Own and manage approximately 11,000 acres:

- 7 Watersheds-
 - Spencer Creek, Borer's Creek, Chedoke Creek, Red Hill Creek, Stoney Creek, Battlefield Creek and the Stoney Creek numbered watercourses

9 Major Conservation Areas-

- Valens Lake, Christie Lake, Webster's Falls/Spencer Gorge, Dundas Valley, Fifty Point, East Mountain (incl. Eramosa Karst), Beverly Swamp, Fletcher Creek and 140 kilometres of trails
- Many Species of Flora and Fauna-
 - Including both species at risk and common species, such as Jefferson Salamanders, Chimney Swifts, Butternut trees and deer

Highlights

- Completed Natures Count project reduces both grant/donation revenue as well as expenses i.e contract staff not renewed; lowers bench strength
- Conservation Areas countering inflationary pressures through reduced seasonal hours
- Operational staff engaged in major maintenance work
- Revenue growth difficult and weather dependant
- Stronger emphasis on third party driven special events

Confederation Park

Highlights:

- Expect attendance at Wild Waterworks to meet 106,000 of 2013 which was 10,000 less than 2012, demonstrating the impact of weather and fragileness of the revenue stream
- Ticket rates reached ceiling, introducing seasonal package offerings, increase emphasis on internet marketing and pre-visit ticket sales
- Maintaining pressure on cost management, restricting seasonal hours and utilizing operational staff for capital and major maintenance work
- Maintaining the balance between service expectations and budget constraints more difficult each year
- Jointly executing an Operational Review on Confederation Park and specifically on Wild WaterWorks with Public Works

Westfield Heritage Village

- A pioneer village of over 30 historic buildings in a town site setting with 330 acres of green space and 5 kilometres of trails

-Open all year with special events such as Maple Syrup festival in March, Ice Cream festival in August, Halloween and Christmas as well as a multi-organization children's event called "Telling Tales"

-Local school boards annually send over 12,000 students

- Operated by 5 full time staff, up to 7 casual staff and a strong network of 250 volunteers

-Generates revenue which covers 1/3 of operating expenses
