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Council Direction:

At the January 24, 2011 Board of Health meeting, an information report BOH11001 regarding a Community Garden Coordinator position was received. The report outlined that \$68,000 had been provided by the Trillium Foundation to the Hamilton Garden Collective Project in November 2010, to be used to fund a Community Garden Coordinator. Report BOH11001 indicated that an update on the results of this funding would be shared with the Board of Health at the end of 2011. The purpose of this report is to provide that update.

Information:

The Trillium Foundation funds were used to pay the Community Garden Coordinator's wages, as well as material and administrative costs. The Hamilton chapter of the Canadian Organic Growers was the recipient of the funds, but was unable to provide office space and other support. Green Venture, as another stakeholder, agreed to house the position, provide administrative support, hire and oversee the staff person.

Hiring a Community Garden Coordinator helped community gardens flourish in Hamilton in 2011. There are now over 30 community gardens - 20 of which sit on Hamilton housing properties. In 2011, 18 new gardens were established city wide - 11 on City housing properties and one on city property in 2011. As well, three gardens were transitioned from city-managed sites to community leadership in 2011. The Community Garden Coordinator has successfully established a network of gardeners with whom she maintains close communication through monthly meetings, E-newsletters, twitter and face book accounts. In addition, she has developed and delivered five workshops for gardeners with more than 70 gardeners attending in total. The Coordinator held a seed exchange and fundraising event and held outreach events in low-income neighbourhoods with attendance of greater than 50 interested citizens.

"Being part of the community garden has allowed me to get to know many more people in my neighbourhood. I feel like I am a part of something good and I get to learn and eat my own produce." (Community garden participant)

OVERVIEW

The Hamilton Community Garden Network has existed in many forms throughout that past decades supporting community gardening efforts in Hamilton. With development of the Hamilton Community Garden Policy in 2010, organizations and individuals throughout Hamilton joined together to obtain funding for a Network coordinator and other resources. For 2011, a grant was secured from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to support the Network through the Canadian Organic Growers, Hamilton chapter. Combined with generous in-kind donations, this grant has allowed the Network to flourish.

This report highlights the progress of the HCGN from January 2011 through September 2011.
