TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION COMMISSION OF CANADA

- Documented the legacy of Canada's Indian Residential School regime through survivors' testimony and archives
- Final Report released December 2015 with 94 "Calls to Action" directed at governments, education institutes, churches, private sector
- Several Calls to Action point to municipal governments; many municipalities across Canada have begun taking action



EXAMPLES WE CAN BUILD UPON

- The Indigenous community in Hamilton has been supporting community members for over 40 years
- Creation of a Hamilton Aboriginal Advisory Committee
- Relationships built and sustained with the Haudenosaunee through Red Hill Valley Joint Stewardship Board
- Collaboration with Indigenous partners on federal homelessness funding
- Recent collaboration with Hamilton Executive Directors Aboriginal Coalition (HEDAC) regarding Indigenous-led poverty reduction investment
- Support for public education projects: Witness Blanket (2015); I AM AFFECTED (2016) and I AM COMMITTED (2017) poster campaigns

HAMILTON URBAN INDIGENOUS STRATEGY

- A commitment for building mutually respectful relationships with Indigenous peoples
- Identifies actions for ongoing engagement with the Indigenous community
- Raises awareness of Indigenous histories, contributions and cultures with all Hamiltonians



PHASE ONE

Dec 2016-Dec 2017

- Establish governance and guiding principles
- Raise awareness of this new work within the Indigenous community and with all Hamilton residents

PHASE TWO

Jan 2018-Aug 18

- Form working circles to focus on main areas of strategy
- Engage community (Indigenous and non-Indigenous) about the strategy areas

PHASE THREE Sep 2018-Dec 18

- Confirm and finalize the findings and recommended actions
- Share the strategy
- Evaluate the process and identify the path for implementation

- Review strategies and plans from community organizations and other municipalities
- Identify municipal Calls to Action
