Report:

Very recently, Legal Aid Ontario (LAO) announced its intention to cut 40% of all refugee and immigration law services beginning on July 1st 2017 due to budgetary constraints. These cuts, estimated by LAO to be worth \$13.1 million, will significantly impact and put at risk the lives of thousands of people in Ontario. At the end of June 26, LAO announced it will continue immigration and refugee services at the current level for now but that suspension of service may occur in the future unless a funding solution can be negotiated with the federal government.

This report comes directly to Regional Council due to the emergent nature of the topic

and the potential for imminent negative impact on Waterloo Region residents.

Waterloo Region is a resettlement community for immigrants and refugees. It is also a hub for refugee claimants who have arrived in this community seeking Canada's protection. Over 22% of the population are immigrants and refugees. Each year around 100 refugee claimants arrive in Waterloo Region. There are currently around 1,000 claimants whose cases are pending in Waterloo Region. Those vulnerable residents will be directly impacted by the proposed cut to the immigration and refugee law program.

Refugee claimants living in Waterloo Region need the services provided by organizations like LAO to fairly navigate the complex refugee determination system. Other refugees and immigrants also require access to LAO legal services.

Community organizations in Waterloo Region provide essential settlement services to refugees and immigrants. They help them access legal services provided by LAO. They do not have the capacity to provide legal services if LAO cuts immigration and refugee law services.

The consequences of inadequate legal representation can be serious. Refugee claimants will not have access to legal advice and representation. The number of negative decisions on asylum claims will increase. Poor or inadequate representation leads to wrong decisions that can result in removal to a situation of persecution, torture or death. Negative decisions may also result in more appeals and further backlog the legal system.

Legal Aid Ontario has asked the federal and provincial governments to increase their financial contribution to cover the \$13.1 million deficit. The Immigration Partnership Council supports this funding increase for this fiscal year and on an ongoing basis. It has asked the Federal and Provincial governments together to ensure there is no reduction of legal representation for refugees and immigrants in Ontario, and requested that Waterloo Region's federal and provincial elected representatives champion this matter on behalf of refugees and immigrants in our community.

Partner organizations in Waterloo Region provide essential settlement services to refugees and immigrants. They help them access legal services provided by LAO. They do not have the capacity to provide legal services if LAO cuts immigration and refugee law services.

The consequences of inadequate legal representation will be serious. Refugee claimants will not have access to legal advice and representation. The number of negative decisions on asylum claims will increase. Poor or inadequate representation leads to wrong decisions that can result in removal to a situation of persecution, torture or death. Negative decisions may also result in more appeals and further backlog the system.

We understand that Legal Aid Ontario has asked the federal and provincial governments to increase their financial contribution to cover the \$13.1 million deficit.
