the Hamilton Public School Board Property.

2. Lister Building, 28-44 James Street North, Hamilton (D) – B. McHattie

That the Hamilton Municipal Heritage Committee send letters of gratitude and acknowledgement to LIUNA (Labours' International Union of North America), Joe Mancinelli and the editor of the Hamilton Spectator, respecting the work done to revitalize the Lister Building.

(ii) Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board Building, 100 Main Street West, Hamilton – P. Wilson

Paul Wilson discussed issues surrounding the School Board Building. In speaking with a Board representative he indicated that the building will be torn down. The School Board has hired a heritage consultant to document the building, prior to demolition. Mr. Wilson made inquiries to see if alternative means were possible to save the building, to which the representative indicated was not possible. Councillor Pearson indicated that the problems with the building are extensive and that the board requires the funds from the sale of the current building to build their new offices.

(ii) Lister Building, 28-44 James Street North, Hamilton (D) – B. McHattie

The Committee was very pleased with the overall condition of the building and very impressed with the restoration work.
