (d) That on behalf of the City, the General Manager of Public Works be authorized and directed to enter into and execute any legal agreements and other documents required for the implementation of subsections (a), (b) and (c) with content acceptable to the General Manager of Public Works, and in a form satisfactory to the City Solicitor.

### Accessible Transit Services Review Sub-Committee Meeting on Thursday, October 13, 2016

### <u>Questions/Suggestions for the Sub-Committee:</u>

- 1. Can supervisory staff beavailable on evenings and weekends to the clients, to resolve major issues when they occur? When an issue occurs outside regular business hours, clients must wait until the next business day to discuss the matter with a supervisor. This does not resolve the situation at the time.
- 2. Can greater effort be made to ensure adherence to the DARTS policy that no one remains on a vehicle for greater than one hour? Extenuating circumstances such as accidents and inclement weather are understandable. Situations where there appears to be no reason other than poor scheduling are uncomfortable, complicated for clients (who may miss a meal at their facility of residence as a result), and frustrating.
- 3. Can reservation staff give greater consideration to the person to whom they are speaking, when they conduct a booking transaction, or call a client with information? Since clients who utilize DARTS services may have health issues which slow their processing of information, reservation staff should be reminded to speak more slowly, and to also allow time to listen to the client. This will allow the client to absorb the information being given.

Thank you very much for your attention to the above recommendations. These improvements will be greatly appreciated by the many clients relying on DARTS transportation within the City of Hamilton.

### **Council Direction:**

At the April 13, 2016 City Council meeting, a motion was approved that staff be directed to report to the Accessible Transit Services Review Sub-Committee at a future meeting with a detailed explanation of the methodology used for The City of Hamilton Customer Survey for the Disabled and Regional Transit System (DARTS).

#### Information:

At the September 2014 General Issues Committee (GIC) it was recommended:

 That Staff be directed to work collaboratively with DARTS and report to the Accessible Transit Services Review Committee with a proposed Terms of Reference for undertaking an independent, third-party survey of DARTS passengers to examine ways to improve service.

As a result, a working group was formed which consisted of representatives from Accessible Transportation Services (ATS), DARTS and the DARTS Board. During the next few months, the group developed the Terms of Reference for the survey which stated the following:

 That the survey randomly include active customers, caregivers and program/agency staff; and,

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OUR Mission: To provide high quality cost conscious public services that contribute to a healthy, safe and prosperous community, in a sustainable manner

• That the survey be transparent, confidential and impartial

The survey group worked with the City's Procurement team through the Request for Proposal (RFP) process in terms of reviewing and evaluating submissions received from proponents who expressed interest in conducting the survey.

The RFP resulted in a total of four (4) proposals that were received. Through a detailed evaluation, Forum Research Inc. was awarded the contract since they successfully met the submission requirements and were the lowest bidder which complies with City policy.

All four (4) proponents identified a margin of error of approximately +/- 5 percent and the same scope of work for the survey (i.e. telephone interviews). Additionally, three (3) of the proponents identified a similar target audience of approximately 10 percent of 4,500 active customers (active being passengers who took at least one trip with DARTS in the previous 12 months)

Forum Research Inc. consulted with the working group to establish and develop content for the survey; this included formulating the questions for the survey. The main areas of focus were:

- Service expectations of stakeholders
- Stakeholder understanding of shared ride implications

- Effectiveness of stakeholder communication/outreach
- Complaint management
- Customer Satisfaction

#### <u>Methodology</u>

The survey methodology used by Forum Research Inc. consisted of two (2) phases:

- Phase 1 Respondents were randomly selected from list of all active customers (4500) provided by ATS. Computer-Assisted Telephone-Interviewing (CATI) of randomly selected DARTS customers (75% were DARTS users while 25% were caregivers). The margin of error was +/-5 at 95% confidence level. A total of 402 surveys were completed; and,
- Phase 2 involved five (5) in-depth telephone interviews of agencies to gain an understanding of user perceptions and expectations of DARTS. Respondents were randomly selected from list of agencies (20) provided by ATS. Most participants interviewed were program supervisors.

#### **Confidentiality**

As noted in their proposal, Forum Research Inc. has a very strict practice with respect to confidentiality, such as follows:

• During their introduction, interviewers specifically noted that answers will be kept strictly confidential

Ensure Client Information Confidentiality

• All data collected is secure, private, and disposed of in the correct manner

Data Privacy

- Collection, maintenance, use, storage, general management and reporting of data is potentially subject to *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FIPPA) & Personal Information Protection & Electronic Documents Act (PIPEDA)*
- In addition to the requirements of both Acts, Forum Research Inc., also includes the following steps:

- (b) That following the receipt of the staff report respecting the feasibility of moving to a 100% "On Demand" Accessible Transportation System operated by the Taxi Industry, and should that program be implemented, that staff report back to the Accessible Transit Services Review Sub-Committee with an analysis of any complaints received as well as passenger satisfaction and cost.

### Information:

At the March 31, 2016 Accessible Transit Services Review Sub-Committee a presentation was made by members of the City's Advisory Committee for Persons with Disabilities (ACPD) which lead to the above noted recommendations; specifically the undertaking of a 3 year pilot program for a 100% "On Demand" Accessible Transportation System.

Accessible Transportation Service (ATS) staff has had an opportunity to review the presentation from ACPD and provide the following:

- the cost of \$36 for a shared ride trip on DARTS is out dated; the ACPD presentation was based on 2013 and 2014 trips costs;
- the projected saving outlined of \$5.5M to \$6.3M by moving to an "On Demand" service will not be achieved.

At the General Issues Committee on Friday February 19, 2016 ATS staff made a presentation on the future direction of specialized transit in Hamilton which highlighted the annual projected service trip costs to be:

- 2015 of \$28.49
- 2016 of \$27.46
- 2017 of \$22.06
- 2018 of \$23.00

The reduction in costs is a direct result of decreasing the number of DARTS buses and replacing them with accessible and non-accessible vans.

However the ACPD presentation outlined the significant operational benefits of an "On Demand" Accessible Transportation System such as:

- All service costs go directly to the trip rather than administration
- Highest possible customer satisfaction
- Achieve full accommodation; zero denials
- Eliminate problematic service related policies
- Significantly reduce complaints relating to service delivery policies
- Reduce staffing compliment

Conversely implementing an on demand system whether permanently or for a three year pilot will cost the City significantly more to deliver. However the inability to forecast the demand would put the City at risk for an indeterminate operating expense to manage the system. Please refer to the below table:

Historically the average customer takes 106 trips per year or approximately 2 trips (one trip each way) every week. Moving to a service that duplicates the present on demand metered taxi service without the cost for the customer could easily see the demand double or triple per customer. The inability to forecast the demand would put the City at risk for indeterminate operating expenses and will prevent staff from being able to plan/deliver the service accurately.

Implementing a 3-year pilot program for a 100% "On Demand" Accessible Transportation System operated by the Taxi Industry has limitations/restrictions;

- Requires fleet of accessible vans to match demand or service related issues will remain (cancels, denied trips, refused trip)
- Unable to determine appropriate fleet size
- Potential for cost overrun if uptake for alternative service exceeds expectations

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
